Why do we call her "Birdie" since her name is Imogene? Brothers Ed and Bud gave her that name because they said "She has legs like a bird."


Sister Birdie was recommended for the State Hall of Fame and is soon to be 92 years young.

Victor Olague was riding his motorcycle southbound on the curve at East La Cadena Dr. by the Shell Station on his way to meet Vince Yu from Zorbas for a bike ride on the morning of July 4. Unfortunately he was involved in an accident that threw him over the handlebars and left the above vehicle on top of the motorcycle he was riding. Victor said he always wears protective riding equipment even in hot weather and by looking at the marks on his helmet, shown below, it is a good thing he is so safety conscious. This could have been very serious but he only suffered slight injuries when he landed. This is a perfect example of why motorcycle riders and bicycle riders should always wear a helmet and protective clothing.





On July 17, 2012 these 2 vehicles on the left collided at the entrance to the business complex on Barton Road in Grand Terrace near Canal Street. The Ford F-150 pick-up was eastbound on Barton Road making a left-hand turn into the entrance by Smart Time and collided with a westbound Toyota 4 runner. The impact of the collision spun the pick truck around 180 degrees and ended up headed westbound next to the north side of the curb on Barton Road and the Toyota hit a concrete light pole head on. The driver of the pick-up, Dave Cook, age 20 was not injured and the driver of the Toyota sustained minor injuries and was transported by ambulance to the hospital.



Ten years after the launch of a successful life-saving program in California, the state's AMBER Alert coordinators reflect on the hundreds of children safely recovered and the cooperative effort that made those reunions possible. Since the inception of California's AMBER Alert Program on July 31, 2002, a total of 235 abducted children have been reunited with loved ones. To help commemorate the milestone, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) offered a rare look inside the emergency operations center where AMBER Alerts originate.

Hollow Mountain was carved out of solid rock. This sign was on the door!



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
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California Dreaming

Being a transplanted native Californian I am suffering from shock just like my plants. I miss Highgrove and all my family and friends! I moved to central Oregon a little over a year ago and it is nothing like Highgrove. I knew the change would be dramatic- this little city has about 77,000 people, hundreds, if not thousands, of wild deer, and more dogs per capita that any place I've ever been. It is another planet compared to California. Let me share my journey with you.

First of all, last month I requested some warmth be sent this way. Thank you! I got some! It came in the first week of July. The temperatures soared all the way up to the mid 90's-it's what they call summer here. People are crying about how hot it is. WE know hot; the mid 90's are warm to us. So I am finally getting a little action in my garden. The lettuce is a few inches high, the basil, chives, and thyme is doing well. My tomato plants are a whole 12 inches tall with a few blooms. I might get a few tomatoes before the frost hits, which could be right after Labor Day but no later than the first of October.

Highgrove is in a wonderful location in Southern California, something I've always bragged about; there is a wonderful proximity to so many enjoyable locations. North are the mountains- Big Bear, Arrowhead, and Crestline. East are the desert communities. South are rolling hills with avocado groves and vineyards and animals in the park and zoos. Westward has the most excitement- Hollywood, Los Angeles, dozens of amazing museums, tantalizing restaurants, glittering stage shows, the fun of Disneyland, and the miles and miles of beaches.

Central Oregon is landlocked. A

river runs through the center of town and there are many small lakes in the area but a lot of lakes and a river do not make the Pacific Ocean. I miss the beach, the ocean, the sand, the surf; the boardwalks, the palm trees, the salty-air breezes and the nighttime bon fires. I'm a California girl; I LOVE the Beach Boys, picnics at Laguna Beach, romantic walks at sunset in bare feet in the gentle surf, and even sand in my shorts.

Maybe because the Beach Boys are celebrating their 50th anniversary I'm particularly homesick for the beach. Being raised in Highgrove, I didn't get to the beach all that often; I never played hooky from school to go to the beach, (I was such a Girl Scout!) but I grew up with the beach culture. My brother Dana plucked out "Wipeout" on his guitar, my sister Beanie and I saw the Beach Boys at the Los Angeles County Fair, and I attended the Laguna Art Festival (with Girl Scouts) and saw a totally amazing performance of the Pageant of the Masters.

My brother Mark lives a few blocks from the beach in Imperial Beach so many times family has gathered there to stroll along the beach viewing the US Open Sandcastle competition. The sculptures done by professionals were sincerely impressive. (The US Open Sandcastle has had a competition in Imperial Beach for 35 years; due to construction on the coastal highway, the competition was cancelled for this year.) Pacific Ocean beach sand makes nice sculptures; unfortunately, central Oregon sand does not. I've watched my grandsons scoop and pile and pat and it just flops - poor little guys. Someday they'll get a chance to go down south and I'll take them to the beach and let them make some castles with some really good California sand!

Driving through the gates of the Burrage Mansion in Redlands, harkens back to yesteryear, recalling a time of liveried coaches, women with parasols and men with stove top hats. Located at 1205 W. Crescent, the mansion has a commanding view of Redlands and the mountains surrounding the area.

