Jan. 14, 2012 was the grand opening of the new sports park in Perris that is a \$25 million dollar facility that includes 6 baseball fields and 2 covered soccer fields on 35 acres. The facility was a project that used redevelopment funds from the Riverside County Redevelopment Agency.

Four of the baseball fields-the Anaheim Angel's field, Boston's Fenway Park, Los Angeles Dodger's field and New York Yankee's field are replicas of the original fields. The Angel Stadium even has the rocks in the outfield. The stands in the outfield appear to be occupied but are actually posters instead of real people. If someone hits a home run I doubt if any of the "fans" could

catch the ball!

Construction of the state of the art sports park took less than 17 months to complete and created hundreds of construction jobs and 50 other permanent jobs. There are also 4 batting cages for slow pitch softball and 4 others for baseball.

The sports park was the brain child of Riverside County 5th District Supervisor Marion Ashley who grew up in the area and as a young man had little recreational activities near his home in rural Riverside County to enjoy. Today's youth and adults will enjoy the best in facilities thanks to Supervisor Ashley's vision and leadership.

cies being raided by the State, the future development of facilities or improvements to local communities may be greatly reduced due to the State taking Redevelopment funds. Highgrove is fortunate because of the improvements we have seen from the Riverside County Economic Development Agency in improving our community such as façade improvements to Reliable Tire Co., Iowa Ave. Market, Good News Church, Tacos El Jr. # 6, Hughes Appliances, and Fix It Right auto repair to name a few. Other benefits we have seen recently is the addition of the first sewer line in Highgrove, The addition of a new Chevron Gas Station at the corner of Center St. and Iowa Ave. and the new Highgrove Library that was opened on March 19, 2011. If the improvements in Highgrove and Perris had not already been underway before the State came in and took the Redevelopment money, many of these improvements would not have been made.

As everyone knows, the economy is in bad shape from the Federal and State level on down to the local level. When the economy improves we may again see other projects become a reality but the big question is "When" will that happen? We must face reality that Highgrove may remain the same during these hard economic times but Highgrove will not always remain like it is today. When the economy improves the Highgrove Highgrove has 1,550 acres of vacant buildable land including 2,500 lots that are ready for new homes in the Spring Mountain Ranch area where \$250 million dollars that have already been invested in infrastructure before any of the new homes are built. All that is needed is for a builder to scrape off the tumbleweeds and start building homes. But that leads us back to the "When" of the equation.

Highgrove has a lot of room for growth whether we like it or not! As a long time resident of Highgrove, I too miss the smell of the orange blossoms and less traffic but we also need to be realistic. Developers have replaced our orange groves with the Spring Mountain Ranch lots that are now ready for building new homes. The economic question of the day is: will the \$250 million dollars worth of infrastructure be used for future homes when the economy returns, or will the project be abandoned and the land re-graded to plant orange groves? I think you know the realistic answer!

Highgrove needs retail services to accommodate our present population and a plan that will accommodate thousands of future residents because we know they are coming-but we do not know "when". Highgrove should be pro-active in preparing for our future and not just wait for outside influences that do not address the needs of our community and the surrounding neighborhoods.

Riverside Unified School District Asst. Superintendent attends Highgrove meeting.

Dr. Kirk Lewis was the guest speaker at the Highgrove MAC meeting on Jan. 25, 2012. He was invited to bring us up to date and answer questions about Highgrove students attending the new Grand Terrace High School and plans for another Elementary school in Highgrove.

He explained that even though funding may be lost based on average daily attendance in the Riverside school system, if a Highgrove student requests to attend the Grand Terrace High School, the Riverside Unified School District would not oppose the transfer. I am sure that each request will be reviewed by the Riverside Unified School District and also by the Colton Joint Unified School District.

Presently, high school students from Highgrove attend North High School but the new Grand Terrace High School is in San Bernardino County on the north side of Main St., that is also the county line between Riverside County and San Bernardino County, and Highgrove is across the street on the south side of Main Street. Highgrove MAC member Raina Boal pointed out that some Colton residents attend North High School in Riverside.

