On Feb. 18, 2015 at the Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council meeting, Riverside County employee Bill Brown announced that the new residents moving into Spring Mountain Ranch will not have to pay the annual Highgrove parcel fee of \$120.00. This came as a surprise to everyone because the parcel fee has been in place for many years that is primarily for Highgrove's extra Sheriff Deputy and also used for landscaping. Unfortunately the annual fee did not have a COLA to provide for increases in cost for Sheriff protection. The \$120.00 Annual fee has been paid for each parcel for residential parcels, business parcels and parcels of vacant land within the boundaries of Highgrove which is in Riverside County. If property owners own more than 1 parcel, each parcel is subject to the

On April 22, 2015 three Highgrove MAC members, Melanie Zimmermann, Denis Kidd, and yours truly, R. A. "Barney" Barnett, met with Supervisor Tavaglione to discuss why the Spring Mountain Ranch was given an exemption from the fees that would help pay our Sheriff and landscaping costs. There were 11 people at the meeting. The meeting at Supervisor Tavaglione's office included Tavaglione's Chief of Staff, John Field, and Legislative Assistant Jason Farin, Suzanne Holland, Riverside County Economic Development Agency-Assistant Director, Bill Brown Riverside County EDA-Development Manager/ Community Services Division, William Di Yorio, Riverside County Undersheriff, Lee Wagner, Riverside County Sheriff/Assistant Sheriff, and Jason Horton, Captain of Jurupa Valley Sheriff Station.




April 14, 2015: South/West corner of house ran into, and two occupants fled leaving a stolen pick up truck stuck in corner of house by the kitchen.

State of California Mandatory Water Restrictions for Riverside Highland Water Company Customers

The existing restrictions for everyone include:

Using potable water to wash down driveways and sidewalks.

Watering of outdoor landscapes that cause excess runoff.

Using a hose to wash a motor vehicle, unless the hose is fitted with a shut-off nozzle.

Using potable water in a fountain or decorative water feature, that does not recirculate the water.

Using outdoor irrigation during and 48 hours following measurable precipitation.

No draining and refilling of swimming pools, you may maintain the level in your pool.

Restricting all outdoor irrigation to no more than 3 days per week, between the hours of 6 p.m. and 8 a.m. Please refer to the enclosed map for your outdoor watering schedule.

All leaks are to be repaired in a timely manner.

Existing restrictions for business include:

Restaurants and other food service establishments can serve water to customers on request only.


Hotels and Motels must provide guests with the option of not having towels and linens laundered daily.

These Restrictions will be updated as needed or required by the State of California.

California is experiencing one of the driest periods in its history.


Governor Jerry Brown has declared a drought state of emergency and has directed the State Water Resources Control Board to adopt a program to reduce water use by 25% overall throughout the state. At Riverside Highland Water Company we have been tasked with 36% water reduction, as was many inland water agencies including Yucaipa Valley, Redlands and Loma Linda.

Water agencies across California are implementing water conservation measures to comply with regulations. Enclosed are the State mandated restrictions that Riverside Highland Water Company Board of Directors has adopted. In addition to the published restrictions, we would like to encourage our shareholders and customers continue to use water wisely. Fixing all water leaks and eliminating the unnecessary waste of water are vital to ensure our water needs are met, now and into the future.



HIGHGROVE SHERIFF REPORT

Part 1 crimes staved the same at 7 for the past two weeks. Violent crimes, to include Homicide, Rape, Robbery and Aggravated Assault, rose from 2 to 4 for the past 2 week period, which included 1 robbery (Valero Gas Station) and 3 aggravated assaults. Property crimes dropped from 5 to 3 during the same period, that included 1 burglary, 1 auto theft, and 1 larceny theft. Overall, Highgrove currently shows a 11.2% decrease in Part 1 crimes for 2015 when comparing the same time period of 2014.



The lady who updates the online calendar for the city of Riverside did not update their web-site to show that the meeting had been cancelled so when the operator looked at the web site she also saw that the Transportation Committee meeting was on the day I asked about and she apollogized for my having to drive to Riverside

My Highgrove roots go back to 1947 when our family came to Highgrove from Ft. Wayne, Indiana due to my mother's health. Mom and Dad sold our house and service station in Ft. Wayne and they bought a 1946 Chevrolet and a 26 ft. Liberty trailer and Mom and Dad, my two brothers, and our cat, moved to Highgrove.

