Vehicle shears off power pole on Center Street



On Aug. 20, 2009 at about 6:30am this eastbound vehicle struck a power pole on the north side of Center St and sheared the pole off at its base and left the pole hanging by the overhead wires. We received a call from Don Ritz, owner of Fair Price Carpet and arrived at about the same time as the Highgrove Fire Station # 19 truck. The lone occupant, Patrick Ridge age 31, was sitting on the curb on the south side of the Center street. Tony Cluchey stopped and helped Patrick to the south side of the street to a safe place away from the power lines. Patrick was on his way home from his night shift at the Big Lots Warehouse in Rancho Cucamonga and was only a few blocks from his home in Highgrove. He was transported to Loma Linda Hospital where he was evaluated for his injuries. The vehicle is a 2001 Honda Civic and has extensive front end damage. The cause of the accident was attributed to the driver possibly falling asleep. His shift is from 10:00 pm to 6:00 am and he usually watches their children when he gets home in the morning when his wife goes to work. (cont. on P. 12)

Vehicle fire reported at 1:30am Aug.20th on Palmer Avenue.



Early Friday morning at 1:30 am a pick-up truck parked at a residence on Palmer St. near Iowa Ave. may have been firebombed. Two men reported witnessing a black car drive onto Palmer St. who were yelling at the house as they threw a bottle which allegedly contained gasoline, because the truck caught on fire. The neighbors woke up & and put water on the cab of the truck and the house. Shortly thereafter, the fire department arrived and put the blaze out. The occupant of the house thought he may have started the fire himself from his cigar, but the fire dept. reminded him that two witnesses saw the fire start when the occupants of the car threw something at the truck. Costs of Perris Valley Line Metrolink now estimated at \$220 Million Dollars

Existing Commuter trains between Riverside and San Bernardino will still not stop in Highgrove, under RCTC's plan.

I received a letter from Riverside County Transportation Commission's Deputy Executive Director, John Standiford dated Aug. 19, 2009 in response to my letter of Aug. 11, 2009 asking about the costs associated with developing the Perris Valley Line. The previous estimate was \$168 Million Dollars but has now increased to \$220 Million Dollars.


Part of Mr. Standiford's letter states:

"Also included in that cost is work currently being conducted to complete needed environmental analyses, which will be finalized in the later part of 2010."

Many of you already know that the RCTC plan does not include a station stop in Highgrove where existing commuter trains pass by 7 days a week between Riverside and San Bernardino.

RCTC has to have the 19 acre property to connect the 2 railroads and we have advocated building a station stop on the west side of this same property to serve 3 destinations: Riverside, San Bernardino and Perris.

CHP WARNS MOTORISTS

NOT TO LEAVE KIDS ALONE IN CARS

Purple ribbons to fly from patrol car antennas

(Sacramento) The California Highway Patrol (CHP) reminds motorists the summer heat can quickly create deadly conditions inside a vehicle, especially for children.

"As a driver, you are responsible for the safety of your passengers both while the vehicle is running and when it is parked," said CHP Commissioner Joe Farrow. "Carelessness, can lead to tragedy."

Research by the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA) in 2007 showed that for children hyperthermia (heat-stroke) is the leading cause of non-crash vehicle deaths. Every year in the United States, an average of 27 children die as a result of hyperthermia or excessive heat while in a vehicle.

"If you see a child unattended in a vehicle call 911 immediately," said Commissioner Farrow. "Not only is leaving a child in a vehicle unattended dangerous, under California law it is illegal."

On January 1, 2002, the Unattended Child in Motor Vehicle Safety Act, took effect. The law became known as "Kaitlyn's Law" in memory of 6-month-old Kaitlyn Russell, of Corona, who died August 15, 2000, after being left alone in her babysitter's car for about two hours.

"Kaitlyn's Law" makes it an infraction, punishable by a fine of \$100 for any parent, legal guardian, or other person responsible for a child 6 years of age or younger, to leave that child unattended in a vehicle without the supervision of someone at least 12 years of age or older.

The national, non-profit organization, 4 R Kids Sake, has designated August as "Purple Ribbon Month," to raise awareness and educate the public about the dangers of leaving a child unattended in or around a motor vehicle. In recognition of "Purple Ribbon Month," the CHP will attach a purple ribbon to the antenna of its patrol cars.

