

On June 24, 2010 we met with Grand Terrace dignitaries at the Norton Younglove Community Center in Highgrove to discuss items of mutual interest to our communities.

The discussion included changes of RTA bus Route 25 that runs between Riverside and Loma Linda. RTA (Riverside Transit Agency) plans on going through Highgrove on the existing route which is Iowa Ave. to Center St. to Michigan Ave. and into Grand Terrace. The change will be that once the RTA bus gets to the intersection of Michigan Ave. and Barton Road in Grand Terrace, instead of turning eastward and going thru Grand Terrace, the RTA bus would by-pass Grand Terrace and turn west on Barton Road and onto the I-215 freeway and I-10 freeway to the hospital in Loma Linda.

We discussed our concerns with Grand Terrace and RTA about how this will impact Highgrove residents.

On July 22, 2010 I left the San Ber-

I am happy to report that through the efforts of RTA and Omnitrans and the City of Grand Terrace and the community of Highgrove there is a plan that will be implemented on Sept. 12, 2010. The RTA bus route will still travel from Riverside on Iowa Ave. and east on Center St. but the bus going to Grand Terrace for shopping will stop in front of the new library in Highgrove near the corner of Center St. and Michigan Ave. to allow riders to transfer onto the new Omnitrans bus route that will pick up riders destined for Grand Terrace businesses.

The new bus route 14 will operate between the Tyler mall in Riverside, through Highgrove to Loma Linda using the I-215 and I-10 freeways from Barton Road and Michigan in Grand Terrace. But beginning on Sept. 7, 2010, the new Omnitrans route 325 will serve the Highgrove library, Grand Terrace Senior Center, City Hall, Barton Road businesses, and the Loma Linda University and VA hospitals. The new service will kick off with a free ride period to encourage residents to give OmniGo a try. Look for more details in our Sept. issue. I spoke under public comments to the 18 Riverside Transit Agency board members to remind them that many services are not available in Highgrove that are available in Grand Terrace such as a bank, Stater Bros. market, post office, dentist, chiropractor, pharmacy, dry cleaners or laundry mat. Highgrove residents need to be able to get to Grand Terrace for these services.





The television reported that there were 500 irate residents who attended the public meeting in Bell on July 26, 2010 but there were only 400 people who actually voted in the election that put them in office.


All I can say is: Know the issues, know the candidates and vote!

## Center St. parking restriction map available at Highgrove Norton Younglove community center

For several months Riverside County has been working with the Highgrove MAC in response to complaints about the parking of large trucks along Center St. near the Highgrove Elementary School where the children walk.

Trucks from other areas such as Moreno Valley and even Compton were parking their big rigs and trailers and leaving them for extended times. Some of the trailers were left on Center St. for 2 weeks.

On March 3, 2010 the Riverside County Sheriff Dept. removed 2 trailers with 2 huge tow trucks. Since that time there has been a decline in the large trucks parking by the school.

Unfortunately we were not able to print a colored map to show the different zones but it basicly restricts parking commercial vehicles over 5 tons between the BNSF railroad tracks and Mt. Vernon Ave. along Center Street. There are exceptions that provide limited night time parking is some areas.



### Stay within the lines! If you have recently driven the I-5 between Orange Show Road and

215 between Orange Show Road and Rialto Ave. in San Bernardino you are well aware of all the construction that has been underway in this area. Phase 2 of 4 phases is now supposed to be complete. The main problem is that they have moved the lanes so many times that it is difficult to see where your lane is located and which line to follow. This area reminds me of the video game where you sit in a seat and try to watch the video screen and stay on the road. Every time you go off the road there is a loud crashing sound from the video speaker. Just make sure that crashing sound is not your car!

Hopefully this 3 year problem will soon be resolved since they are fin-

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### FTA (cont. from P.1)

On July 21, 2010, I attended a FTA public hearing in Riverside that was supposed to be a video conferencing meeting that would be viewed by SCAG members from 6 different counties in Southern California. Unfortunately the video conferencing system did not work in Riverside on July 21, 2010 but I was given 3 minutes via speaker telephone to speak to the SCAG members.

SCAG stands for the Southern California Association of Governments and consists of Los Angeles County, Imperial County, Orange County, Ventura County, San Bernardino County and Riverside County.

The following day at noon on July 22, 2010, I attended the San Bernardino Rail and Transit Committee meeting at the Old Santa Fe Depot (SANBAG), to address the committee and ask them to visit our web site and to look at the Highgrove Metrolink location again. This committee consists of Mayors and council members from Redlands, San Bernardino, Grand Terrace, Highland, Montclair, Upland, Big Bear Lake, Hesperia, Rancho Cucamonga, and the County of San Bernardino.

