New Chevron station is an asset to Highgrove community!
Grand opening set for Sept. 30, 2011.



After a long delay the new Chevron gas station on the south west corner of Center St. and Iowa Ave. opened for business on Aug. 10, 2011. This location was a former gas station back in the late 50's owned by the late Bob Shearer. The property was vacant for a long time and the soil was contaminated from the leakage of the previous station. The property was ventilated for 4 ½ years to remove the remaining traces of contamination to permit building a similar business on the same site. The elimination of the Center St. Tire Company on this same corner was also an improvement to this major intersection.

This is a great improvement to Highgrove's entrance from the nearby I-215 freeway. There are 12 gas pumps at the new Chevron station and they will be open 24 hours. The "Extra Mile" store inside has cold drinks at their Hydra Zone, Cappuccino, Van Houtte flavored coffee with "a taste of Europe in your cup" hot food and snacks. There is also an inside ATM machine for your convenience. Next door in the same building, final preparations are being made for the

Subway sandwich shop that will open soon.

Ardie and I prepared a CD of 114 photographs that I have taken over the years of this corner that includes the old Center St. Tire Co., photos of the new tanks being placed into the ground and other construction photos so a slide show can be shown at the grand opening on Sept. 30, 2011.

Some of you may remember that there was another gas station on the north east corner of this same intersection where Fix It Right Auto Repair is now located. It was either a Chevron station or a Standard Oil station owned by Ed Colvin. My high school pals Ron McHenry and Pat Timmons worked at Ed Colvin's station but even though I was there a lot, I never actually worked there. Ron McHenry lived at 1260 Center St. with his mom, Dad and Terry, Ron's younger brother. But since 1967, the former residence at 1260 Center St. has been occupied by the business known as Wilson's Frame Up. Wilsons Frame Up has been located at 1260 Center St. for

Aug. 24, 2011 will be remembered as an important day in the history of Grand Terrace. There was a preliminary celebration the previous evening that was well attended but the next morning all of the parking spaces were filled and parking overflowed onto the local streets. This project created 200 construc-



Lawsuit filed against Metrolink!

On Tuesday Aug. 23, 2011 the Friends of Riverside Hills which is an organization located near UCR filed a lawsuit in the Riverside Superior Court hoping to halt the Perris Valley Line project until their environmental concerns are addressed in regards to the proposed commuter trains that are planned between Riverside, and Perris. This is the same track that runs through Highgrove where surrounding communities have wanted a station for the last 10 years.

The lawsuit claims that the Riverside County Transportation Commission (RCTC) did not fully address the environmental impact the Perris Valley Line would have through their neighborhood.

The lawsuit also challenged other data that they considered outdated or incorrect. They said the projected ridership figures were "inflated" to show more ridership on the Perris Valley Line and the bus ridership figures were "decreased" to show inaccurate figures of expected riders that would use busses.

The practice of using "inflated" and "decreased" figures by the Riverside County Transportation Commission is not new to RCTC, the agency named in the lawsuit.

Eric Haley was the Executive Director of RCTC in Jan. of 2007. I wrote an article explaining what Eric Haley did on Jan. 10, 2007 that appeared In the February 2007 issue of the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper. Here is a portion of that article:

"The RCTC staff inflated the Highgrove location costs by improperly attaching the multi-million dollar Colton flyover costs to the Highgrove site and deflated the ridership projections through inaccurate estimates. They said the Highgrove Station would cost \$157 million dollars for only 117 riders per day."

We knew that these figures were wrong when they were made by Mr. Haley over 4 ½ years ago.

The deadline for the construction bids to be submitted for the Colton flyover is in just a few days on Sept. 7, 2011. This proves that the placement of a Metrolink station at Highgrove has no bearing on the Colton flyover and vice versa. And no written verification of the 107 passengers per day ridership figures from 2007 has ever been presented. except verbally by Mr. Haley.

Years ago, Mr. Haley refused to consider our suggestions to buy the 35 acres of vacant land for a Highgrove station and referred to the Highgrove purchase as "Land banking" and stated it was "too close to the County Line and residents from San Bernardino County would be using the station".

