Around 3:00 pm on Feb. 10, 2010 we received a call about a traffic accident at Iowa Ave. near Main Street.

The one car accident involved the driver Camile Phillips 24, and her 18 month old son who was in his car seat in the back seat. Also in the back seat was their Yorkshire terrier "Rizzo". A nearby resident Rick Flores heard the crash and he and others helped the mother and son get out of the car. The vehicle was southbound on the curve on Iowa Ave. and hit the median and a sign post then ended up on its side facing the opposite direction. The vehicle was very unstable but the firemen braced the car up with 2 poles to prevent it from falling completely over. Highgrove fire station 19 responded as well as units from the City of Riverside fire department. When we arrived, both the mother and son were being attended by paramedics but we did not know the seriousness of their injuries at that time. Luckily both of the occupants were not seriously injured but the dog was missing.



On 2 5 10, a deputy performed an occupied vehicle check in the 1300 block of Villa St. The deputy contacted a male adult and determined the subject to be under the influence of an alcoholic beverage. The subject advised he lived in his vehicle, and promised to not drive. Based on the subject's level of intoxication he was arrested for public intoxication.


On 2 11 10, a deputies responded to the 400 block of Devener St., reference a domestic disturbance call. Deputies arrived and contacted two adult subjects at the location. A female at the location advised the argument started over trust issues. Both parties were counseled by the deputies and advised to call if they had any further trouble.

On 2 11 10, a deputy responded to the 100 block of Pacific Ave., reference a traffic collision. Prior to the deputies arrival, dispatched advised it was a single vehicle involved that collided with a tree. Dispatch also advised the vehicle was driven away from the location and that there was possible property damage.

The deputy located the abandoned vehicle a block from where the collision had occurred. Witnesses were able to give the deputy a description of both of the occupants. After checking the area the deputy located a male walking in an alley adjacent to where the vehicle was located. The subject admitted to being a passenger, but refused to cooperate further. CHP was notified and took over the investigation.

The joy of everyone was seeing Betty's mother Jean, also known as "Birdie" being so active at 89 years of age. She had the best time helping with this big bash.





### California Energy Commission Terminates Highgrove Power Plant Project



The Application for certification for the AES Highgrove Power Plant that was to be located on Taylor St. between the 2 sets of railroad tracks has been terminated. This location is between Main St. and Pico St. on the Grand Terrace side of the county line but has been referred to in the past as the Highgrove Steam Plant.

On Feb. 2, 2010, Applicant, AES Highgrove, LLC, filed a notice pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 20, Section 1709.8, withdrawing the Application for Certification. The Committee directs that the Application for Certification proceeding for the AES Highgrove Power Plant Project be terminated. The docket in this case (No. 06-AFC-2) shall be closed.

This former project was going to be 3 turbine powered generators that would be used for supplemental power when needed especially during power shortages that occur during the summer months when electricity is in the most demand. This location is on the west side of Taylor St. by the new Grand Terrace High School that is being built.







Cooking Locally, Cooking Fresh

One of life's greatest pleasures... eating the food you prepare yourself. The focus is on ingredients that are seasonal, local, fresh, and flavorful. We are so lucky to be living in the US, in California, in Riverside County, and in Highgrove! We have a bountiful access to so many fresh, flavorful foods and the weather to enjoy them out of doors or in. So let's get cooking!

We can get almost any food from the market but too often it has been harvested green, shipped hundreds or thousands of miles, and lacks the color, flavor and nutrition of locally grown fresh produce. Fortunately we live in an area where we can obtain fresh, locally grown produce year round, even in winter. Road side stands of citrus fruits, persimmons, and avocados make it easy to pick your own fruit and vegetables. Farmer's markets like the ones in Grand Terrace, Riverside, and Redlands make shopping local, fresh and seasonal convenient and fun.

Here is a list of some of the produce that is available in March for Southern California.

Celery
Spinach
Grapefruit
Kiwi

Oranges are especially dear to my heart, having grown up here in Highgrove. Here are a couple of recipes that feature this bright flavored fruit.