Mom had hay fever and was allergic to rag weed so we had to move but she out- lived my dad by 16 years. Ardie and I restored the Highgrove house that I first moved into when I was 8 years old.

For 21 years we have tried to bring local news to our neighbors to keep everyone informed about what is going on in our community because in the past the San Bernardino Sun was not available due to Highgrove being in Riverside County, and the Riverside Press would not print anything about Highgrove unless it was something bad.

Years ago I wondered what if something important happened in Highgrove, how would Highgrove know! As an example I wondered what would happen if a prison was built in Highgrove? Would we be the last ones to know it was a prison only after we saw the bars in the windows! This is just an example. There never was a threat of a prison being built in Highgrove as far as I know.

I also wondered what would happen if gangs moved in and wanted to take over Highgrove. Would there be adequate response from the Sheriff Dept. to protect our community?

how the Highgrove United Methodist Church had been broken into 5 times and how a resident had to chase an intruder down their hall after they broke in and it took several hours for the Sheriff to come to Highgrove from Rubidoux.

Most of my Highgrove Elementary schoolmates have moved away or passed away so many years ago I had to decide if I should also move away or stay and try to make Highgrove a better place to live. I decided to stay because this is my home town and I wanted to keep everyone aware of what is happening in Highgrove.

We have copies of the Highgrove Happenings that date back over 21 years ago to the spring of 1994. 



the area between these lines is in Highgrove which is in the county. The land south of the Riverside/San Bernardino County Line and north of the Riverside City Limits is in Riverside County and in the community of Highgrove. Supervisor Tavaglione had a doctor's appointment and had to leave early so he missed part of the meeting.

Later, I asked for another meeting and on May 4, 2015 I met with 3 county representatives: Supervisor Tavaglione, John Field, and Jason Farin.


Supervisor Tavaglione said he was not the Supervisor in Highgrove when the assessment was established but he would get a legal opinion by consulting with county council about who should be pay-Highgrove's boundaries.

On May 22, 2015, I sent this email to Supervisor Tavaglione:

The Highgrove MAC feels that the parcel fee was in place before any of the new homes were built and the fee should be paid by all present or future parcel owners within the Highgrove Boundaries.

But the Highgrove MAC recently learned that another developer is planning on building homes within the Highgrove boundaries that is subject to the existing annual parcel fees. If the first stop concerning major developments in Highgrove is supposed to be the Highgrove MAC and the Shopoff Group is planning another housing development, then why hasn't the Highgrove MAC been notified about the Shopoff development?

This fee was approved by voters to enable better Sheriff coverage in Highgrove. But if the new residents in the Spring Mountain ing the parcel fees that are within **Ranch development are not re**quired to pay the \$120.00 annual parcel assessment then will the future property owners in the Shop-


off development also be exempt from the parcel fee?

We understand that you will be meeting with county council in regard to who should pay the parcel fees and we feel that all parcel owners should be paying the fee to help pay for our Sheriff coverage.

We appreciate your help in resolving this issue. Thank you, "Barney" (As of June 24, 2015 I have not received a reply.) A copy of the 1997 ballot is shown below. CSA 126 was the Highgrove area before it became a Municipal Advisory Council. Zone "A" is the Highgrove area east of the I-215 freeway. The 1997 ballot that passed by 75.8 % states <u>all</u> parcels within CSA 126 Zone A.

The key word is <u>ALL</u> because since this was voted in, each parcel has to pay the fee whether it is a business, residence, or vacant land. All property owners should pay their fair share!



Supervisors. He loved to travel, both domestically and abroad, enjoying the natural and historical



New track and grade crossing improvements on Perris Valley Line



This is where the curved track will connect to the Perris Valley Line track toward Perris. The property on both sides of this curve is owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission but RCTC is only charging 38% of the actual cost to the PVL project. RCTC has \$5,347,500 invested in the remaining vacant land that is not needed for the Perris Valley Line but has been needed for a Metrolink Station for over 13 years!



The Citrus St. crossing was closed so new track and heavier rail could be installed to accommodate new Metrolink service between Riverside and Perris. This was taken on May 29, 2015 but the crossing is now open and has a median to prevent vehicles from driving around the gates.



Just north of the Iowa Ave. overpass is is the location where the new track leaves the BNSF main line. Future Metrolink trains and freight trains coming from under the overpass will go around this new curved track to Perris.