RCTC just paid \$8,625,000 for the 17.22 acres on the north side of the 35 acres but they were only able to buy 17.22 acres because 2 giant warehouses have been built on the

south side of the arroyo along Citrus Street. Somehow Mr. Haley's opposition to "Land banking" years ago seems to have been an unwise decision because RCTC recently had to buy ½ of this same property at over 8 ½ million dollars!

The only part of his statement that is correct is the part about "residents from San Bernardino County would be using the station".

On July 25, 2011 I submitted a 3rd letter of support to RCTC for the Highgrove station from the Mayor of Grand Terrace, Walt Stanckiewitz. The first letter from Grand Terrace supporting the Highgrove location was on December 13, 2001.

Much of the above information can be verified on our web site: www.highgrovehappenings.net by clicking on Supporting Docs, Highgrove Happenings articles from 2001 to 2009, and scrolling down to Feb. 2007 for the quotes about the inflated cost figures and deflated ridership figures; then scroll down to the Oct. 2007 issue that has additional complaints against RCTC under WHO IS RESPONSIBLE items (a) through (j).

Additional biased information from RCTC can be found on the Highgrove website by clicking on "Metrolink" then "13 Reasons" that contains RCTC's reasons why a Metrolink station can't be built at Highgrove. The list was made by STV who is the consultant hired by RCTC to come up with reasons opposing the Highgrove location. Immediately following their list, is my response that is based on information from our Civil Engineer who has over 54 years of experience and volunteered his time because he saw the discrepancies in the STV report. RCTC rejected the information we presented at a special meeting where we were outnumbered 2 to 1. RCTC had 20 members present and it was just me and my volunteer Civil Engineer against the RCTC committee.

Evidently there are additional organizations that are tired of RCTC's arrogance toward the public by ignoring the common sense requests from the people. I find it interesting that on the same day the lawsuit was filed, I was in Riverside at a meeting with SCAG, (Southern California Association of Governments) in regard to getting support for a "Regional" Metrolink station on the unused portion of the same 17.22 acres owned by RCTC.

RCTC only needs the width of a curved track to connect the Perris Valley Line track to the BNSF railroad track but the remaining portion of the 17.22 acres could be used for a parking lot for the existing Metrolink trains between San Bernardino and Riverside that would benefit the whole region and enhance SCAG's Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). After my meeting with SCAG, copies of the letters, maps and a CD were taken to RCTC where they were submitted. Cont. on P. 5



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

Ref.: Comments about Metrolink station location

RCTC Commissioners,

The 17.22 acres purchased at Highgrove by RCTC to connect the Perris Valley Line to the # 3 BNSF main line will enable future Metrolink trains to travel from Riverside to Highgrove and go around the new proposed curve onto the Perris Valley Line with a future Metrolink station at Marlborough Avenue. The width of the curved track will only take up a small portion of the 17.22 acres. The remaining portion of this same property could be used for a parking lot and station platform to enhance the Southern California Association of Government's Regional Transportation Plan (RTP).

The grading for RCTC's curved track and the regional parking lot/station could be done at the same time allowing one piece of property to serve two different transportation purposes. RCTC would get the connection from the BNSF railroad to the Perris Valley Line railroad via the curved track without having to stop at Highgrove, and the public, on both sides of the county line, would get a station at Highgrove that has been requested for the last 10 years using the existing trains between the two counties. This vacant 17.22 acre property is unique because it has railroads on both sides and could be used for commuter rail service in 3 different directions- Riverside, San Bernardino and Perris.

Asking SCAG and Metrolink to be involved in the planning and grading stages of this property is important because the destinations are different between the Marlborough Ave. location and the Highgrove location. The Marlborough Ave. location, or any other station that is planned along the Perris Valley Line, will not provide any commuter train service between Perris and San Bernardino. And a station at Marlborough Ave. will not stop any of the existing Metrolink commuter trains that go through Highgrove 7 days a week between San Bernardino County and Riverside County.

