Highgrove gets first sewer line!



Center St. has become the center of attention for motorist going through Highgrove due to the construction of a new sewer line. The sewer line will start near the intersection of Center St. and Michigan Ave. by the new library and continue down Center St. westward to East La Cadena Dr. where it will turn south along the east side of the I-215 and connect to the Riverside Sewer System at Palmyrita Avenue.

The project is known as the Center Street Trunk Sewer Main and will eventually end up costing \$3.174 million when it goes into operation in May or June of this year. It is based on a sewer master plan study commissioned by the Redevelopment Agency and was performed by Krieger and Stewart 4 years ago that assessed the feasibility of sewers in Highgrove and on which the current sewer project and all subsequent sewer projects will be based. The present project is brought to you thanks to the Redevelopment Agency for Riverside County and is the first of several envisioned by the Redevelopment Agency and Supervisor Marion Ashley that intends ultimately to sewer all of Highgrove.

TBU, INC from Beaumont was awarded the construction contract and Krieger and Stewart is the design engineer. This project totals some 7,000 lineal feet of gravity sewer and originates/terminates at Palmyrita Ave. on east La Cadena Dr. which is the point of connection to the City of Riverside's sewer system who will operate and maintain the sewer. The sewer runs to Center St. then east up Center St. to Michigan Ave. where it terminates. It will serve present and future customers on those streets.

Presently, the sewer originates at approximately Villa St. and now runs to the BNSF tracks but will be completed to Michigan Ave. by mid-February. Due to some utility conflicts, the first segment south of Villa St. to Palmyrita Ave. has been delayed. An engineering solution has been worked out with the City of Riverside and that work should proceed in late February to complete the project by Summer.

Anyone on east La Cadena Dr. or Center St. where the main was installed should be able to tie into the line. Typical connection charges and fees applied will be what the City of Riverside's Public Utility department would charge a city customer since they will be the operator of the system. Property owners will be responsible for constructing any lateral lines and making connections. The next Phase of sewer will be the Main St. Trunk Sewer which will be a sewer main that ties in at Center St. and Iowa Ave. moving northerly to Main St. then east up Main St. to approximately Michigan Avenue. There is also the possibility that some lateral lines will be installed down some of the side street to allow easier access to the sewer mains for residential and commercial customers. Marker placed at community center honoring Danny Stouffer



New UCR Student Housing and Apartments coming to Iowa Avenue across from K-Mart



The Sterling Iowa project will consist of three buildings containing a total of 216 units. The unit breakdown is 45 one-bedroom units, 63 two-bedroom units, 5 three-bedroom units and 103 four-bedroom units. The buildings are organized around surface parking and a single-story parking garage. The surface parking lots will utilize car ports to help break-up the massing of the buildings and provide for transition to the homes and multi-family apartments to the east.

The buildings are oriented to provide a pedestrian friendly presence on Iowa Avenue while pushing them further away from the adjacent single family homes and multi-family apartments to the east. The buildings will be four stories in height.

The Sterling/Iowa Ave. project will be a luxury student apartment community with an exceptional design and mission appearance that provides an oasis of peace, comfort and tranquility amidst the University district of the city. The architectural style is reminiscent of the Mission Inn, a cultural and historical landmark in the city. The building facades are proposed to be a combination of stucco and stone with a tile roof. The color palate was selected to tie the project to the surrounding community. The project will offer three unit types, ranging in size from one-bedroom units that are 461 square-feet in size, up to four-bedroom units that are 1,493 square-feet in size. Interior finishes may include 42" Plasma/LCD televisions, in-room cable and high speed internet, washer and dryers in each unit, and fully furnished residences available.

Other project features and amenities will include seeking a LEED Silver designation to promote environmental responsibility and to maximize efficiency and conservation measures. Green homes are healthier, more durable, and more energy and water efficient than conventional code built homes. A two-story, approximately 7,400 square foot clubhouse will house our fitness and exercise rooms, leasing offices, computer lab powered by Mac and PC products, multiple study rooms, coffee bar, club room, complimentary tanning services and lounge. Additionally the project will provide five courtyards, one of which will feature a resort style pool. Another courtyard will have a multi-use court along with a BBQ area. The other three courtyards will be designed for gathering and/or study areas for residents.

