Metrolink: RCTC approves EIR on PVL over objections of MAC but SCAG getting involved!



On July 25, 2011, the RCTC (Riverside County Transportation Commission) approved the EIR (Environmental Impact Report) on the PVL (Perris Valley Line) over the objections of the High-grove MAC (Municipal Advisory Council) but another organization: SCAG (Southern California Association of Governments) is showing an interest in the Highgrove Metro-link location due to it's **"Regional"** benefits.

It also means that over the objections of the Highgrove community representatives and surrounding cities and local organizations, RCTC is <u>still</u> planning on building a Metrolink station at Marlborough Ave. on the Perris Valley Line railroad. Although they voted to approve the EIR, 26 to 0, there is still the possibility of litigation that may delay the construction of this \$237 million dollar project between Highgrove and Perris.

Three members of the Highgrove

so I do not know the details of the anticipated lawsuit but it is someone other than the Highgrove community that is also unhappy with the decisions being made by RCTC.

When we were allowed back into the chambers the RCTC staff gave their report and the vote was 26 in favor and 0 opposed to adopt the EIR.

Station location has been the only opposition to this project from Highgrove and the surrounding communities for the last 10 years due to differences in destination and use of existing trains.

The north/west corner of the Perris Valley Line railroad and Marlborough Ave. is the location selected by the Riverside County Transportation Commission to build a Metrolink station. They are currently in escrow to purchase the property at Marlborough Ave. but no figures are being disclosed regarding the purchase price.

This track will not have any


The new Chevron gas station on the south/west corner of Center St. and Iowa Ave. has gasoline in the tanks and food in the store and is getting close to opening.

According to the owner Abed Abugherir the sewer line that runs down the north side of his property under Center St. was scheduled to be completed by the time his station was done. The sewer pipes are under Center St. from Michigan Ave. to Villa St. on the east side of the freeway along east La Cadena Drive near the Eagles Aerie. East La Cadena Dr. is in the process of being elevated approximately 4 feet parallel to the I-215 freeway for 600 feet. The sewer line south of this location is already under east La Cadena Dr. all the way to Palmyrita Ave. where it connects to the City of Riverside's sewer system. A temporary holding tank has been installed for the Chevron station until the roadway elevation work and sewer line is completed. This portion of the problem has been resolved by the addition of the temporary holding tank.

According to the owner, the contaminated ground from leaking tanks from the previous station known as Shearer's station has been ventilated and cleaned for a period of 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ years and new tanks have been installed (Photo on P. 5).

The new station is very beautiful and will include a "Subway" on the south side of the building but the Subway has not completed their portion yet. There is an ATM machine inside the station and a walk up facility that will be used between 11:00 pm and 5:00 am when the gas station store doors are locked. There will be no alcoholic beverages sold at this location. cont. on P. 5

MAC, Melanie Zimmermann, Denis Kidd and R. A. "Barney" Barnett spoke during the public comments against building a station at Marlborough Ave. instead of Highgrove which is only one mile away. Immediately after the public comments everyone in the audience was ask to leave and wait in the hallway while RCTC went into closed session about "Anticipated Litigation".

commuter train service soon because the entire railroad needs to be up-graded before there is any passenger train service between Highgrove and Perris on the Perris Valley Line. New sidings and/or passing tracks need to be built and a CTC (Centralized Traffic Control) signal system for trains needs to be installed on the entire Perris Valley Line railroad because there is no CTC system on any of the 38 mile PVL track between Highgrove and San Jacinto. cont. on P. 4



Metrolink (cont. from P 1) At the present time, the Perris Valley Line track improvements are only planned between Highgrove and Perris but the cost is estimated at \$237 million of our Federal, State, and Transportation tax dollars!

And RCTC recently bought 17.22 acres at Highgrove for the proposed curved track to connect the Perris Valley Line track to the BNSF main line track at a cost of over 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ million dollars (\$8,625,000.00).

We asked that the purchase of additional property at Marlborough Ave. be abandoned and instead use that money to build a station on the west side of the property that RCTC already owns at Highgrove where there are Metrolink trains 7 days a week between San Bernardino and Riverside.

