### Quest for Highgrove Metrolink continues...

## (1) Southern California Transportation & Logistics Summit

On March 9, 2012 I attended the Southern California Transportation & Logistics Summit at the Doubletree Hotel in Ontario. At that meeting I was able to speak with California State Assemblyman Mike Morrell, the Executive Director of the Southern California Association of Governments, Hasan Ikhrata, and Marnie O'brien Primmer who is the Executive Director of Mobility 21 that is the transportation agency

that represents Riverside County, San Bernardino County, Los Angeles County, Ventura County and San Diego County.

The reason for my continued attendance at these and other meetings is to let everyone know that the excess property owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission at Highgrove should be used for a Metrolink station that will benefit commuters between Riverside and San Bernardino County.

## Emergency team responds to Environmental spill in Springbrook wash!



On Wed. Mar. 14, 2012 we received a call from concerned High-grove residents relating to Haz-Mat equipment in the Springbrook wash between Highgrove and Riverside. The residents at the south end of Swayzee Court in Highgrove said that a hazardous spill had allegedly occurred from the CarbonLITE plastic recycling plant on the south side of the arroyo.

CarbonLITE just had their grand opening that included Governor Jerry Brown, Mayor Ron Loveridge, Supervisor Bob Buster and the U.S. Dept. of Environmental Protection's Regional Director, Jared Blumenthal during the dedication of this 22,000 square foot facility. This \$40 million dollar plant is equipped to recycle 2 billion plastic bottles per year. Access to CarbonLITE is from Palmyrita Ave. and Michigan on the south side of the arroyo. Residents on the Highgrove side of the arroyo had previously written letters complaining about the noise and unattractive sight of the 10 silos that are visible from their property. A letter was written to Riverside City

Councilman Mike Gardner listing their complaints. The previous sound attributed to CarbonLITE was a sound similar to a pile driver driving something into the ground but that particular process has been changed to eliminate the loud clanking noise.

The arroyo was accessed from the Highgrove side and included equipment from West Coast Storm Inc.

Initial reports said that 1,400 feet of dirt had to be removed from the Springbrook wash during the HazMat clean- up process. Large trucks designed to remove contaminated dirt were used for the first time according to Boris Treyzon CFO of West Coast Storms. Inc. The spill was listed as being similar to bleach that is used to take the paper labels off of the plastic bottles before recycling the plastic. Authorities from the Fish and Game, City of Riverside, Dept. of Water and Power, conservation people, and biologists, were on hand in their efforts to get the contaminated dirt removed before the storm that was forecast for the coming weekend. The rains came as the clean up ended! (cont. on P. 11)







### **Quest for Highgrove Metrolink continues**

Several comments made by one of Metrolink even more desirable. The the speakers, Phillip Sandahl, was about "Maximizing your potential, working together, and if we pull together everybody wins", which are 3 points I wish we could get RCTC to understand. Later, the workshop I attended included Ty Schuiling representing SANBAG and John Standiford who represented RCTC. (2)RCTC meeting March 14, 2012 These were my comments during "public comments" at the RCTC meeting on Mar. 14, 2012

Over 10 years ago the request for a Highgrove Metrolink Station was presented to RCTC.

Many changes have occurred since then including changes in your staff, different commissioners in some cases, and even the addition of new cities. But the one thing that has remained the same is the long term requests from the public for a Metrolink station at Highgrove.

We have recently received requests via e-mail that have been forwarded to SCAG for their Regional Transportation Plan. This plan is from 2012 until the year 2035 that looks into the future transportation needs for the next 23 years.

Highgrove is under RCTC's jurisdiction because the present Perris Valley Line connection is only a few feet from the San Bernardino county line at Main Street. In this case, the county line is unimportant because the Metrolink trains and freeways have something in common: both are designed to move people! And the high cost of gasoline makes

distance between Marlborough Ave. and Highgrove is only one mile but the destinations are different. Station placement has been our only concern due to the existing trains and the difference in destinations between these two locations.

We know that RCTC can *change* its mind regarding former station placement choices such as Spruce and Rustin, Palmyrita, and Columbia Ave. for example.