Center Street Liquor Store Robbery



On January, 18, 2011, at approximately 6:30 pm, deputies from the Jurupa Valley Station responded to Center Liquor Store, which is located at 285 Iowa Ave. in Highgrove, reference an armed robbery that just occurred. Deputies arrived on scene within minutes and were told a black male adult, armed with a handgun, entered the business and shot the owner and his wife then took an undetermined amount of cash. The victims described the suspect as approximately 35 – 40 years old, with a bald head and goatee. Additionally, the suspect was wearing glasses and a dark colored jacket. A perimeter was immediately established surrounding the area and an extensive search for the suspects initiated. Investigators and Forensic units arrived on scene to gather evidence. The suspect was not located; however, good surveillance footage of the crime was obtained from inside the store. The gunshot victims were transported to area hospitals for treatment and expected to make full recoveries. To Retire Comfortably, Know What Moves to Make and When to Make Them.

We all want to enjoy a comfortable retirement. But to do so, we need to make different moves, and consider different issues, at different times of our lives.

To help illustrate this point, let's look at three individuals: Alice, who is just starting out in her career; Bob, who is nearing retirement, and Charlie, who has recently retired.

Let's start with Alice. As a young worker, Alice has a good four decades ahead of her until she retires. Yet she realizes that it's never too soon to start saving for retirement, so she has already begun contributing to her 401(k) and to an IRA. And since she has so much time ahead of her, she can afford to invest aggressively, putting much of her contributions in growth-oriented vehicles. While it's true that the market will certainly have its "dips" in the future, and that Alice's account values could rise and fall from year to year, it's also true that, over the long term, stocks have historically trended upward*. And the longer Alice holds her investments, the less of an impact that market extremes should have on her 401(k), IRA and other accounts.

Now, let's turn our attention to Bob. Since he is within a few years of retirement, he has some key decisions to make. For one thing, he must decide if it's time to change the investment mix in his IRA, 401(k) and other accounts. Because Bob doesn't have much time to overcome market volatility, and since he'd like to maintain the gains he has already achieved, he may decide to become more conservative with his investments. Consequently, he may choose to move some of his investment dollars from stocks to bonds and other fixed-income securities. Realizing, however, that he may spend two or three decades in retirement, and knowing that he will need to stay ahead of inflation, he doesn't abandon all his growth-oriented investments. Furthermore, Bob decides that he may need to

bolster his retirement income, so he considers whether an annuity, which is designed to provide him with an income stream he can't outlive is appropriate for his situation.

Our final "life stages" investor is Charlie. He has recently retired, so his biggest concern is making sure he doesn't outlive his financial resources. Therefore, he may need to consider a variety of moves. For starters, he should determine when to start taking Social Security and when to begin taking withdrawals from his IRA and 401(k) plans. (For a traditional IRA and a 401(k) or other employer-sponsored plan, Charlie, like all investors, must start taking withdrawals no later than age 70-1/2, but for a Roth IRA, there is no age requirement. However, there may be other requirements that must be met for a Roth IRA.) After deciding when to start taking withdrawals from his retirement plans, he'll also need to calculate how much he can afford to take each year without emptying the accounts. Finally, he might need to rebalance his overall investment portfolio to provide himself with more income.

Of course, the situations described have been simplified for illustrative purposes to give an idea of some of the considerations for different stages in your life. It is important to work with your financial professional to develop a plan to help you enjoy the retirement lifestyle that you've envisioned.