But RCTC only wants to upgrade their own railroad track on the Perris Valley Line for future Metrolink service between Highgrove and Perris while ignoring the regional benefits of commuter train service that exist only one mile away. Their decision also means that a station at Marlborough Ave. will only accommodate future passengers between Riverside and Perris and will not provide any commuter train service to or from San Bernardino. If a station is allowed to be built at Marlborough Ave., the existing Metrolink trains between Riverside and San Bernardino will continue to go through Highgrove every day, 7 days a week, without stopping like they have done for many years.

On July 15, 2006 Metrolink trains went to 7 days a week service between San Bernardino and Riverside. Since that time there have been 16,120 commuter trains that have passed through Highgrove without stopping. Add the 5 years of Metrolink trains between 2001 and 2006 when there were commuter trains only 5 days a week, and this figure skyrockets even further!

It is extremely frustrating to spend 10 years trying to get RCTC to just stop some or any of the existing Metrolink trains that go through Highgrove.

But RCTC has a one track mind and unfortunately that track only leads to Perris!

Perris Valley Line track at Marlborough Avenue



This electrical box is the only signal system on the 38 mile Perris Valley Line track. It is used to stop other trains on the Riverside Line track, owned by the UPRR, that crosses the Perris Valley Line track at Marlborough Avenue. It is not a CTC signal governed by the train dispatcher. When it is red, trains on either railroad know there is another train crossing ahead of them. It is similar to a traffic light at an intersection.

The M.P. 1.50 means that Marlborough Ave. is 1.5 miles from Main St., where the Perris Valley Line connects to the BNSF main line in Highgrove. But only one mile from the above location (1/2 mile south of the county line) is where RCTC owns 17.22 acres at Highgrove. Their property is between the 2 railroads and will be used for a new proposed curved track to connect the Perris Valley Line railroad track to the BNSF railroad track.

SCAG interested in Highgrove Metrolink!

Denis Kidd and I attended the SCAG meeting in Moreno Valley in the afternoon after the RCTC meeting on July 25, 2011. SCAG stands for Southern California Association of Governments.

This organization seems to agree with our position about the **"Regional"** benefits that a Highgrove Metrolink station has, that would provide service between both counties.

SCAG has 84 elected officials, represent 191 cities and 6 counties and they are in the process of planning a **RTP** (Regional Transportation Plan) that will be submitted in April of 2012. This plan will make important decisions such as long range transportation plans and include other subject such as land consumption, local infrastructure costs, vehicle miles traveled, fuel consumption, and other long term plans that are important in planning for the year 2035.

Just before the meeting, I talked with the SCAG's Deputy Executive Director Douglas Williford and later with SCAG's Executive Director, Hasan Ikhrata. I gave them each a copy of the colored map comparing the Highgrove location to the Marlborough Ave. location, similar to what is on our web site. I also gave them a copy of the July 21, 2011 letter of support for the Highgrove station from Grand Terrace Mayor, Walt Stanckiewitz, an outline of my presentation I gave to RCTC earlier that same day, and an article titled "Do the Math" showing that over 16,000 commuter trains have gone through Highgrove since July 15, 2006 when Metrolink trains went to 7 days a week service between San Bernardino and Riverside.

We are looking forward to working with SCAG due to their RTP, to show them how the Highgrove station will meet the long term **"Regional"** transportation needs between Riverside County and San Bernardino County. Hopefully SCAG can see that Highgrove is the ideal place for future growth due to the availability of vacant land, existing commuter trains, and established rail connections between the two counties.

RTP by definition: "The RTP (Regional Transportation Plan), is a long-range transportation plan that is developed and updated by SCAG every four years. The RTP provides a vision for transportation investments throughout the region. Using growth forecasts and economic trends that project over a 20 year period, the RTP considers the role of transportation in the broader context of economic, environmental, and qualityof-life goals for the future, identifying regional strategies to address our mobility needs".