That same evening at 7:00 pm (July 22, 2010), I returned to the Santa Fe Depot in San Bernardino because I was told the SCAG video conferencing system in San Bernardino was working properly.

I was given the opportunity to again tell the SCAG members about the

public's conflict we have had with RCTC over the last 8 1/2 years and concentrated on the points we have stressed such as availability of trains 7 days a week through Highgrove, better destinations that will serve 3 cities instead of 2 and the fact that the site RCTC wanted for a station at Palmyrita Av e. is no longer available because it is currently under construction for a 507,000 sq. ft. warehouse. (See photo below). You may have seen the giant slab being poured on the 25 acres between Palmyrita Ave. and Columbia Ave. which is right next to the Perris Valley Line railroad track. There are no commuter trains in the Palmyrita area on the Perris Valley Line railroad which is one mile from the existing Metrolink trains that go through Highgrove.

The 1 on the post indicates it is one mile from the existing Metrolink trains in Highgrove. This is where the warehouse is under construction right next to the Perris Valley Line railroad track that is not part of the existing Metrolink system.

## What is SCAG?

Note: This definition was taken from the SCAG General Fact Sheet: "SCAG" stands for the Southern California Association of Governments. As a designated Joint Powers Authority (JPA) under California law, SCAG is an association of local governments and agencies who voluntarily come together on issues of common concern. Additionally SCAG is a Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) representing six counties, five transportation commissions and 189 cities, assisting with regional transportation and land use planning. Under federal and state mandates, SCAG is tasked with developing a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and a Regional Transportation Improvement Plan (RTIP) every four years. Recently with passage of SB 375 into law, SCAG has been given the added responsibility of developing a Sustainable Communities Strategy (SCS) to address greenhouse gas emmissions as a element of the RTP.

## Primary issues on Station Location



### Apartment complex planned by Elementary School

The two diagrams above are plans submitted from Kirk Wallace from A. W. Properties West, LLC. This 2 story apartment complex will have 120 units that will be located on 9.75 acres on the north east corner of Spring St and Garfield. The eastern boundary is by the Gage Canal on the right side of the top diagram.

In last month's issue we printed information about another 89 unit project on 6.71 acres by the new Highgrove Library that is under construction. The two builders approached our Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council as the first step before proceeding with their plans to submit to the county.

Members of the MAC have gone to several locations where these builders had projects under construction or completed to see the quality of their facilities.

We want to be sure these units will be an asset to our community and not a detriment. Both of these projects are very nice and of high quality and they will attach to the new sewer system. Also, please watch for heavy equipment to be brought in soon on Center St. for starting the first sewer line near the library.

And have you been watching the progress on the new library? On July 27, 2010 I noticed they were putting stucco on the outside of the building!

Whether we like it or not we must realize that changes are coming to our area. To say that things will remain the same is not being realistic. The Spring Mountain Ranch homes will be built eventually and the newly proposed Pigeon Pass Corridor will bring new people into our area from Moreno Valley. And Highgrove will definitely be impacted by the new Grand Terrace High School that is now under construction on our northern boundary.

Other changes under consideration include extending Michigan Ave. southward at Spring St. through a vacant field that is in a direct line between two existing warehouses (Photo above) to connect to Palmyrita Court on the south side of the arroyo. This extension of Michigan Ave. would go to the south side of the arroyo. (Palmyrita Court photo). The extension of Michigan Ave. would then enable vehicles to travel on Michigan Ave. between Barton Road in Grand Terrace and Columbia Ave. in Riverside where there is access to the I-215 via the

new Columbia overpass. (photo bottom left). This would be another way to move northbound and southbound vehicles in and out of the area.

Highgrove currently has 1,550 sq. acres of vacant land to build on and the sewers are coming which will allow even more density and growth. We need a plan to provide basic services to our area such as a shopping center to accommodate this future growth. We must be active and participate in some of these changes to give us a chance to help shape our own future instead of reacting to what is being planned or built by someone from outside the area.

It is important to let the Federal, Regional and Local agencies know how their decisions will impact our area. Transportation issues such as new roads, commuter train accessibility and bus service is important in planning for our future increase in traffic.

As a community, it is time to prepare for the future. Doing nothing is the absolute worst thing we can do! We must be pro-active!

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


A new extention of Michigan Ave between Spring St. and Palmyrita Court

## Cooking

One of life's greatest pleasures... eat-

ing the food you prepare yourself. The focus is on ingredients that are seasonal, local, fresh, and flavorful. We are so lucky to be living in the US, in California, in Riverside County, and in Highgrove! We have a bountiful access to so many fresh, flavorful foods and the weather to enjoy them out of doors or in. Summer is here so let's get cooking!

