

Few cars had passed and I was relatively alone on Highway 41 and I liked it that way. No one knew where I was and I reported to no one on most days. I exercised my independence and imagination on my foot travels and I had big dreams of one day having a bicycle and expanding my world by miles and miles.

With that out came the butcher knife and down into the water I leaped and began slashing at the reeds until I had an arm full of the worthless cattails. Actually I had a use for the weed because you could use the cattail as a sword or even bang the brown thick end on the road and release the thousands of floating seeds into the breeze

by, Dr Cynthia Williams, Chiropractor The ABCs of Retail Food **Inspection**

A B C What do these letters mean in the window of your favorite restaurant? They can mean the difference between enjoying your meal and getting deathly ill.

The counties of Riverside and San Bernardino have very similar standards and grading systems for all retail food establishments. This includes not only restaurants, but also snack bars, gas stations that sell food, grocery and drug stores, hospitals, nursing facilities, vacation centers, and even discount stores. The system is in place because of the real risk of foodborne illness due to the mishandling of foods. There are many ways in which food can be mishandled and there is a scoring system to reflect the seriousness of the infraction and with that score a letter grade. (Note: schools are not graded by the health departments; they are inspected by the school district to which they belong.)

Everyone starts with an "A" and 100 points. Inspections are unannounced so all facilities are judged during their standard operating mode. As the inspection progresses, points can be lost due to a large list of factors which include food temperatures, ie: are the hot foods hot? (Over 145 degrees); are the cold foods cold? (Under 40 degrees); are open foods covered appropriately? Do the workers wash their hands, use clean towels to clean up, keep their hair covered, and their hands out of their face and mouth while preparing food? Are the floors clean? Is the dish washing facilities at code and is the water hot enough? Do all workers have Food

Workers Certification Cards? And so many more factors.

An "A" grade is a score from 100 to 90; "B" grade is a score of 89 to 80; "C" grade is a score of 79 to 70. If a facility scores a 69 or below it is closed on the spot. Most restaurants, markets, and gas stations do well and get an "A" with just minor violations. A search of the city of Riverside for any "C" grades revealed only one- a market on Arlington Ave. This facility had major violations and presented a health risk to those who shop there. Of the 29 restaurants and facilities listed for the City of Grand Terrace, only 5 had a score of "B" and no "C"s.

The policies of the health departments of the County of Riverside and the County of San Bernardino give a fair amount of leeway to facilities that have "B" and "C" grades to make on the spot corrections and other corrections with a reinspection before they are closed down. However, when major violations are observed, there IS a real risk and patrons of such a facility should be extremely concerned.

Foodborne illness is one of the most common illnesses and can be fatal to infants, the elderly and those with a compromised immune system. We all place a lot of faith and trust in those who prepare and serve food to us. There are many different systems in place to educate the food service worker as to the safe practices of food handling, different systems for the restaurants to use to maintain their facility so food is prepared and served safe, and there are methods for recording the safe practices (HACCP). When a facility has the inthese practices, you can feel safe there.

So when your favorite restaurant has been tagged with a "B" what do you do? Personally, I don't go into that restaurant until they have been reinspected and receive an "A" grade. Just a loss of four points in the area of food temperature handling can be a health risk. To receive a "B" grade, there has to be more problems than that. I don't want to take the risk. You should not either.

Invisible Populations: Women's Free Homeless Clinic


In prior articles I have discussed homeless populations, and I would now like to transition into minorities of the homeless community. Minorities of minorities you ask, precisely. When you think of a homeless person you most likely imagine an old scruffy looking male. In spite of popular belief homeless females do exist, however they strive to remain concealed. The women do so because of their dark pasts, the majority of them have faced extreme challenges like domestic violence and rape.

The Women's Free Homeless Clinic in Santa Barbara provides homeless women with a safe environment to build friendships and a sense of community with women who are in similar circumstances. This clinic is one of the many programs of the nonprofit organization Doctors Without Walls-Santa Barbara Street Medicine. This clinic provides free and confidential hygienic needs by providing showers, laundry services and medical care.

The clinic is made possible by a collaboration of partners including Transition House, Easy Lift, Organic Soup Kitchen and Planned Parenthood. Transition House is a program that

houses the homeless who are trying to become permanently sheltered. The visitors of the house are required to leave during the day to either attend school or work. This open space provides the perfect facility for the Women's Clinic. The Easy Lift van provides roundtrip transportation to the clinic and has different pick up locations. This ensures that all women who wish to attend the clinic have a safe way of doing so. The Organic Soup Kitchen provides the clinic participants with a healthy and nutritious meal. Planned Parenthood is an organization that provides reproductive health care for the women. The clinic is successful with the help of these resources as well as many others throughout the Santa Barbara community.

The clinic takes place every second and forth Friday of the month. The attendance rate has sky rocketed since the clinic opened one year ago, the clinic has between 25-30 regular attendants. The Women's Free Homeless Clinic advertises mainly through word of mouth, it appears that the clinic's goal to create a positive and safe community for women has been a success.



Why California and Riverside are Financially Broke Part 1

If we read the newspaper every day and watch the evening news for the past 2 months, we would have all read or heard "Why" we are broke. The "how" and "why" are explained below. But honestly, even knowing the reasons won't balance either budget but at least gives us a glimpse of how our elected officials, bureaucrats, and city and County leaders got us into this mess!

Basically, California is \$11.2 to \$40 Billion that is short in their 2009-2010 annual budgets and has requested a federal government loan of \$7 Billion to help relieve some of the financial woes of the state.

The Governor has released 20,000 to 80,000 prisoners from prison which should mean they now have a surplus but instead they will have a shortage because they have to cover the financial impact on the county and city bud-

The Governor ordered State employees to take the 1st and 3rd Friday's off without pay which would save the State about \$1.3 Billion. However, the unions are taking the Governor to court over his Furlough Order.

So, we, at the local level, will still have to pay these government employees, who in my opinion are overpaid. Then there are the retirees such as former Police Chief Russ Leach who will receive an annual retirement income of over \$100K per year of our tax dollars and that is just ONE retiree.

I know of 3 other retired city em-

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an article listing the city employees and their retirement pensions. Or at least give us the total coming out of our tax dollars to pay these expensive former employees. I am a retired teacher and I get \$24,000 a year and I worked 30 years. I should have taken that gov't job when it was offered to me years ago. But, raising the kids came first!

Then our Governor, who will probably run for President in 2012, if permitted, started asking city and county governments for loans to cover the State budget shortages and thank goodness our local leaders at least one time had a clear mind and turned him down. He wanted \$16 Billion from us the local taxpayers.

The State Comptroller delayed paying our tax refunds to the tune of \$3.5 billion because the State was experiencing cash flow problems. Duh! It was OUR money and he should have never had the authority to freeze OUR money. In November, vote the bum

Our State Legislators, in their infinite wisdom, passed a Bill increasing our State Sales Tax to 8.5 percent instead of the past 7 percent and we pay the highest rate of sales tax than any other State residents.

President Obama refused our federal loan and told us to solve our own problems. I don't like the guy but at least he has made one good decision while in office.

California currently owes over \$2

reduction of education funds by \$8 Billion and our State universities were hit the hardest. 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

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
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
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