This photo was taken on June 8, 2015 as workmen were installing a median in Palmyrita Ave. over the Perris Valley Line track. The old worn out rail has been replaced with heavier rail between Perris and Highgrove. The crossing is now open but in August of 2013 we did an article about widening Palmyrita Ave. but at that time we didn't know it would so long.

Geological Rambles and Rumbles

The Movie "San Andreas"

I recently saw the 3-D version of San Andreas because that fault system trends through the San Bernadino Mountains and runs close to Highgrove. Also I was curious as to whether the screenwriters depicted damage arround Highgrove (they didn't). The movie presents some valid information about earthquakes, but real-world seismologists who have studied the San Andreas fault system do not at present accept the premise that earthquakes in Southern California can be that large. The San Andreas has been drilled into, sampled, and analyzed and is one of the most thoroughly studied and understood of all strike-slip (or sideways slipping) faults in the world.

An incorrect item in the film is that the seismologist, played by Paul Giamatti, can predict the loca-

tion, timing, and magnitude of an impending earthquake. This is not currently possible, as I mentioned in a previous article. Another error is the premise that movement along the San Andreas fault system could generate a tsunami. That is highly improbable because tsunamis are generated at subduction zones areas in which an oceanic plate is moving beneath a continental plate, such as along the coast of North America north of San Fransico and the eastern coast of Asia. Strikeslip faults such as the San Andreas do not cause ocean-floor upheaval because their movement is sideways rather than vertical, although the many strike-slip faults offshore between Santa Barbara and San Carlos in Baja California contain thrust faults that could undergo vertical movement and thereby present slight tsunami hazards, according to geophysical consultant Mark Legg (www.sciencedaily.com/releases/2015/05.)


In the editorial printed in the Riverside Press-Enterprise on June 20, 2015 the article stated that the Riverside County Board of Supervisors voted "to seek bids to audit county criminal justice departments and review contract rates for services by the Sheriff's Department".

Other information in this article states: "Public safety costs in Riverside County are driving a lot of cities and the county itself into financial turmoil, so a review of some sort makes sence". (enter pe.com page 14) The following day on June 21, 2015 the Press-Enterprise ran another article on the front page titled: Debate Over Public Safety that mentions auditing the public defender's office and probation department.

We recommend reading these two articles in the Press-Enterprise that has extensive coverage of this subject. (enter pe.com and the dates)

In Highgrove, our main concern is also directly related to the cost to obtain Sheriff coverage for our area. Captain Jason Horton of the Riverside County Sheriff headquarters in Jurupa Valley has been to our Municipal Advisory Committee meetings and stated that our area has 24/7 Sheriff coverage even though we do not have our dedicated Highgrove Sheriff Deputy any more.

Another concern we also have in Highgrove is directly related to cost because we are waiting for a response from the county about who is required to pay into the fund that is used for our Sheriff expenses. We need new development to also pay into the fund and not be exempt from the annual \$120.00 fee so we can afford Sheriff coverage for our area.

I remember too that once someone drove down the adjacent road while they were pulling a water skier but I don't remember who it was.

One winter after I had been cut off from the Santa Fe due to not having much seniority, I actually worked for the Gage Canal Company when there was no water in it. Our job was to shovel out the dirt and sand then use concrete to patch the cracks and holes so when they put the water back in it would not leak.

The Gage Canal job and driving the wrecker at DeAnza Chevrolet in Riverside kept me going until work on the railroad improved and I was called back.

A fight back then ment wrestling the other one to the ground. punching or maybe kicking but no weapons were ever involved. Nine times out of ten after a fight the opponents became best friends.

Highgrove was a good place to grow up. Many people may say I older and....

As kids we used to climb Sugarloaf in the background. On a clear day in the winter you can see every-

and miles. But you want to remember to only climb these foothills when the rattlesnakes are hybernating. They hybernate in the cool weather in the wintertime and come out when it heats up in the spring and summer.

Many years ago a friend of mine and I climbed straight up from the Highgrove side and it took us 3 hours. It was so steep we had to dig the heels of our boots into the dirt to keep from sliding back down. We had a mirror and red flag in case we needed a helicopter to rescue us. Ardie was in the car below and she could see the reflection from never grew up-I just got older and our mirror and hear us on the cell phone. The best plan is to wait until Jan. or Feb. then drive to the east end of Blaine St. and go up from there. It only takes 30 to 45 minutes thing in every direction for miles and on a clear day the view is great!






