DEVILS DEN by Dennis Wilds

Booger walked over to the cupboard and retrieved his old 45 caliber pistol and a box of shells.

Checking the cylinder to make sure it was loaded; Booger put another ten shells in his pocket and placed the gun in his right front pocket with the butt handle showing only slightly. He then grabbed the empty crockery jug and headed out the front door of the cabin and walked up the path that led away from the farm into a stand of cotton woods on the edge of a small quarter acre pond. Natural ponds were common on the farms of southeastern Oklahoma and some of the larger ones were stocked with catfish, but Booger's pond was fouled with an oily film from ground seepage. Nothing grew in the toxic water which booger sourced for his still which sat about fifty feet from the pond among the cottonwoods. Arriving at his whisky still, Booger fired up the still and soon had the mash boiling and dripping into the crock he placed under the copper condensation line. Carefully sitting down next to the crock, Booger leaned back against one of the cotton wood trunks and began to work out his plan. The first Zundappers to go had to be those two he tangled with in Valiant. It was late afternoon and he figured they were both still in town so that was where he would head as soon as he quenched his thirst. As Booger lay there he dozed off while the drips of methanol, ethanol, and toxic hydrocarbon distillates dripped into the jug.

A peal of thunder and light rain woke Booger up after about forty five minutes and Booger noticed that the fire under the still had died down to the point that no more drips were coming out of the copper line. Grabbing the jug and swirling it, Booger

figured he had a good pint of whisky so he checked for the gun and shells in his pocket and took the jug and headed back to Valiant. The low clouds had a green cast to them and the foreboding weather matched Booger's own sullen mood.

The maelstrom dropped from the heavens of the Midwest at 5:45 PM, July 4th, 1941 over Paris, Texas. That was the time frozen on the face of the grandfather clock found wedged in the forks of a twisted and broken ancient oak tree in the Paris town square when the storms had passed. Valliant's weather event of the century began a month before with African heat swirling the waters of the tropical Atlantic creating an atmospheric depression which churned inexorably across the ocean toward the Caribbean Sea. Within three weeks, the warm waters of the Gulf of Mexico welcomed the churning tropical storm, turning it into a full blown unnamed hurricane which laid waste to Cuba and Puerto Rico before heading to the Yucatan Peninsula. Four thousand miles north in Western Canada, a frigid blanket of dense, dry air draped across the Pacific Northwest and then sagged across the Midwest on its collision course with the dying hurricane. The two massive weather systems joined in an atmospheric ionic battle which raged seven miles up in the summer sky and slowly exploded downward with blasts of wind, cold rain, hail and billion-volt electrical storms. Those with storm cellars headed down into the darkness and peeked out from the doors looking for cyclones, which is what they called tornadoes in those parts. The old folks watched with fear while the uninitiated young looked on with excitement. Livestock were left out on their own. Valliant just kept one eye peeled to the southwest and the lightning in the distance, too far away to hear its thunder yet.

What do flutes, cheeses, and space all have in common? They have holes in them. For without these holes, beautiful music, tasty sandwich fixings and time travel would not be possible. The time travel angle might be stretching it but you get the picture. So what objects do not benefit from holes? Life rafts, alibis, and more importantly, our bones! Our bones are the framework holding up our bodies and need constant replenishing from calcium, other minerals, protein, and fluids. Over time, it is common for our bones to become less dense wherein small holes appear and create problems as we age. What are the problems with porous bones and who is at risk? How do we go about preventing these issues and what other functions do our bones perform that makes it so vital that we maintain them?

Who is at risk?

- •Individuals with small skeletal structures, this unfortunately means a majority of women
- Smokers and alcoholics
- •Soda drinkers- this may be due to the high phosphorous content and caffeine, known to block calcium absorption, or simply because soda is replacing milk and fortified orange juice as the beverage of choice
- •Individuals that are not physically active
- •Everyone after a certain age as hormones decline

What problems does osteoporosis present?


•Increased risk of fractures and breaks, especially hip fractures which can also lead to pressure sores and blood clots

- •Pain when exercising and performing activities of a physical nature
- Weakened muscles
- •Decreased quality of life

Osteoporosis is sometimes called a pediatric disease with geriatric consequences. It is true there are important activities we can do to strengthen our bones at an early age so they carry us through life but there is much that can be done at any time to support our bones and slow down and even reverse the advance of osteoporosis. The recommendations for both kids and adults are not surprisingly very similar;

- •Get plenty of exercise. Playing like a kid is a great way to send signals to the bones to keep them strong. It's not too late to run around with a cape on, jump off curbs or play red light/green light.
 •If the above is not to your liking, try taking an aerobics class, training with weights or signing up for a yoga class or a walking group
- •Take in plenty of calcium. Low-fat and fat-free dairy, Calcium fortified juices and grains, soy products and leafy green vegetables. Don't forget dried spices like Thyme, Oregano, and Basil (up to 100 milligrams of calcium per three tablespoons)
- •Take a calcium supplement as recommended.
- •Drink plenty of fluids, water first.

Our skeletons not only keep us upright, they protect vital organs, link body systems to each other and produce our oxygen carrying red blood cells and the majority of our immune cells. Major fractures later in life can cause immune system compromise and leave us susceptible to opportunistic infections. Keep your skeleton young and your body will follow suit, it is never too late to give our bodies the gift of caring for our bones.







4 arrested in Highgrove Burglary





On April 8, 2013, at 2:14 A.M., deputies assigned to the Riverside County Sheriff's Jurupa Valley Station responded to a burglary-in-progress. The burglary was reported at a storage facility in the 300 block of Iowa Avenue in the unincorporated area of Riverside County, known as Highgrove. The reporting party witnessed four suspects cutting the locks off of several storage units. The reporting party also indicated one of the suspects was holding a long rifle.