We can also change our minds, because we are asking that the station location at Highgrove be moved NORTH of the curved track, so it will not interefere with the Perris Valley Line connection. This new location is still on the 17.22 acre property owned by RCTC and is right next to the track used by daily Metrolink trains between San Bernardino and Riverside. RCTC's property at Highgrove can serve a dual purpose; one for the curved track and one for a regional station for SCAG's RTP. Many people have verbally supported Highgrove from this podium during public comments. Today I am submitting written documentation that includes city resolutions, letters, statements, comments, and recent email requesting a Highgrove station. I am requesting that this information be duplicated, distributed and digested by each commissioner. Take it home, read it, and realize that this is a win/win for commuter rail transportation. RCTC will get commuter trains between Riverside and Perris and the public (cont. on P. 9)



## Main St. widening east of Michigan Avenue



This is a view looking westward toward Michigan Ave. from the south/ east corner of Main and Michigan Avenue. Photos taken on March 20, 2012.



The original plan did not include widening Main St. between the Park entrance and Michigan Ave. which would have left a narrow portion of Main St. in this area but Riverside County added the widening of this portion of the street. The new width will make Main St. much wider all the way from Mt. Vernon Ave. to the Union Pacific RR track by Sanrive Avenue.



This view is in the opposite direction looking eastward on the south side of Main Street toward the entrance of the Highgrove Community Park.



The old asphalt was removed and hauled away by dump trucks to widen Main St. on the Riverside County side of the county line. 300 feet of new asphalt, curb and gutter, a sidewalk and 4 driveways were added between Michigan and the Highgrove Community Park entrance at an additional cost of \$41,795.00 according to Juan Perez of the Riverside County TLMA.

The base coat of asphalt paving was done on Saturday March 24, 2012 and there were a lot of large trucks carrying asphalt to this paving machine. New base was laid on Main St. between the Highgrove Community Park and Sanrive and on Michigan on both sides of the count line.



The intersection at Main St. and Michigan Ave. will get a new traffic signal. The width of Main St. is 46 feet with 30 feet on the north side of Main St. for 2 westbound lanes and a width of 14 feet for 1 eastbound lane on the south side of the street. Some locations along Main St. are even wider.

Metrolink (cont. from P. 7) will be able to use your same property and the existing trains between San Bernardino and Riverside. Other transportation agencies need to know that this location is the best place for SCAG's Regional Transportation Plan.

After reviewing this information a letter should be sent from RCTC to SCAG, Mobility 21, SANBAG and Metrolink stating that RCTC's excess property can and should be used for a station that will benefit the region on both sides of the county line. Highgrove has the vacant land, the existing Metrolink trains and longtime support.

And the public wants to know: "Why can't RCTC's excess property be used for mass transit between the 2 counties?"

After my comments, Supervisor Tavaglione requested that RCTC staff review the Highgrove location once again. I was assured that the 51 pages of support I presented would be scanned and e-mailed to each individual RCTC commissioner. Hopefully, the commissioners will look at the vast amount of public support that has been presented over the last 10 years and ask: "What is wrong with RCTC's excess property being used to benefit the region?"

**Inland Empire Regional** Economic Forum March. 21, 2012 I also attended the Inland Empire Regional Economic Forum at the University of Redlands hosted by Paul Granillo who is the president of the Inland Empire Economic Partnership. This meeting was a gathering of economic leaders such as local Economist, John Husing; Doug Henton, CEO of Collaborative Economics; Dan Rendler of the Southern California Gas Co. and others who are concerned about companies leaving California and the job losses that goes with those companies. He stated that we need to unite with a common voice from the Inland Empire. One of the speakers, Dan Rendler stated: "Today is critical for the Region. Stop talking about problems and get to the solutions because a thriving Region means a

### Roxie Jane to perform at Highgrove Day





Are You Prepared for Long-term term care Care Costs?

Like everyone else, you hope to remain physically and financially independent your entire life. And you may well achieve this goal. Even worse, if you run through your money, you might end up creating a financial and emotional burden for your grown children.

Unfortunately, many people assume that a federal or state government program will help them pay for their longexpenses. However, Medicare pays only a small portion of nursing



home costs, and to be eligible for Medicaid, you would likely have to divest yourself of most of your financial assets. Consequently, you'll probably need to find another way to pay for long-term care.

Fortunately, there are investment or protection vehicles designed specifically to help you meet long-term care expenses. Your financial advisor can help you pick the option that's most appropriate for your individual situation.

