


Iowa Overpass has been paved-tentative date set!

On Nov. 21, 2013 I received a call from the city of Riverside Public Utilities in regard to a tentative date set for the opening of the new Iowa Ave. overpass. Unfortunately on the day I received the call it was raining so the tentative date has been set for Dec. 19, 2013 but I was reminded that it could be postponed to a later date if the rain delays the opening or if it is too close to Christmas. When construction was started in October of 2012 the target





HIGHGROVE SHERIFF REPORT

Nov. 5, 2013 report:

Part 1 crimes increased by 71.4 % from 7 to 12 over the past 2 weeks in Highgrove. The total of violent crimes increased from 100 % from 1 to 2. Homicide decreased by 100 % from 1 to 0. Rape stayed the same at 0. Robbery stayed the same at 0 but aggravated assault increased from 0 to 2. Property crimes increased by 66.7 % from 6 to 10 and burglary increased by 50 % from 2 to 3. Auto theft increased from 0 to 2, Larceny theft increased from 4 to 5 and vehicle burglary and arson remained the same at 0.




Re-paving and patching covers up new 8 inch water lines



The old pavement is chipped up and loaded it into a truck and hauled away.

Paving and Patching

The new Iowa Overpass has been paved and many of the local streets in Highgrove have been patched where the installation new water lines resulted in surface streets being torn up when the new water lines were installed. The final patching of the trench has been completed on Mound, Highland, Pacific, Fountain, Prospect, Villa and various other residents served by the Riverside

city utilities. The older portion of Highgrove is served by water from the city of Riverside and the newer and larger lots have water service from the Riverside/Highland Water Company. Highgrove residents who pay Riverside/Highland water Co. for their water bill were not included because the old lines were water lines from the city of Riverside that needed to be replaced due to age.

Highgrove Elementary School "Career Day"

Ardie and I were invited to participate in the Career Day at the High-grove Elementary School on Nov. 12, 2013. We met other guests for a briefing and then broke up into separate groups and escorted to various classrooms.

Assumptions Can Be Dangerous to Investors

Every day of our lives, we make assumptions. We assume that the people we encounter regularly will behave in the manner to which we are accustomed. We assume that if we take care of our cars, they will get us to where we want to go. In fact, we need to make assumptions to bring order to our world. But in some parts of our life — such as investing — assumptions can prove dangerous.

Of course, not all investment-related assumptions are bad. But here are a few that, at the least, may prove to be counter-productive:

- "Real estate will always increase in value." Up until the 2008 financial crisis, which was caused, at least partially, by the "housing bubble," most people would probably have said that real estate is always a good investment. But since then, we're all more painfully aware that housing prices can rise and fall. That isn't to say that real estate is always a bad investment as a relatively small part of a diversified portfolio, it can be appropriate, depending on your goals and risk tolerance. But don't expect endless gains, with no setbacks.
- "Gold will always glitter." During periods of market volatility, investors often flee to gold, thereby driving its price up. But gold prices will fluctuate, sometimes greatly, and there are risks in all types of gold ownership, whether you're investing in actual bars of gold or gold "futures" or the stocks of gold-mining companies.
- "I can avoid all risks by sticking with CDs." It's true that Certificates of Deposit (CDs) offer a degree of preservation of principal. But they're not risk-free; their rates of return may be so low that they don't even keep up with inflation, which means you could incur purchasing-power risk.

Again, having CDs in your portfolio is not a bad thing, but you'll only want to own those amounts that are suitable for your objectives.

"The price of my investment has gone up — I must have made the right decision."

This assumption could also be made in reverse — that is, you might think that, since the price of your investment has dropped, you must have made the wrong choice. This type of thinking causes investors to hold on to some investments too long, in the hopes of recapturing early gains, or selling promising investments too soon, just to "cut their losses." Don't judge investments based on short-term performance; instead, look at fundamentals and long-term potential.

• "If I need long-term care, Medicare will cover it." You may never need any type of long-term care, but if you do, be prepared for some big expenses. The national average per year for a private room in a nursing home is nearly \$84,000, according to a recent survey by Genworth, a financial security company. This cost, repeated over a period of years, could prove catastrophic to your financial security during your retirement. And, contrary to many people's assumptions, Medicare may only pay a small percentage of long-term care costs. You can help yourself by consulting with a financial professional, who can provide you with strategies designed to help cope with long-term care costs.