Summer is grilling time! "Shrimp on the 'barbie", BBQ sauce splashed on everything, and beer-butt chicken. Hey, if fruits and vegetables are part of your menu, they can go on the grill too. You will be surprised at the unique and smoky taste grilling brings to fresh produce and how simple and quick it is to prepare.

Your garden could be your best source for fresh veggies. Too many zucchini! Throw them on! An abundance of bell peppers? Cut them up! Ooodles of cherry tomatoes? Skewer them and grill them.

Start with fresh, firm fruits and vegetables, clean them and dry them well. Some will do best sliced and some will do best cut into cubes. Try one-half to one-inch slices or for kebabs, cut cubes. A light brushing of olive oil and a little sprinkling of sea salt and pepper and you're ready to grill. Put them on a



medium heat and cook until you have good grill marks. Turn them and mark the other side and they are ready to go. Don't try to cook them until they are soft, you won't like them that way. Corn can be cooked right in its husk. Peel the husk back and remove all the silks. Pull the husks back up over the cob and twist the top. Put the cob on the grill and cook it until it is good and brown.

Asparagus, corn, onions, mushrooms, winter squash; peaches, pineapple, nectarines; these are all excellent on the grill. Experiment with any fruit or vegetable and you will be pleased with the results. Here is a recipe for you to get started.

Garden Vegetable Kebobs bamboo skewers- one or two for each person one inch diameter zucchini bell peppers onions cherry tomatoes 6 ounces olive oil 2 ounces balsamic vinegar 1 garlic clove finely minced ½ teaspoon sea salt ½ teaspoon of fresh ground pepper

Soak your bamboo skewers for about an hour in water. This will prevent them

But less than 3 months later, community members realized that they would no longer be entitled to celebrate Independence Day and the secession was rescinded by popular vote.

One of my best friends, who was a co-worker, lived in Grass Valley several years ago and I have been to nearby Rough and Ready, which is about 62 miles from Sacramento on highway 49 known as the gold chain. Highway 49 is called the gold chain because of all of the old gold mining towns in this area.

from catching fire on your grill. Cut the zucchini, bell peppers, and onions into chunks about one-half inch thick. Put one or two chunks on each skewer alternating each vegetable until they are nearly full. Mix the olive oil, balsamic vinegar, minced garlic and

the salt and pepper. Brush the olive oil mixture over the kebabs and let sit for about 15 minutes. Put the kabobs on the hot grill. Sear each side, turning only once in each direction until all sides are grilled. Serve immediately. Scentsy ®

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When the day came three or so weeks later for the zoo trip, Mom let it be known that I had to get cleaned up for the trip into Fresno. This meant a haircut and long pants and a shirt and shoes. By midsummer my hair was over my ears so mom remedied that with her sewing scissors and, on inspection, found a hole in the seat of my pants. To save time she bent me over her lap and sewed the pants with me in them. Wearing way too many clothes for a summer morning I walked outside where my dog Tiny must not have recognized me and grabbed my heel growling until my familiar voice convinced her it was me after all, just more presentable than normal. Mom came out and we loaded into the 59 Chevy Fleetside truck and headed into Stratford and the library. All of a sudden this was reminiscent of going to church with the cleaning up routine but I was optimistic that my visit to Fresno would be worth it. The last time I was there was about three years prior with the Harrigans to their main Seventh Day Adventist church. I was now in the ninth year of my life and struggling to escape my role as the baby of the family. Actually, I was enjoying some benign neglect since Mom had begun dating for

the first time since Dad had died about eight years before. My daily life was spent on my own this summer with little or no supervision and I was looking forward to this trip to the big city of Fresno, intuitively knowing wonderful things existed there among its big buildings beyond the grape vineyards.

When we arrived in downtown Stratford I left Mom in the truck and joined a small group of kids on the lawn in front of the library. Confirming that they too were summer bibliophiles, I waived Mom off and watched her head back to Westlake Farms. I didn't recognize any of the kids from school and none acted like they wanted my company so I wandered about the town square til Chester arrived in a school bus. Chester was my favorite bus driver of all time and he also worked Sousa's gas station on the edge of town out on hwy 41. Chester was smallish and had his blonde hair slicked back and parted on the side and was dressed in civilian clothes, not his standard khaki janitor uniform so today already had the makings of a festive trip. I remember Chester as our driver when we lived in Harrigan's camp about three years before. He was agreeable to being talked into driving our route home in reverse order occasionally making Harrigan's the last stop home from time to time. About a quarter mile from our stop all of us kids would head back to the long bench seat in the back of the bus and holler for Chester to speed up so when we crossed the raised canal bridge the bump would send us in the air to his and our delight. Yeah, Chester was a friendly face this morning and I knew this was going to be a good day at the Z00.