Center St. Tire building demolished



The land was cleared for the new Chevron Station on April 7, 2010 and new tanks installed on Jan. 26, 2011









This is East La Cadena Dr. on the east side of the I-215 freeway just south of Villa St. by the Eagles Aerie 997. The roadway has been elevated 4 feet and the storm drain pipes and sewer pipes will connect to the south side of this construction area. The pipe on the right is a 14" sewer pipe that is being covered with re-bar and concrete to prevent movement. Once this short portion of the sewer line is finished the first sewer line in Highgrove will be completed. The new sewer line starts at the new library at Center St. and Michigan Ave., then continues westward down Center St. to East La Cadena Dr., and turns southward, and will connect to the City of Riverside Sewer System near

Palmyrita Avenue. The other sewer lines are already in place under the streets except for this short section shown above. After the connections of these pipes are made, there still has to be testing of the entire system. The new sewer line from the library to the connection point at Palmyrita Ave. and East La Cadena is a gravitational flow system. As of this date, I do not have additional information about when residences or businesses will be allowed to hook up to these lines. When we receive this information we will pass it along to our readers. The road work should be completed and the road re-paved and ready for use by Friday Aug. 5, 2011. Changes are coming to Highgrove!



DEVILS DEN

Brother Roy E. Fermin

Brother Roy Eugene Fermin stood on the red clay hill overlooking Buzzard Creek, his new homestead. It was 1939 and he was far removed from his native Bavarian Forest Zundappe home. All he owned was in the back of the Model T Ford and it wasn't much. The smell of fall was in the air as Brother Fermin took in the vista of one hundred and sixty bottomland acres of loblolly pines, red and white oak, and a few fingers of gold and red stands of pecan and walnut trees hugging the banks of Buzzard Creek in the very southeastern corner of Mc Curtain County, Oklahoma. A woodsman by trade, Brother Fermin was, at thirty years of age. in the best physical condition of his life and he knew he would need everv woodsman's skill his brothers in Germany had taught him. However, his greatest strength was in his conviction to succeed and to do so in an honest and humble manner befitting his Zundappe Order. He had come to America in peace and with the intention of building his own sect of Zundappe, thereby spreading his knowledge and passion for honesty and generosity to this strange and beautiful wooded land. Today he would set up camp and begin his mission tomorrow.

Now I don't know much more than this about Fermin and what I do know has been related to me by my Uncle Waldo, the county sheriff in Fermin's time. One old picture showed Fermin to be of medium build with deep set green eyes, and high cheekbones and dark brown curly hair and a full beard. County records and census searches show no mention of a man named Fermin or any of the other assorted charac-

ters you will get to know shortly for these boys and men of the Fermin Sect came and went like the waters that ran from Buzzard Creek into Little River and then on to Red River down thru Arkansas and finally into the Mississippi River to New Orleans. And you know that was the time of the Great Depression when self sufficiency was the key to survival and the help of others was the difference between eating and going hungry.

The day after arriving at his new homestead Brother Roy began to clear a home site on a low hill overlooking his woods. His plan was to have shelter by winter and enough firewood to make it til spring. By then he would have cleared a garden patch and finished a modest frame home high enough off the ground to stay dry in the rainy part of the year. Roy bought a team of mules to drag the timber he felled to the site and iacked the rear axle of his Model T Ford off the ground to accommodate the belt drive for his portable sawmill. In short order he had a solid foundation for his one room building and erected a WWI tent on the wood floor. With shelter against the elements Roy continued to clear his land and lay in dry firewood from fallen trees until he had a good six months supply. By December Brother Roy had replaced the tent with a real roof and had side walls up too. Using the sawdust from his mill he insulated the walls and his wood stove kept the nights warm and then the snow turned his compound white. Now all he had to do was wait for spring and plant his garden. Roy was making a little money by milling for some of his neighbors in Buzzard Creek but mostly he was bartering for staples like corn and canned goods. Roy could sell some of his hand hewn oak rail road ties in Valiant as well as some fence posts

so he developed a good rapport with his city neighbors. The way Roy saw things, he would be well positioned to open his Zundappe Compound by summer if his luck and health held out, and why wouldn't it? No one had ever seen such a hard working ascetic or self sufficient man in those parts for a long time. He came to be known for speaking only the truth and delivering good on his word in dealing with others. He was already teaching others about his Zundappe philosophy by his daily actions. His life was complete enough, or so he thought when Candido Ceasar Chavez Rio Seco showed up looking for work Christmas day, 1939.