You can't avoid all assumptions when you're investing. But by staying away from questionable ones, you may avoid being tripped up on the road toward your financial goals.



California Dreaming by Dr. Cynthia Williams

Being a transplanted native Californian I am suffering from shock just like my plants. I miss Highgrove and all my family and friends! I moved to central Oregon nearly three years ago and it is nothing like Highgrove. I knew the change would be dramatic- this little city has about 80,000 people, hundreds, if not thousands, of wild deer, and more dogs per capita that any place I've ever been. It is another planet compared to California. Let me share with you my journey.

The older I get the more melancholy I get about Christmas. I have so many fond memories of my childhood in Highgrove and of our family holidays, but none more so than Christmas.

Every year my parents hosted a Christmas Eve party for friends and family. With so many kids and a handful of cousins, the place would be so crowded. As we all married and had our own kids, the place was packed! Also, my parents taught us not to be enemies with "ex-s". Unless they did something seriously bad- like bust someone's nose, they were always welcomed back for the annual gathering. (The new spouse would just have to get over it.) And the ex-s would bring their new spouse and new children. It was quite a bash. There was lots of food, drink and music. Every year Santa would make an appearance for the little ones. Not one little one ever said "Where's Daddy?"- they were too excited and distracted. The family became seriously huge. To help manage the expense and challenge of purchasing gifts for everyone, we decided to do a drawing. We had all of us siblings and our spouses draw a name- usually on Thanksgiving. We also did the same with the kids. As the kids got older we divided them into two groups:

"The babies" which were the ones about 10 and below, and the "Know it Alls" which were the ones about 12 through high school. This was a very good system for many years.

We took great delight in surprising our parents with a special gift. Some years we would pool our resources

and get something big and unexpected. The best year and the most fun we had was the year we bought them a new refrigerator. Since I lived down the street near the end of the block, we had it delivered to my house during the day on Christmas Eve. It sat in my living room for most of the day! At the appropriate time, my brothers, well warmed with Christmas "spirit", walked down the block with a moving cart. They loaded it up and rolled it back up the street, which seemed jolly good fun, and parked it in the driveway. We put a big bow on it and brought Mom and Dad outside to see their present (there wasn't room in the house!) They were very surprised and very pleased. And we had the most fun!

Some gifts were traditional; it wouldn't be Christmas if I didn't get Dad a box of See's Victoria Toffee, tiny hammer included. It wouldn't be Christmas if someone didn't get Mom a carousel horse figurine of some kind. They also surprised us. The year I moved back to California to go to Pasadena College of Chiropractic (1982) I got a good surprise from Dad. I had just moved into a little house in San Dimas the week before and I borrowed Dad's circular saw to cut down some bookshelves. So Christmas day I am opening a gift. I pull off the wrapping paper and it's a small Black and Decker circular saw box. I didn't think anything of it, thinking it was a box that had been reused. One end was glued shut so I flipped it over. The other end was glued shut as well. I looked up with astonishment-"It really IS a saw!" Mom quickly says "don't blame me, it was your Father's idea". I said "This is GREAT!" It was my very first own power tool. I loved it. I still have it and use it.

Christmas morning, when all eight of us were small kids at home, was crazy. Santa had come and left something for each of us. Our stocking were filled with candies, nuts and oranges. After

Mom and Dad got up we would gather around the tree, which was pretty loaded up. Mom would pass out gifts and Dad would take pictures. Pretty soon it was a storm of paper flying, bows sailing over head and lots of ooos, ahhs, and squeals. They were good at knowing what we liked and they did their best of make us happy. That was a challenge with eight children.

Mom was incredibly creative and talented and made a good number of gifts. Dad worked two jobs and supervised a large number of people. He felt an obligation of thank them at Christmas but there was always a lack of funds to do shopping. Mom's immeasurable talents were pressed into service. Each year she created special gifts and I heard that hers were the ones they looked forward to each year. I know they were preferred over anything that could have been purchased. One that sticks in my memory was the chimney Santa. It was made with a small circle of styrofoam for the base, a clear glass chimney (like for an oil lamp) for the head, and a felt cap on Santa's head. The inside of the chimney was filled with colorful Christmas candies, and he had eyes, beard and smile glued on cut from felt. They were very darling.