"Hopefully by focusing attention on this issue, we can prevent the senseless loss of innocent lives in the future," added Commissioner Farrow.


1952 Tehachapi Earthquake



Tehachapi is known for its 7.5 earthquake that shook the area at 4:52 am on July 21, 1952 that resulted in extensive property damage and killed 11 people.

Tehachapi "Loop"



Tehachapi is also known for its railroad "Loop" that was built from 1874-1876 that is a track in a circle that makes a train loop back over its self as it goes up the steep grade. (Above 3 Photos by R. A. Barnett were stitched together by Ardie).

This is an aerial view of the "Tehachapi Loop" taken off of the internet.

TEHACHAPI PASS RAILROAD LINE, CONSTRUCTED 1874-1876
(Portions of text taken from monument)

Shown above is the world famous Tehachapi Loop which is about halfway upgrade to the tehachapi Pass. This steep line averages 2.2% in gradient in its 28 miles of length. This feat of civil engineering genius was the crowning achievement of civil engineer William Hood of the Southern Pacific Railroad. The Tehachapi Pass Railroad Line was cut through solid and decomposed granite by up to 3000 Chinese laborers from Canton, China. They used picks, shovels, horse drawn carts and blasting powder. This line, which climbs out of the San Joaquin Valley and through the Tehachapi Mountains had 18 tunnels, 10 bridges and numerous water towers for the old steam locomotives. It was completed in less than 2 years time and is one of the seven wonders of the railroad world. This line was part of the last and final link of the first railroad line connecting San Francisco to Los Angeles. It was a primary factor in the early growth of the City of Los Angeles and the State of California.



Tehachapi



This historical building called the **Errea House** is now located across the street from the museum in Tehachapi. In 1900 it was moved 4 miles on rolling logs when the Southern Pacific Railroad decided to make their station in another location. This house is the only surviving structure from the old part of town.



We watched the parade with this beautiful mural on the building in the background. There are several beautiful murals in this fine city. The "Marshal" drove this Model T with his prisoners in the back and there were 65 entries in the parade. This small desert town of approximately 7,000 people has a lot of spirit!



Twenty Mule Teams hauled 10 ton loads of borax ore 165 miles from Death Valley to Mojave from 1883 to 1889 in heat that reached 130 degrees.

Boron



Barbara Pratt, 89, the curator at the Twenty Mule Team Museum in Boron, is shown standing in front of one of the displays. I bought a copy of her book "Around Boron" and she autographed it for me. She has lived in Boron since 1932 and has been the director of the museum for over 10 years.

Boron is the 5th element on the periodic table and combines with other nonmetallic minerals to form a family of related minerals called borates.

In 1938 a large deposit of borax was discovered and the town name was changed from Amargo to Boron. She gave me a 7 page list of 171 different things made from borate. Today, I still use Boraxo powdered hand soap which was the first ever to combine borax and soap. Borate is contained in other products such as Anti-freeze, cosmetics, dyes, eyewash, fire extinguishers, glue, ink, matches, paint, shampoo, starch, wallboard, waxes and welding rods.

DEVILS DEN

The following story is of Devils Den and its denizens. Mostly true, if not at least based on fact, my accounts of labor camp life in the 1950's come out of my memory of family and friends and acquaintance from that place in time. Devils Den was a former military training camp in the San Joaquin Valley of California. South Lake Farms converted it into a farm labor camp to serve the cotton farming interests which controlled the area. This remote outpost had no public services or schools leaving the residents unsupervised and uncounted by most measures. We had a camp boss to settle disputes and that was the law. The landowners paid the labor contractor and he paid us monthly. We had a small store, but Avenal and Kettleman City had the gas and Smart and Final. I joke now that I was raised by coyotes since most days I saw more of them than people. I was raised also to be not seen and not heard. So, I kept my mouth shut and stayed out of the way in those years and the following chapters are what I saw in Devils Den.