The Burrage Mansion was built in 1901 at the, then staggering, cost of \$60,000. Situated on 18 acres, it is the last great residence in Redlands with it's acreage intact. Over the years the mansion has seen various owners and usages. Originally built by Albert Burrage as a retreat from Boston's frosty winters, it's been a residence, convent, and rental facility. Mr. Tim Rochford, an oil entrepreneur, and Redlands native, purchased the mansion from The Rock Church and World Outreach Center in 2007, with the intention of preserving the property and "to pro-

vide a haven of play and enrichment for disadvantaged young children".

The mansion, and it's grounds, has been lovingly, with great expense and hard work, restored and transformed into a wonderful showpiece. A full time crew of five, diligently managed by Leonard Smith, keep the grounds beautifully groomed, and ready for the children's activities.

Mr. Rochford and The Rochford Foundation, has opened the Burrage Mansion to benefit civic non-profit, and children's organizations including...The Boys and Girls Club of Redlands, Redlands Family YMCA, Micah House and CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocates). These activities are very ably directed by Ellen Timothy.

The Children's activities that I've observed include, camping in authentic Indian teepees, a variety of crafts, dance, BMX bicycling, and gardening. At Christmas, Santa Claus arrives with toys for hundreds of children. The Christmas light display is a must see drive-by during the season.

What a very special legacy for the Rochford family, and the City of Redlands.





Detour Map for Iowa Ave. Overpass



The city of Riverside's Public Works Director, Tom Boyd attended our July MAC meeting and explained that the Iowa overpass construction will begin around mid September. The map above with the round dots is the northbound route from Riverside to Highgrove and shows how traffic will be diverted westbound over the existing overpass at Columbia Ave. to the freeway or East La Cadena Drive for access to Highgrove. The green line is the Iowa Ave. detour route from Highgrove to Riverside between Center St. and Columbia Avenue.

Construction of this \$30 million dollar project may take up to 16 months. After the overpass is completed, two traffic lights will be installed where Citrus St. connects to Iowa Ave. on each side of the railroad tracks. Citrus St. west of Iowa Ave. will go under the overpass and connect to Iowa Ave. North of the tracks and Citrus St. east of Iowa Ave. will be elevated upward a little to connect to the overpass.

High Speed rail: Are you for it or against it?

Have you been following this \$68 Billion dollar waste of taxpayer money? On July 23, 2012 I ask (RCTC) the Riverside County Transportation Commission this simple question:

Does RCTC support or oppose the High Speed Rail Plan?

Ann Mayer was on vacation so John Standiford answered the question. The answer was nine pages long that included a draft of a memorandum of understanding between the California High-Speed Rail Authority (CHSRA)

and other transportation agencies such as RCTC, SCAG, SANBAG and others but it is only a draft and is too long to print.

The short answer is: "the Commission has not taken a formal position on the actual bond measure that went to the voters or on the issue of high-speed rail."



The original estimate for the high speed rail is now \$23 Billion dollars more than was authorized by voters in 2008. And this money would not benefit the Inland Empire because it does not include any high speed trains in our area. To bring this into perspective, the most economical and logical plan is to use daily existing commuter trains that would benefit the Inland Empire.

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Don't Fret Over Changing Bond Prices

When you own stocks, you know their prices will always fluctuate. To help ease the effects of this volatility on your portfolio, you could add other types of investments, such as bonds. Yet bond prices will also rise and fall. But there may be — in fact, there should be — a big difference in how you view the ups and downs of stocks versus those of bonds.

Any number of reasons can cause stock prices to go up or down. But in the case of bonds, prices go up and down largely, though not exclusively, for one reason: changes in interest rates. Suppose you purchase a bond that pays 4% interest and then, a year later, newly issued bonds pay 3%. You could now potentially sell your bond for more than its face value because it provides more income to investors than the new bonds. Conversely, if newly issued bonds pay 5% interest, the value of your existing bond would drop because it's unlikely that someone would pay full price for a bond that provides less income than newer bonds.

When you own stocks, or stockbased investments, you want their price to rise because you probably plan on selling those stocks someday — and you'd like to sell them for more than you paid for them. But it's not so cut-and-dried with bonds. While some people may indeed purchase bonds in hope of selling them for a profit before they mature, many reasons.

First, as mentioned above, owning bonds can be a good way to help diversify your portfolio. Second, and probably more importantly,

people invest in bonds for the income they provide in the form of interest payments. And here's the good thing about those interest payments: They'll always continue at the same level as long as you own your bond, except in the rare case of a default. (Although defaults are not common, they can occur, so you do need to take a bond's "credit risk" into account before investing.) Thus, if you plan to hold your bonds until they mature, you don't have to worry about a possible drop in their value. But if you need to sell your bonds before they mature, the price you receive will depend on current interest rates.

You can't control or predict interest rates, but you can help soften their impact on bond prices by building a "ladder" of bonds with varying maturities. Then, if market interest rates rise, you can sell your maturing short-term bonds and purchase new ones at the higher rates. And if market rates fall, you'll still have your longer-term bonds working for you at higher rates. (Usually, but not always, longer-term bonds pay higher rates to compensate investors for incurring inflation risk over time.) Keep in mind, though, that the investments within your bond ladder should be consistent with your investment objectives, financial circumstances and risk tolerance.