Deputies immediately arrived on scene and set up a perimeter. Two suspects were quickly apprehended without incident. A third suspect, who was later identified as Jeffrey Taylor (22 years old of San Bernardino), fled on foot. During the foot pursuit, an officer involved shooting occurred near Iowa Avenue and Center Street. The suspect once again fled on foot, evading apprehension by the deputies on scene. Deputies continued to search the area, with the aid of a Sheriff's K-9.

Thompson was later located hiding underneath a vehicle by Sheriff's K-9, and taken into custody. Prior to booking, Thompson was transported to a nearby hospital where he was treated for minor injuries. The fourth suspect was later found hiding at the storage facility by the Sheriff's K-9.

The additional suspects were later identified as Troy Sanders (22 years old of San Bernardino), Ryan Haynie (26 years old of San Bernardino), and an adult female who has not yet been positively identified.

Jurupa Valley Station investigators along with investigators from the Riverside County Sheriff's Central Homicide Unit responded to the scene and assumed the investigation.

Per department policy the officer was placed on paid administrative leave pending outcome of the investigation. No deputies were injured.

Should You Take a Pension **Buyout?**

Have you recently received a pension buyout offer? If so, you need to decide if you should take the buyout, which could provide you with a potentially large lump sum, or continue accepting your regular pension payments for the rest of your life. It's a big decision. Clearly, there's no "one size fits all" answer — your choice needs to be based on your individual circumstances. So, as you weigh your options, you'll need to consider a variety of key issues, including the following:

- Estate considerations Your pension payments generally end when you and/or your spouse dies, which means your children will get none of the money. But if you were to roll the lump sum into an Individual Retirement Account (IRA), and you don't exhaust it in your lifetime, you could still have something to leave to your family members.
- Taxes If you take the lump sum and roll the funds into your IRA, you control how much you'll be taxed and when, based on the amounts you choose to withdraw and the date you begin taking withdrawals. (Keep in mind, though, that you must start taking a designated minimum amount of withdrawals from a traditional IRA when you reach age 70½. Withdrawals taken before age 59½ are subject to taxes and penalties.) But if you take a pension, you may have less control over your income taxes, which will be based on your monthly payments. • Inflation — You could easily spend two or three decades in retirement — and during that time, inflation can really add up. To cite just one example, the average cost of a new car was \$7,983 in 1982; 30 years later, that figure is \$30,748, according to TrueCar.com. If your pension checks aren't indexed for inflation, they will

lose purchasing power over time. If you rolled over your lump sum into an IRA, however, you could put the money into investments offering growth potential, keeping in mind, of course, that there are no guarantees.

- Cash flow If you're already receiving a monthly pension, and you're spending every dollar you receive just to meet your living expenses, you may be better off by keeping your pension payments intact. If you took the lump sum and converted it into an IRA, you can withdraw whatever amount you want (as long as you meet the required minimum distributions), but you'll have to avoid withdrawing so much that you'll eventually run out of money.
- Confidence in future pension payments — From time to time, companies are forced to reduce their pension obligations due to unforeseen circumstances. You may want to take this into account as you decide whether to continue taking your monthly pension payments, but it's an issue over which you have no control. On the other hand, once your lump sum is in an IRA, you have control over both the quality and diversification of your investment dollars. However, the trade-off is that investing is subject to various risks, including loss of

Before selecting either the lump sum or the monthly pension payments, weigh all the factors carefully to make sure your decision fits into your overall financial strategy. With a choice of this importance, you will probably want to consult with your financial and tax advisors. Ultimately, you may find that this type of offer presents you with a great opportunity — so take the time to consider your options.


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California Dreaming by Dr. Cynthia Williams

Being a transplanted native Californian I am suffering from shock just like my plants. I miss Highgrove and all my family and friends! I moved to central Oregon a little over two years ago and it is nothing like Highgrove. I knew the change would be dramatic- this little city has about 80,000 people, hundreds, if not thousands, of wild deer, and more dogs per capita that any place I've ever been. It is another planet compared to California. Let me share with you my journey.

The calendar says it's Spring; I don't believe it as it was 25 degrees this morning. The deer have come back into town with their toddlers from last year. They are a bit thin from their long winter and they spend most of their time nibbling on the buds of the bushes and the fresh grass shoots. I share carrots and apples with them. A few have been in our neighborhood for many years and are accustomed to us. Some are tame enough to walk up and eat out of my hand. It's a breath-taking experience. I never get tired of seeing them in the yard.

With the weather beginning to warm up the Canadian geese have come back. There are hundreds around town; by the river, on the greening lawns, flying overhead. They are big honkers too! They fly overhead squawking and honking,

swoop down and land in parking lots, blocking driveways, and doing what birds do, fly, honk, eat and the rest... They can really leave quite a mess on the walkways!

The garden shops have the little pots of herbs, vegetables, and annuals. I saw them, got all giddy, and bought a few. Which was a wildly optimistic thing to do as it is too cold to set them out. A lot of people have greenhouses and cold frames, however not all people use their greenhouses for growing vegetables. Some use them to grow "medical marijuana" which is a legal activity here in Oregon. When I took my Master Gardener training years ago I didn't learn anything about growing marijuana so I stick with what I know.

I haven't forgotten how hot it gets down there. By the first of June I would be getting ready to put my garden away for the hellishly hot summer, have the pool cover off and filling the propane tank for the BBQ. 
Our area includes some of the finest Mexican restaurants in the country. We have the famous Mission Inn, and food festivals in most every city in the area.