Since we have grown up, we have moved on from Highgrove. We have had a variety of spouses, many children, and with Mom and Dad gone, we have all created our own family traditions. We don't gather for Christmas like we used to, which is sad for me. I miss my brothers and sisters and the really terrific times we had together. Right after our last get-together I start looking forward to the next one. They never some soon or often enough.

Please remember to cherish and love each other. You never know when this Christmas will be your last together. I wish you all a Merry Christmas, a prosperous, healthy and Happy New Year.

16 time champion John Force sets Funny Car track record at Pomona!

319.37 MPH in less than 4 seconds in 1,000 feet on Nov. 9, 2013

3.995 seconds



As technology increased, the distance was shortened from 1,320 feet to 1,000 feet because the Dragsters and Funny Cars were going too fast for many of the tracks and still allow enough room at the end of the track to be able to get stopped. Phil, Don and I were at Pomona when the new track record was set by John Force who turned 64 last May. At his age you would think he would be starting to slow down but maybe you don't know him!



Top Fuel Dragster/Funny Car Ever wonder why a Top Fuel dragster gets a rebuilt engine after each run? Stay with this - even if you aren't a 'car nut', this is stunning.

* One Top Fuel dragster outfitted with a 500 cubic-inch replica Dodge (actually Keith Black, etc.) Hemi engine makes more horsepower (8,000 HP) than the first 4 rows of cars at NASCAR's Daytona 500.

- * Under full throttle, a dragster engine will consume 11.2 gallons of nitro methane per second; a fully loaded Boeing 747 consumes jet fuel at the same rate but with 25% less energy being produced.
- * A stock Dodge Hemi V8 engine cannot produce enough power to merely drive the dragster's supercharger.
- * With 3000 CFM of air being rammed in by the supercharger on

overdrive, the fuel mixture is compressed into a near-solid form before ignition. Cylinders run on the verge of hydraulic lockup at full throttle.

- * At the stoichio metric 1.7:1 air/fuel mixture for nitro methane the flame front temperature measures 7,050 degrees F.
- * Nitro methane burns yellow.

The spectacular white flame seen above the stacks at night is raw burning hydrogen, dissociated from atmospheric water vapor by the searing exhaust gases.

- * Dual magnetos supply 44 amps to each spark plug. Which is typically the output of a small electric arc welder in each cylinder.
- * Spark plug electrodes are totally consumed during a pass.

After 1/2 way thru the run, the engine is 'dieseling' from compression and the glow of the exhaust valves at 1,400 degrees F.

A look back at the World's fastest dragster in 1957: Cook and Bedwell in 8.89 seconds in 1/4 mile



This Cook and Bedwell dragster was on display at the 2013 drags in Pomona back when the length of the drag racing track was 1/4 mile or 1,320

feet and the engine was in the front. Funny cars still have the engine in front of the driver. As a long time drag race fan I have seen a lot of changes from when we used to race at Pomona years ago. Our car club was the MI\$ERS and we ran a Pontiac powered B gas dragster. I won't tell you what our top speed was back then but our best elapsed time was 10.20 seconds in the 1/4 mile.

Today some of the classes still race the 1/4 mile distance but since the Nitro burning Dragsters and Funny Cars produce around 10,000 HP each the distance has been shortened and they are still going well over 300 MPH in only 1,000 feet.




The engine can only be shut down by cutting the fuel flow.

- * If spark momentarily fails early in the run, unburned nitro builds up in the affected cylinders and then explodes with enough force to blow the cylinder heads off the block in pieces or split the block in half!!
- * Dragsters reach over 300 MPH+... before you have completed reading this sentence.
- * In order to exceed 300 MPH in 4.5

seconds, a dragster must accelerate an average of over 4 G's.

In order to reach 200 MPH well before reaching half-track, at launch the acceleration approaches 8 G's.

* Top Fuel engines turn approximately 540 revolutions from light to light! * Including the burnout, the engine must only survive 900 revolutions under load. * The redline is actually quite high at 9,500 RPM.