The Highgrove station already has existing Metrolink trains between San Bernardino and Riverside and the deadline for bids for the Colton flyover construction are due on Sept. 7, 2011 that will allow additional future commuter trains on the (I.E.O.C.) line that goes through Highgrove. But these future trains will still not be accessible because the Marlborough Ave. station is located on another railroad one mile away from the BNSF main line where there are Metrolink trains.

Cooperation is needed between RCTC, SANBAG, SCAG and Metrolink because this important project involves State, Federal, and local transportation tax dollars. This proposal will benefit both RCTC and the entire region in both counties. Please give this proposal serious consideration for the benefit of all parties.





RCTC just spent over 8 1/2 million dollars so they can build a curved track to connect their Perris Valley Line RR track to the BNSF track at Highgrove shown in the shaded area. Since RCTC only needs the width of a track, the unused shaded area would be an ideal location for Metrolink parking that would benefit the entire region by using the existing trains between the 2 counties. RCTC has fought placing a station at the X for 10 years where there are existing Metrolink trains 7 days a week. Instead they are now in escrow to buy another 9.75 acres one mile away on the Perris Valley Line RR on the N/W corner at Marlborough Avenue. RCTC will not reveal the cost of the Marlborough property but our Federal, State, and Transportation tax dollars are also involved in this unnecessary purchase.





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
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DEVILS DEN

Now if you know my stories you know they are mostly about people I have known or learned about from my folks. Some of these were good people and some not so good. But every now and then I have brushed with greatness and, hands down, I'm telling you now that Candido Rio Seco stands alone at the top of the pile when it comes down to integrity and honor. I'm going to say that Candido is the greatest little man, or any size man I have ever known and you can put that in your pipe and smoke it. To get to know Candido was a learning experience in patience, perseverance and a serious style of confident humor. He spoke Calo', something like Spanglish with ancient Spanish and Indian mixed in and he continued to expand his vocabulary every day as he worked on the train tracks as a Trajero on his way from Ciudad Juarez thru El Chuco or El Paso as he headed northwest thru Texas toward the Oklahoma panhandle. He was, in short, the original Pachuco and he had little or no intention of staying very long in Oklahoma. It was winter and he had to hole up somewhere til the spring planting season when he would follow the crops west toward California. His highway was the railway these days but for shelter and food, Candido figured he could help Brother Roy finish clearing some of the homestead for the next three or four months. By spring, the two had cleared a well drained twenty acre plot for corn and cotton but Candido took it on himself to fence off a small truck garden near the banks of Buzzard Creek where he planted a few seeds of a mysterious plant that his grandmother, an Indian Cunandera

or herbalist healer, had given him. Candido convinced Roy to expand his milling business to include an ethanol still and by midsummer Roy was selling fence posts, railroad ties, milled hardwood, and small amounts of medicinal ethanol to the locals in Valiant and Idabel. By late summer Candido harvested some of his special herbs and introduced Brother Roy to the medicinal aspects of one herb in particular, the one grown from his grandmother's seeds. This could be smoked in a pipe or consumed in cornbread inducing a curious state of relaxation. Brother Roy named it "Relaxol" (patent pending) and added it to the products he marketed in town.

Relaxol, more than ethanol, created more interest in the Zundappe compound and gradually a few travelers found their way to Buzzard Creek. By summer's end Roy had a good fifteen or so converts living and working on his homestead milling lumber and working the cotton and corn. There was Baby Myrtle, Candido, Eldridge, and Timmy the sniffer in the beginning. Each new convert was issued a six foot cotton sack of their wear with neck and arm holes. On the backs of the sacks Roy marked one large "X", the purpose of which was a reminder that as a Zundapper you had a new identity and a new future. The gates to the Zundappe compound were two large timber X's planted in the red clay dirt. As a Zundapper you were encouraged to work hard and abstain from lying or untruthful practices. Roy taught that a person was only as good as his word and his work ethic. Now it sounded simple but so many of his new students were damaged goods and human flotsam and they carried their own psychological baggage with them from their old lives. Their stay in Buzzard Creek would often be

mentally and physically therapeutic, allowing them to leave as healed and changed charismatics, more prepared for the world than when they arrived. That's how it worked out for Myrtle anyway.