was gone for now and I turned from the fence, which by the way, was put there to protect the school kids from mad dogs and escaped convicts. It sure couldn't keep me in if I had the mind to climb its flimsy wire barrier. Looking down the corridor I saw my big brother David, a seventh grader headed my way. He was carrying his shoes and was bare footed. This was his usual visit to me at lunch time just to check up on me. He was my guardian this time of day, but he looked messed up with uncombed hair. I asked him why he was not wearing his black dress shoes and he lifted up his foot showing me a big blister on his heel. Telling me to be sure to eat my lunch, he headed back from where he came leaving me on my own for the rest of the lunch hour. I saw Norma, Curtis and David playing a Ring-Around-the-Rosie game out on the lawn so I ran over, barged in and accelerated the clockwise motion of the kidring singing, "Motorcycle, motorcycle, go so fast....." until the speed sent us hurling outward until we all tumbled down in the grass, at which point I sang, "Motorcycle, motorcycle, skin yo ass", laughing out loud. Yeah, I was fascinated by Eugene's motorcycle, as was the entire family. It attracted attention wherever he rode it, especially the attention of Curtis' Dad whose flathead Ford had little or no chance of ever catching it out on the open road. There was a local controversy over the legality of dragging a wooden sled loaded with camp gear down Hwy 41. Technically, since the sled had no wheels, the consensus was that Eugene and his motorcycle buddy, Jack Strachner could legally do so

I had been hearing that motorcycle sound off and on for the last thirty minutes and it was within a minute of high noon now. It was Eugene's 51 pan head all right, but he was usually at work this time of day, not riding around the school ground outside. I looked at the crayon depiction of his motorcycle in front of me on the undersized first grade class table. The wheels were brown and the tires black and the tank blue. It was a crude drawing unlike Curtis Adney's black and white ford V8 cop prowler which he had been quietly creating across the table that we shared with David "Beans for Breakfast" Orton and his flatulence. Curtis' dad was the local law which made Eugene the local outlaw by comparison. Curtis had the silent concentration of a true artist, and he was a natural born artist for sure. I was admiring his work from across the table when the WWII vintage siren went off in the town square heralding noon. Glancing up at the clock to confirm this I was, in an instant, at the door with my lunch box in hand yelling "Bombs over Tokyo". New study requested for Metrolink Station Site!

On Jan 12, 2011 I spoke to the 30 RCTC commissioners during public comments and referred to the "Supplemental Environmental Assessment" dated November 2010 that showed a diagram of a Metrolink station on the east side of the Perris Valley Line railroad track between Palmyrita Ave. and Columbia Avenue. This information was sent to the libraries in Riverside, Moreno Valley, Woodcrest, Perris, Highgrove, and was also available at the RCTC offices.

Here is the problem: We told RCTC 2 years ago there was a plan to build a large warehouse on this same property. In fact I presented a video to RCTC on Feb. 11, 2009 showing the starting of the construction. (This video is available on our web site).

I then showed the commissioners a photo dated Jan. 3, 2011 showing the new 507,000 sq. ft. warehouse that is built on this same location and is almost completed.

Anyone reading this incorrect information at the public libraries would believe there will be a station built on the 25 acres now occupied by this giant warehouse. RCTC has opposed building a station at Highgrove for the last 9 years!

On April 5, 2007 the Executive Director of RCTC at that time, Eric Haley and former RCTC Commissioner Robin Lowe stopped an independent study planned by SCAG (Southern California Associated Governments). And as stated be-

fore, I have a tape recording of this meeting.

At the last meeting on Jan. 12, 2011, I asked for a new independent study where we can have a seat at the table for a Metrolink station in Highgrove that will examine destinations, availability of trains, cost, growth, future housing and transportation dollars. Supervisor Ashley asked the RCTC staff to report back to the commission and respond to my comments.

Nine years is a long time for the public's requests to be ignored in regard to a station at Highgrove. We asked for a station when 35 acres were available between the BNSF main line railroad tracks and the Perris Valley Line railroad track.

Now there are only 19 acres available on the north end due to another large warehouse being built on the south end along Citrus Street. These same 19 acres are needed to connect the 2 railroads.

Property for a station between Palmyrita Ave. and Columbia Ave. is no longer available due to the new 25 acre warehouse. And a station at Marlborough Ave. is out of the question due to insufficient parking and it is 1 & 1/2 miles from the existing Metrolink trains that go through Highgrove each day.