The Puerto Rican

It happened this way. Must have

been winter because it was cold and raining and the steps up into the cook house had a big mudhole on each side. The fight started inside by the juke box and the two men soon tumbled outside and down the four steps into the mud. Initially my point of view was from the top of the steps leading into the dining area of the two story barrack building. Of the ten or so identical two story buildings, our cookhouse was painted green and this side entrance was for the workers who paid for three meals a day. The dining area was separated from our living quarters by the kitchen where I spent most of my day. Around the corner to the back of the barracks there was a stairs to a second level of apartments. Everything was made of wood and of Spartan design. The decor was dirt and dust and bare light bulbs and tonight it just smelled like fresh mud. I don't remember who the combatants were since itinerant men came and went in the camps so often. Some were Korean War vets and some were drunks and some were likely both. But this cool night these two anonymous fighters decided to fight over some private matter never to be revealed to this seven year old. Now I had seen kids fight and dogs fight and some wrestling

matches before but this level of violence beat anything I had seen before or since. This was a fight to the death. In my mind the good guy was an African American who I have never known to cause trouble in the camp. The bad guy was new to me and they said he was a Puerto Rican. They were likely in their late twenties and able bodied and quick and strong as hell. By the time I and the crowd followed them down the steps into the yard they were slugging it out and connecting. The crowd was mostly quiet and non interfering, and like me, keeping a good distance away. Within a few minutes the African American was tiring and went down but the Puerto Rican kept at him and the real beating had begun. I knew I was seeing something really bad happen but no one was moving to stop the fight. Both men were bloody and covered with mud and the bad guy was not letting up. To this day I think the African American would have died if

my cousin, Woodward, the camp boss had not pulled up in his truck. At over six feet and two hundred pounds this big Okie waded in and pulled the Puerto Rican off the defenseless victim only to have the Puerto Rican connect a fist to Woodward's head. This led to round two with Woodward having his hands full with the tired yet still strong assailant. This phase of the fight took another two or three minutes with more punches and slips and misses. This is when I got scared for the first time because it looked like even the fresh Woodward might lose to the bad guy. I began to think of what would happen then. The Puerto Rican was murderous and it became a fight for life in my eyes. Both men were down on their knees in mud and still swinging and it was bloody and the crowd was quiet and scared too.

I recently hosted a culinary demonstration at the college for a group of 6th grade kids and had a chance to share some nutrition information with them and their adult teachers and parents. The adults were stunned to learn the nutritional facts about ranch dressing and you might be too.

Let's look at the raw nutritional information:

Two fluid ounces which is four tablespoons, contains 175 calories, 134 calories from fat; 15grams of fat of which 2 grams are saturated fat, and 534mg of sodium.* Most restaurant salad bar dressing scoops are two ounces. Many guests will use two and three scoops on their salads. Restaurant servers will deliver a salad swimming in dressing as well. Many more consumers will use two to four ounces of additional dressing to dip their pizza. Kids will use one to two ounces (or more!) to dip their

French fries. In comparison, ketchup is fat free and very low in calories. One ounce has 40 calories, all from sugar; however it does not deliver the calorie knockout or the fat of ranch dressing and other fat-based dressings. Another comparison- a six-inch banana has 70 calories. While a banana or some ketchup is no substitute for salad dressing, it does give you some idea of the calorie load for these foods.

How do you make a change in your family to reduce the fat? I advocate having no French fries, no ranch dressing, and absolutely no dipping pizza into anything! When dining out it is important to be the parent and simply not allow ranch or other fat based dressings. This is not a popular position and my students tell me they and their families love, love, love ranch dressing. We have talked about ways to reduce the fat and increase the nutrition value of this favorite condiment. There is no nutrition in these dressings and they should not be considered part of an adult or child's meal. At home you have more control over the nutrition content.

The traditional method of mixing ranch dressing at home is to use one packet of dressing mix, one cup of whole milk and one cup of mayonnaise. This works out to 125 calories per tablespoon or 250 calories per ounce! Using a packet of ranch dressing seasoning mix and 2 cups of plain yogurt will give you a tangy, smooth dressing that will have the nutritional benefits your family needs. One cup of mayonnaise has 1,440 calories and one cup of plain whole milk yogurt has 149 calories! That is one-tenth the calories and a tiny fraction of the fat of mayonnaise. If you use skim or fat-free yogurt obviously you will further reduce the fat content of the dressing.