Brother Roy surveyed Candido trying not to laugh but he had been to a world's fair and a goat roping contest and never had he seen a funnier sight than the one standing in front of him that snowy afternoon. Poor Candido, and I am using the word poor in the purest sense of the word, was wearing and carrying everything he owned. Candido had on Texas brand cowboy boots with pointed toes and inlaid leather eagles on the sides. Above his boots he was wearing full cut brown wool dress pants so big on him that he needed horsehair rope suspenders to pull the waistband up under his arm pits. Roy figured he the poor boy could crawl in and out of the chest high zipper to dress himself. The cuffs were tied tight around Candido's boots so whatever they were stuffed with couldn't fall out the bottoms, and there was plenty room for extra clothes to fit in the ballooning legs of his pants. Denim

jeans and flannel shirts hid under this outer layer dress suit, concealed again by a dress coat far too big for the little man. The coat tails hung down past Candido's knees and the shoulders were padded by a bedroll draped over his little Mayan shoulders. Yep, Candido was Mexican Indian, and he was from Sinaloa, Old Mexico and he had been born into a family of goat herders. Somewhere along his way, he found a felt fedora into which he slipped a wild turkey feather into the headband.

"What's that you wearing boy?" Brother Roy asked, making the word "boy" come out hard sounding. "A zoot" Candido said. "Azoot?" said Fermin. "No, ahh zoooot!" repeated the little Indian man. "Looks like some big man's suit." Replied Fermin. "Yeah, a big zoot, like I say." Agreed Candido. So the kid was wearing a zoot suit he was saying, whatever a zoot suit was figured Roy. He was still funnier than heck looking with that skinny neck sticking up out of the collar and the hat hiding most of that Mayan forehead. For a short while the man and the boy just stood there grinning and surveying each other til Candido asked, "Got work for me?" "Maybe, what can you do?" "Cook, hunt, dig, fix, chop, plant, pick cotton, fish, skin... I work hard for sure.... You no like; you no pay...ok bueno?" the little man asserted with great confidence. With that and a handshake, Candido became the first American Zundapper but it was Brother Roy who was going to be the student most of the year or so that Candido lived at the compound. 




The project is 89 total units with 60 2BR units and 29 3BR units. Amenities include a 2703 sq. ft. Community Building, Pool, BBQ areas, and our 24,829 sq. ft. pocket park that will be available for use by our residents and the public during daylight hours. Depending on household size and unit size (2BR or 3BR) the annual household income ceilings (based on 2011 numbers) will range from \$21,035 to \$49, 680. The rents will range from \$377 to \$791 for a 2BR and \$437 to \$916 for a 3BR. Once again, these are all based on 2011 numbers so they may be a bit higher when we are actually moving people in late 2013. Tony Mize.

Record broken for largest salmon caught this summer!





At the Grand Terrace city council meeting on July 12, 2011 the Grand Terrace city council voted to terminate the contract with Redflex traffic systems and discontinue the red light cameras. There are currently cameras at the intersections of Barton road and Mt. Vernon and also at Bar-



ton road and Michigan Avenue. The contract will not go beyond Aug. 14, 2011 but please do not let this decision influence your judgment to drive safely at all times-especially at intersections!

Riverside Councilman Named Chair of California Seismic Safety Commission

Riverside, California – The California Seismic Safety Commission named Riverside Council Member Mike Gardner as its chairperson late last week.

The Commission is composed of 20 commissioners chosen for their expertise and experience. The panel advises Governor Brown on earthquake-related issues and makes recommendations to reduce earthquake risk. Fifteen members are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate, one member is appointed by the Senate Rules Committee, and one by the Speaker of the Assembly. In addition, the Building Standards Commission, the State Architect's office, and Cal EMA each appoint a representative.

Because of budget constraints Thursday's meeting was held via conference call. Ward 1 representative Gardner will serve a one-year term as chair of the Commission.

"Riverside and San Bernardino are located in an area bisected by multiple earthquake faults and are subject to higher than normal fault activity. I am proud to chair this important Commission and to represent our region on such important safety issues," said Gardner.

The group meets at least six times each year to discuss seismic concerns, and provide recommendations to the governor. Each member is paid \$100 per meeting.



Mobile signs still a problem!

Since April 19, 2011 these signs have been sitting out in the street on Center St. except for a short period when they were ticketed by the CHP and tow trucks hauled 2 of them away on April 27, 2011. Shortly thereafter they re-appeared due to a so called technicality. Since then, this one has been sitting with no tires or trailer hitch while interrupting the water flow and collecting debris. Friday July 29, 2011 I noticed the trailer is still there but the sign was removed. Code Enforcement has also ticketed these signs. 


No stopping the bicycle craze!