The public is entitled to know the real reasons why RCTC is so opposed to a station that would be on the same property that has to be purchased anyway to connect the 2 railroads where existing trains pass

by 7 days a week. It is our tax money that is being used on this \$232 Million dollar project.

Last month I spoke to the Colton City Council, the North Side Improvement Association and to the SANBAG Commuter Rail and Transit Committee to inform them about RCTC's long term opposition to a Metrolink station at Highgrove. I also spoke to the Executive Director of SCAG after the SANBAG meeting.


I will continue to try and enlighten the public until someone starts to listen! So far I have out-lasted former RCTC Executive Director, Eric Haley; former Deputy Director Hudieo Sugita, RCTC's Stephanie Wiggins and former RCTC Commissioners Robin Lowe and Bonnie Fleckinger who lost their elections on Nov. 2, 2010. Carl Sheirmeyer, a consultant to RCTC and SANBAG, is retiring this month.



Invisible Populations:

Jessielee Coley
Homeless Death Rates
Continued

In my last article I discussed the top reasons homeless deaths increase during the winter season. One question still remains: How are potential deaths in the homeless population ranked? If an organization wanted to fund a program to house the homeless, by what process would they determine who holds the highest need for such a program? The innovators of the Vulnerability Index had a similar thought. The Vulnerability Index is a survey used to rank and prioritize high-risk homeless individuals. This survey was developed by a group known as Common Ground in New York City led by Becky Kanis. This idea was based on the research from the Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program by Dr. Jim O'Connell, Dr. Stephen Hwang et al in 1998.

The survey is administered to homeless populations and asks them a series of questions relating to their medical history. Individuals are ranked by a number of things including emergency room visits in one year, and a condition called "tri-morbidity." This was an interesting vocabulary term to encounter; tri-morbidity infects a person who has coexisting substance abuse problems, a psychiatric disorder, and another under-

lying medical condition (i.e. heart failure, liver cirrhosis). Once a homeless population is surveyed, they are ranked and housed accordingly. Common Ground is the organization that goes to great lengths to house these individuals in need, their mission is to end homelessness.

As a student at University of California, Santa Barbara, and an active volunteer in street medicine, hearing ideas and seeing them set into motion is inspiring. I am lucky enough to be taking a seminar this quarter that focuses on underserved populations. It brings scholars from across the country to our classroom so that we can hear their ideas face to face. On February 17th Dr. Jim O'Connell will speak to our class about Homeless Medicine with a lecture entitled, Reflections on Rough Sleepers: Life and Early Death on the Streets of Boston. Dr. Jim O'Connell is the President of Boston Health Care for the Homeless Program and Department of Medicine at Massachusetts General Hospital. The Vulnerability Index and Housing the Unsheltered will be discussed by Becky Kanis who is the 100,000 Homes Campaign Director, for Common Ground Communities. The ideas and practices of these accomplished mentors are something students aspire to replicate in order to become innovative minds in the medical field.



If you are interested in this subject and read any newspapers then you already know that the man is an African American and highly educated and qualified.

I will say this: I believe it was a very smart thing for the council to appoint him from 12 others that wanted the job. There was at least one council member that wanted to operate as a four member council. But this is Wrong! Five is necessary because if you have five members who are competent and capable then community decisions can be made without a 2 to 2 tie.

Test driving the new Tesla electric sports car!



The Riverside International Automotive Museum at 815 Marlborough Ave. just south of Highgrove, was the host to the Tesla sports car that is all electric powered and rated at 288 horsepower. I had to make a reservation in order to drive this car and I must admit it is very quiet and very quick. It can accelerate from 0 to 60 in just 3.7 seconds compared to a 2011 Camero with 426 horsepower that takes 4.7 seconds to go from 0 to 60 MPH.



There is no coasting because when you let off of the gas the car slows down because the electric motor turns the power into a generator that creates drag. The range is 245 to 315 miles depending on driving conditions and electrical demand from your right foot. It re-charges in 3 1/2 hours with 220 volts in your garage or about 24 hours for 110 volts. This particular model sells for \$109,000 minus \$12,500 in rebates. Any buyers?