The dry dressing mix is loaded with 130mg of sodium, flavorings, seasonings and additives. (Ingredients:

Maltodextrin, Salt, Monosodium Glutamate, Buttermilk Solids, Whey Solids, Garlic, Onion, Lactic Acid, Modified Food Starch, Spices, Citric Acid, Calcium Lactate, Casein, Hydroxypropyl Methylcellulose, Whole Milk Solids, Artificial Flavor, Guar gum, Calcium Stearate.)** You can prepare ranch dressing using your own seasonings and reducing the overall sodium content and increase the flavor!

- 2 cups plain yogurt (whole, skim or fat-free)
- 1-1/2 teaspoons lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon paprika
- 1/2 teaspoon deli mustard
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon black pepper
- 2-3 Tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 1 Tablespoon chopped fresh chives
- 1 teaspoon of dry dill (or a tablespoon chopped fresh)

Stir together the yogurt and the other ingredients until fully mixed. Adjusting for taste. Makes about 2 cups. Keeps for a week, covered in the fridge.

You will find that once you get used to the fresh taste of homemade ranch dressing, you will not want the bottled kind again.

Some foods pack a lot of calories in a small bite- not just the candies and

cookies. Become familiar with the calorie count of your favorite foods and your favorite portions! An excellent web site for learning what nutritional value your favorite foods have is: <http://www.nutritiondata.com/>

Getting your family to give up the bottled ranch dressing cold-turkey may be difficult. I advised my students to start with blending the old flavor with the new and gradually over a period of a week or two make the shift to the healthier kind. Oh- and keep it your little secret!

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

My letter asked what the estimated cost is for the 19 acres, and estimated cost for purchasing additional property at Palmyrita Ave., Columbia Ave., or Marlborough Ave. and how many acres will be needed.

Mr. Standiford responded: "The actual amount of land and purchase price will be negotiated and we are not in a position to publicly disclose details regarding the negotiations. As requested in your letter, we can and will inform you of all details once a transaction is made" He also stated RCTC would need approximately 10 acres for a station site.

Document challenges RCTC's station location choices!

RCTC has decided that a Metrolink station should be located where there are no commuter trains and not 1/2 mile away where there are commuter trains 7 days a week. And RCTC is seeking Federal Tax Money for their biased transportation plan that will only operate trains between Riverside and Perris.

I have prepared a 10 page document with photographs that challenges the 13 reasons given by RCTC and their engineers why they can not build a station in Highgrove.

It is my firm belief that the engineering company that was hired by RCTC was chosen to support what

RCTC wants to do and that goal is not in the best interest of the tax paying public.


This is your and my Federal Tax Money and that money should benefit the entire region. The document I have prepared takes each one of their reasons and examines its validity. In my opinion, most of their reasons have no merit. RCTC is now required to do a complete Environmental Impact Report due to public concerns about this project. They previously were going to proceed over the objections of many of the residents along the Perris Valley Line track. However, their change in policy was not due to public input and the change in direction from going over the Union Pacific Line at Marlborough Ave. was made because the Federal Transit Administration stated that the cost of the PVL was too much money! RCTC found out it was several million dollars cheaper to come to Highgrove instead of turning onto the UPRR track at Marlborough.

Our document will be presented to Senators, Boxer and Feinstein and the Federal Transit Administration when it is ready for distribution. But we need a Civil Engineer to look at RCTC's reasons for denial of the Highgrove station, including costs of purchasing unneeded property, and compare that with common sense, logic and cost, that would put a station in Highgrove where commuter trains already exist.

WHEN IS SOMEONE GOING TO FIX IT?

Did you ever see it to fail: Just when you think something is just about perfect you discover a flaw that no one expected, one that seems insurmountable and is a very, very disgusting puzzle.

What am I talking about? Our new Senior Center. This is a beautiful building with very classy appointments, artistic designs and decorations, lots of space for activities, lunch, etc. And one of the best additions that the old center only dreamed of a kitchen with every device and appliance known to modern kitchenry.

But that is where we draw the line for compliments to the builders. They blew their reputation and did it with a bang. They forgot to put drains in the kitchen so that everything would work. For example, the two beautiful dishwashers are totally inoperable because there is nowhere the waste water can go. No drains. Can you imagine what in the name of common sense was the contractor doing when he left these drains out?


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

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
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