Whether you own your bonds other investors own bonds for other until maturity or build a bond ladder, you can do something to protect yourself from price movements. And that type of control can prove valuable to you as you chart your course through the investment world.

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Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council recommends changes in General Plan.

At the Highgrove MAC meeting on July 25, 2012 the request for changes in the General Plan was passed and will be forwarded to the Riverside County Board of Supervisors and other Riverside County agencies regarding the un-incorporated area of Riverside County known as Highgrove.

These changes appeared in the July 2012 issue of the Highgrove Happenings Newspaper in an article titled "Changes in General Plan requested".

Some of the changes being requested are about the unpopular zoning of 68 acres right in the middle of Highgrove that currently permits warehouses that would cut the community in half. The city of Riverside previously objected to these inappropriate changes in their letter dated March 21, 2008 and the Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council also objected to this zoning change at the Riverside County Board of Supervisors meeting on Jan. 13, 2009.

The zoning change was "Fast Tracked" through and approved but has now expired due to no construction started on the vacant 68 acres within the 2 year time limit.

Other request for changes in the General Plan include extending Michigan Ave. southward from Spring St. where it now dead ends, across the vacant land to connect to Palmyrita Court on the south side of the arroyo. Also we will continue our request for a Metrolink station on the 17.22 acre property that is now owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission where existing Metrolink trains pass by their property seven days a week.

The long term Pigeon Pass Corridor also needs to be re-evaluated to see what connection is best suited for the Highgrove area. The connecting points for a new road from Moreno Valley through Highgrove called the Pigeon Pass Corridor should include further study for connecting to Main St., Center St., Spring St., Palmyrita Ave. Columbia Ave. or Marlborough Avenue. All connection points should be thoroughly examined that will best serve the public in the future. Other requests being sought by the Highgrove MAC are changing the proposed **street names** of Center St. east of Mt.

Vernon Ave. to East Center St. and Spring St. east of Mt. Vernon Ave. to East Spring St. to comply with the present pattern that has addresses east of Mt. Vernon on Main St. listed as East Main Street. We have also requested that all new or replacement street signs include the Highgrove name at the top similar to the photo shown in the July issue.

One additional provision that was added at the Highgrove MAC meeting was to request a "No Whistling Ordinance" for trains using the BNSF/UP railroad tracks that cross Main St. and Center Street. This is especially important now that the new Grand Terrace High School will be opened on Aug. 6, 2012 and is located just east of the Main St. crossing. I have already contacted the City of Grand Terrace, City of Riverside Public Works, Riverside County Transportation Department and the Colton Joint Unified School District to see if we can combine our efforts to make Main St. and Center St. a no whistling zone for trains to improve our quality of life. Certain restrictions such as a median and extra crossing gates are needed to prevent someone from driving around the gates but a joint effort is needed to start the process. If these two crossing were exempt from train whistles then trains between San Bernardino and Riverside would have approximately 4 1/2 miles of a quiet zone between Valley Boulevard in Colton and Palmyrita Ave. in Riverside.

\$451 Million dollars invested in Highgrove area

\$451 Million All of these projects may not be in Highgrove but they are in and around the area. Highgrove students will be allowed to attend the Grand Terrace High School, the overpass is just beyond the city limits, and there are \$250 million dollars invested in infrastructure for the Spring Mountain Ranch homes. Highgrove still has 1, 555 acres of vacant land that needs to be re-evaluated for proper usage.

On July 25, 2012 I attend a meeting in Moreno Valley hosted by Riverside County 5th District Supervisor Marion Ashley. The Emcee was Rob Field, Assistant County Executive Officer/EDA. There were three panels composed of knowledgeable participants and experts in each of the three fields.

The meeting was well attended and filled the large room near the Moreno Valley Civic Center. It was attended by State, County and local representatives.

The moderator for the water panel was Phil Rosentrater, Deputy Director of the Riverside Economic Development Agency. The panel included Paul Jones II, Gen. Mgr. of Eastern Municipal Water District; Jeff Kightlinger, Gen. Mgr. of Calif.; Timothy Quinn, Executive and waste water is being recycled. Director of Association of California Water Agencies; Randy Record, Pres. of ACWA; and John Rossi,

Gen. Mgr. of Western Municipal Water District. They talked about the Diamond Valley Lake that is a \$2 Billion dollar fresh water storage lake and how Lake Perris will be retrofitted at the cost of \$500 Million dollars for recreational purposes. California is the 8th largest economy in the world and no development is possible without water. A video was shown about what would happen to Southern California's water supply if our water supply became contaminated with sea water due to a 6.2 earthquake in the delta region of northern California. It is frightening to know that there is a 2 out of 3 chance of this happening. In Aug. of 2007 the endangered species act changed one source for water. And Southern California has lost half of the water from the Colorado River.

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
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