The ride from Stratford took us through Lemoore, Armona and Handford and into less familiar territory. There were fewer dairies and pastures and more orchards and vineyards now and I settled into a nice daydream ride rattling along in this metal enclosure larger than a lot of the cabins I had lived in so far in my life. The bookworms were quiet and the low whine of the transmission drowned out what little conversation the kids attempted. I recognized a stretch of hwy 41 that I rode on my big brother's Harley Davidson when he bought it in Fresno about four years prior. Man, that was a thrill since he let me sit on the tank and hold onto the handle bars making me believe I was driving it. Fifty years later I would remember this moment when I bought him a brand new Harley Davidson. Yeah, Fresno was where great things happened and dreams began. My thoughts wandered to the zoo and for the first time it occurred to me that I was going to actually see and maybe touch real wild African tigers, lions, rhinos, and elephants. There had been a lady at school one day that brought in some ostrich eggs to pass around and a camel saddle which she placed on the floor and sat on making me snicker. I think she worked for the school system since she took over from the teacher and began talking about Egypt and Africa. She reminded me of Olive Oyl, Popeye's girlfriend from the cartoon series, and she had bad breath which I noted when she handed me one of the large eggs. When she sat on the camel saddle her knees under her long skirt came up under her chin. The whole effect of her lecture was comical and bizarre to me, but the zoo was going to be the real thing, for sure. As we entered the outskirts of Fresno, I couldn't sit any longer and I got up and walked forward to Chester's driving alcove and asked him how much farther it was. Not much farther he assured me and I rode the rest of the way holding onto the vertical metal support bar at the top of the bus steps. Chester was a cool guy who didn't enforce many rules except the real important ones like on foggy mornings at intersections and railroad

crossings when it was mandatory that everyone drop their windows and keep quiet while Chester and everyone strained to listen for cross traffic or trains before he started the motor and quickly crossed the intersection to avoid the common collisions in those conditions. No books today, and I was travelling light too with no money or lunch or gun or anything to slow me down. At about ten o'clock Chester pulled the bus into a big gravel parking lot and parked in the shade of some big pine trees. Barely hearing Chester admonish us to be back by four, I flew out the door first when Chester opened it and left the book reading geeks behind and proceeded to the entrance gate where a lone attendant paid me no special attention surely knowing I had read the twenty books and belonged there. Leaving the gravel lot and entering the lushly landscaped urban wilderness I could smell the odor of wild animal manure mixed with the sweet scents of jasmine and honeysuckle. Then I heard it in the distance. It was a screech or a yell and it was coming from the general direction of the center of this big overgrown park. It was much like the yell the elephants used to answer Tarzan's call for help in the movies. I had just heard a real elephant and I headed right for it. My head was on a swivel and I followed my ears past a monkey enclosure til I found the elephant enclosure on the other side of a big steel fence. He was eating some hay some fifteen feet from me and he matched all the drawings I had ever seen therefore he was real, tusks and all. I must have stayed there for the better part of an hour mesmerized by his size while he quietly ignored me. His name was Nosey and he was smallish by elephant standards. He had big flat toenails and eyelashes at least six inches long and one big lower goober lip under his trunk. I kept waiting for him to holler again but Nosey just stood Continued on page 11

## Invisible Populations: A Deeper Look





I would like to explain what happened at the July 13, 2010 City Council meeting regarding the Political Sign ordinance. As usual, I am not speaking for the other members of the City Council. During the recently completed California Primary Election a candidate participating in the primary questioned the legality of Grand Terrace's Political Sign Ordinance. The challenge was forwarded to our City Attorney for review and comment. Mr. Harper researched recent court decisions relating to political sign ordinances in other cities within California. In every case he found that political speech is protected by state and federal statutes and most importantly the Constitution of the United States. It was very clear to me that our only alternative was to correct our Political Sign Ordinance to be in compliance. I was not happy with the prospect of political signs proliferating our City for an excessive period of time before an election, but I believe it is my obligation to protect the City from unnecessary litigation and the associated court costs.

Our former City Manager and candidate for the City Council, Tom Schwab, seems to believe that a neat and uncluttered community during election cycles is more important than



Free Speech. This opinion seems to be also shared by Doug Wilson, Chairman of the Planning Commission. As a veteran of the United States Army and the son of a WWII combat veteran I have a problem with that type of thinking. There are too many soldiers, sailors, airmen, and marines who have given their lives to protect our freedom of speech. I am not willing to ignore their sacrifices for the sake of neatness. I am also not willing to jeopardize our City finances to make a point. You, as property owners, should not be willing to give up your free speech rights either. The current ordinance prohibits you from displaying any political sign on your property.