This is great over pancakes, ice cream, or even added to hot tea.

#### **Orange Syrup**

1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cups sugar, 1 cup boiling water, 1 cinnamon stick, 1 tbs lemon juice, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup orange juice, grated rind of 1 orange

Boil sugar, cinnamon stick and water 5 minutes. Add the fruit juice and grated rind and continue boiling until syrup is reduced to a sauce that sticks to the back of a spoon.

#### **Orange Carrots**

1 pound carrots, cut into quarterinch-thick slices

the juice and zest from <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> orange 1 orange, peeled and cut into bitesize pieces

2 tablespoon butter or margarine, softened

2 tablespoons brown sugar

In a saucepan, cover the carrots with water and simmer for 10 minutes until just tender. Drain and return the carrots to the saucepan. Add the remaining ingredients and heat.




Monday Evening

I talked with Rich in his office on the day before he retired and he said he will still do some consulting work but he will have more time to go fishing and be able to spend more time doing other activities.


Rich is also a board member of the




The new sewer line will run westward down Center St., turn southward to E. La Cadena Dr. and connect to the Riverside sewer system near Palmyrita Avenue.

### Recent Supreme Court Ruling on Free Speech

On January 17, 2010, the Supreme Court of the United States ruled 5 for and 4 against thereby ruling in favor of corporations contributing corporate funds to any political campaigns. #### **JAP HILL**

Do you wish your name were different? What about the town you live in or the landmarks therein? Would you change their names if you could? Anyone who has lived in Grand Terrace for more than 40 years has always called the approach from Colton on Mt. Vernon Ave. up into Grand Terrace Jap *Hill*. It is a hill and a landmark. The name has an interesting history. Jack Oberschmidt and Byron Matteson have lived in Grand Terrace all their lives and they are both senior gentlemen. They both call the entrance into Grand Terrace Jap Hill. By the way, there is a website for sale called Japhill.com.

In the early 1900's the area where Edison has its facility just west of Jap Hill was farmed by Chinese immigrants. They did not live where Jap Hill is located. That place under which are the remains of bunkers are where Japanese immigrants lived and they worked more for the Cooley family than anyone else. The Cooley Ranch encompassed the area where WalMart and that entire complex or series of complexes are now located, a location of many acres. The Cooley family ranch was one of the first developments in this area sometime before World War I. The Cooleys had several children, mostly boys who worked diligently on the ranch and when they married; most of them stayed in Colton or Grand Terrace. One of the most recent was Stafford Cooley who died about 10 years ago. He loved gardening and did so for my home and several others hereabouts.

Jack Oberschmidt told me that his father the late Ernie Oberschmidt and anyone else who developed anything from Colton to Riverside as he did called the hill by the name Jap Hill. Jack said that about the time WWII began Japanese people were hired to till the fields and work for other owners of property in the Grand Terrace/Colton/ Riverside area. Thus people in order to point out a landmark for directional information named the hill Jap Hill. If anyone in Colton asked you where Grand Terrace was the answer would Editor's note: The opinions exbe: "Well, you just go up Jap Hill and there you are in Grand Terrace." Jack feels that most people are more sensi-

tive than they should be by words particularly when it comes to their nationality.

Byron Matteson, former Mayor of Grand Terrace who served for 16 years, and who is still a community minded individual said that he never heard anyone call the hill by any other name.

The late George Carlin made it one of his "schticks" (\*see the definition at the end of this article) and it was very popular. He discussed almost all of the four letter words and his finale was that: "They are just words, man, just words."

Jim Gifford, is married to a Japanese/American woman and I asked her once why the name was offensive. She said, "It is a dirty word like others are when referring to a person's nationality." Jack Oberschmidt would classify this as being too easily offended.

My intention in writing this article is to educate you or anyone who finds it interesting that we still call that landmark into Grand Terrace by the only name we have ever known it to have. I am not in the business of insulting people although there are times when it is an overwhelming temptation. Please do not take offense, the hill was named long before I came here 45 years ago.

Therefore, folks, I am at a loss of what else to call it. You have any suggestions?