Having the ability to pay for longterm care is obviously important. But other issues may also enter the picture. For example, if you need to enter a nursing home, you may be suffering from a physical or mental disability that might prevent you from handling your own affairs. This impairment could prove disastrous to your finances — which is why you can't afford to take that type of chance. Instead, consult with your legal advisor to determine if you can benefit from a durable power of attorney — a document that lets you delegate your financial decisions to a relative, close friend or anyone else you might choose.

None of us like to think about spending time in a nursing home or needing round-the-clock care in our own homes. However, life is unpredictable. But even if you can't avoid the need for long-term care, you can take steps to help reduce the financial strain it can cause you and your family.



Quest for Highgrove Metrolink continues....

Mobility 21 that is the transportation agency that represents Riverside County, San Bernardino County, Los Angeles County, Ventura County and San Diego County.

The reason for my continued attendance at these and other meetings is to let everyone know that the excess property owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission at Highgrove should be used for a Metrolink station that will benefit commuters between Riverside and San Bernardino County. Several comments made by one of the speakers Phillip Sandahl, was about "Maximizing your potential", "working together" and "If we pull together everybody wins", which are 3 points I wish we could get RCTC to understand. Later the workshop I attended included Ty Schuiling representing SANBAG and John Standiford who represented RCTC.

#### (2) RCTC meeting March 14, 2012

These were my comments during "public comments" at the RCTC meeting on Mar. 14, 2012:

Over 10 years ago the request for a Highgrove Metrolink Station was presented to RCTC.

Many changes have occurred since then including changes in your staff, different commissioners in some cases, and even the addition of new cities. But the one thing that has remained the same is the long term requests from the public for a Metrolink station at Highgrove.

We have recently received requests via e-mail that have been forwarded to SCAG for their Regional Transportation Plan. This plan is from 2012 until the year 2035 that looks into the future transportation needs for the next 23 years. Highgrove is under RCTC's jurisdiction because the present Perris Valley Line connection is only a few feet from the San Bernardino county line at Main Street. In this case, the county line is unimportant because the Metrolink trains and freeways have something in common: both are designed to move people! And the high cost of gasoline makes Metrolink even more desirable. The distance between Marlborough Ave. and Highgrove is only one mile but the destinations are different. Station placement has been our only concern due to the existing trains and the difference in destinations between these two locations.

We know that RCTC can change its mind regarding former station placement choices such as Spruce and Rustin, Palmyrita, and Columbia Ave. for example.

We can also change our minds, because we are asking that the station location at Highgrove be moved NORTH of the curved track, so it will not interfere with the Perris Valley Line connection. This new location is still on the 17.22 acre property owned by RCTC and is right next to the track used by daily Metrolink trains between San Bernardino and Riverside.

RCTC's property at Highgrove can serve a dual purpose: one for the curved track and one for the regional station for SCAG's RTP.

Many people have verbally supported Highgrove from this podium during public comments. Today I am submitting written documentation that includes city resolutions, letters, statements, comments, and recent e-mail requesting a Highgrove station.

I am requesting that this information be duplicated, distributed and digested by each commissioner. Take it home, read it, and realize that this is a win/win for commuter rail transportation. RCTC will get commuter trains between Riverside and Perris and the public will be able to use your same property and the existing trains between San Bernardino and Riverside. Other transportation agencies need to know that this location is the best place for SCAG's Regional Transportation Plan.

After reviewing this information a letter should be sent from RCTC to SCAG, Mobility 21, SANBAG and Metrolink stating that RCTC's excess property can and should be used for a station that will benefit the region on both sides of the county line. Highgrove has the vacant land, the existing Metrolink trains and longtime support.

And the public wants to know: "Why can't RCTC's excess property be used for mass transit between the 2 counties?"

After my comments, Supervisor Tavaglione requested that RCTC staff review the Highgrove location once again. I was assured that the 51 pages of support I presented would be scanned and e-mailed to each individual RCTC commissioner. Hopefully, before the commissioners automatically vote to accept their staff's recommendations, the commissioners will look at the vast amount of public support that has been presented over the last 10 years and ask the question: "What is wrong with RCTC's excess property being used to benefit the region?"

The information given to the commissioners is on our web site: www.high-grovehappenings.net under 8 years of comments and Supporting Docs.