Myrlte in the Bushes

From where Myrtle sat on her bale of hay she dispassionately watched the parade of Okies, mostly grown men and a few women, shuffle by on the other side of the rusty bars gawking and laughing and insinuating at her. The crowd of idiots amused her as much as she amused them. If only they knew what she knew, boy howdy they would be surprised. She had her secret and their one thin dime didn't come close to buying it today or tomorrow when she would have left Valiant to perform in Idabel. To them Myrtle was billed as a wild woman, a Catahoula Cajun Cutie from Bayou Larouche, Louisiana. Her boss gave her the coconut brassiere and the grass skirt but the alligator leather pumps were hers and she languidly reclined and pouted wearing the hemp colored coarse wig and red lipstick and rouge, batting her eyes at the young boys who were the most gullible. Myrtle was as mixed a metaphor as they came and she could smell the tiger odor that lingered from the last occupant of the carnival cage wagon she performed in nowadays. Yep, it had come down to working for a travelling carnival in Southeastern Oklahoma and little Richard Simonde wondered how it had all come to this. He was a he/she with no home or promise of a better life, pretending to be an aboriginal female captured down in Louisiana running with the Louisiana Leopard Dogs in Catahoula Parish.

Richard was a woman in a man's body and he was ok with that if only everyone else would just leave him alone. Small and wiry, he made a

This brought Richard to her feet on top of her bale and she knew she was in trouble with Woodford squeezing sideways thru the space in the bars bringing him side to side with his little brother Igard. Now what actually happened next no one really knows exactly because all three participants gave different stories to Sherriff Irons later on. When the screaming, hair snatching, kicking

and mayhem ended Igard had the coconuts and Woodford had a broken nose and Myrtle had lost her red wig and her secrets. Uncle Waldo, the sheriff declared the event a minor altercation and sent the Baker boys back toward Polecat Creek and Myrtle opted not to press the matter and left on his own in the opposite direction with all of his belongings in a floral carped bag. This time the new Grand Terrace High School suffered a loss estimated at between \$80,000 dollars and \$125,000 dollars when thieves stole similar equipment on the week-end of Aug 12, 2011 in spite of having 2 security guards on the property.

On Aug. 17, 2011 according to the Press Enterprise, 2 Jurupa Valley men were arrested for breaking into a commercial building to steal copper tubing from a refrigeration cooling room. But then again on Aug. 27th the Press-Enterprise reported that a 14 year old girl in San Jacinto fell into an opening in a sidewalk and broke her leg from a missing man hole cover. Another article on the same day was about thieves who took copper wire from an Edison sub station that resulted in a power outage for 25,000 customers in Fontana, Rialto and Lytle Creek that left them without power to run fans or air conditioners during this extremely hot weather. 


You may be driving near this canal every day without realizing it. This location goes back to 1949! Cars are shown in the picture on the right.








Colton's deceased mayor replaced by widow

Reinvesting Dividends Can Pay Off

When you invest in stocks, you want their price to go up. But of course, you can't control the rise and fall of stock prices. What are the implications of this disparity between the effectiveness of dividend reinvestment versus that of capital gains? First of all, it suggests that you may not want to spend an undue amount of time and effort in chasing after "hot" stocks, hoping for big capital gains. For one thing, by the time you buy these stocks, they may already be cooling off, but even more importantly, your focus on achieving large capital gains may not be the best use of your financial resources.

Ultimately, the power of dividend reinvestment means, not surprisingly, that you may be able to help yourself if you look for quality dividend-paying stocks — and then reinvest the dividends, month after month and year after year.

With just a little research, you can find stocks that have paid — and even increased — dividends for many years in a row. (Keep in mind, though, that not all stocks will pay dividends, and even those that do can reduce or discontinue them at any time. Dividend reinvestment does not ensure a profit or protect against loss.) So, to help boost your share ownership, consider reinvest-

ing the dividends back into the stock, rather than taking them as cash payments.