Dr. Lewis also explained that the Riverside Unified School District has 13 acres reserved for a new elementary school in the Spring

Mountain Ranch Area to accommodate students after the Spring Mountain Ranch homes are built. The proposed property is located east of Mt. Vernon Ave. and Spring St. but there are no immediate plans for construction until a new school is needed. At this time there is no plan to expand the existing Highgrove Elementary School southward toward Spring St. because the 13 acre parcel will be a better location for future growth. Dr. Lewis also said that the Highgrove Elementary School may soon be connected to the new sewer line that runs down Center Street

Representatives from the Colton Joint Unified School district will be invited to our next Highgrove MAC meeting on March 28, 2012 at 7:00 pm at the new library located at 530 Center St. in Highgrove. The public is always invited!

# Injured dog discovered on train tracks By John Welsh

A dog that was found on train tracks in the Highgrove area is now recovering after emergency surgery. A crossing guard discovered the 4 year old female, terrier-mix dog early Wednesday morning (Jan. 18, 2012) the Riverside county crossing guard, Linda Tobin saw the dog when she started her early-morning shift along Center St. and Transit Avenue.

A nearby resident and parent of school-age children, Sal Sanchez, assisted Tobin with getting the dog off the tracks where it had been found. "Its not right to let the animal lay there" but then she and Mr. Sanchez got a surprise. "We didn't realize it was alive" Tobin said.

She called the Riverside police Dept. and a dispatcher there got in touch with Animal Services' stand-by officer, Riverside County Animal Services Officer Gary Phals responded and transported the dog to the Western Riverside County/City Animal Shelter.

Veterinary Services team members immediately treated the dog for shock and provided her with pain medication. The dog was presumably hit by a train. The accident severed the dog's right front leg to the extent that it could not be repaired, said veterinary Dr. Ron Friedlander. The train, essentially amputated the leg, he said. Dr Friedlander performed surgery on the dog and packed the wound with saline pouches to prevent contamination. A second surgery will be needed, he said but he wanted to wait for her to recover from the first stage.

Supervising Registered Veterinary Technician Katherine Buff said she will foster the dog at her home to make sure she recovers in a more relaxed environment. Buff, who will be on vacation for the next six days beginning on Friday (Jan. 20), said she can give the dog full attention during her time away. "I'm not going anywhere anyway-and this is better for the dog's health, she said. She nicknamed the dog "Trinity"

Unfortunately, the crossing guard said she believes the dog is one of many she has witnessed left behind in the neighborhood. "So many people dump them off and then walk away, Tobin said. "It's real bad!"

### BUS RIDERSHIPHITS AN ALL-TIME HIGH

Agency reaches record 8.4 million boardings in 2011

RIVERSIDE, CA — January 24, 2012 — With eight of the last 12 months smashing ridership records, the Riverside Transit Agency (RTA) today announced that its buses carried an unprecedented number of boardings in 2011

A new report shows RTA buses carried more than 664,000 boardings in December, an 11 percent increase from December of 2010. Ridership on CommuterLink express routes was up 20 percent and Dial-A-Ride boardings climbed 16 percent. Those results bring RTA's annual total to 8.4 million boardings, an all-time high for the

#### 35-year-old agency.

RTA's previous record was set in 2009 when buses handled 8.1 million passenger trips.

"This growth reflects the value of public transportation in the communities we serve," said RTA Chairman of the Board Doug McAllister. "We are constantly looking for ways to better serve our customers and the boost in ridership is evidence that we are headed in the right direction."

The ridership surge indicates that RTA continues to be a low-cost transportation solution for more people faced with high gas prices and a troubled economy.

Other factors appear to be driving the ridership skyward. RTA frequently adjusts schedules and routing to enhance on-time performance and connectivity not only between RTA buses, but between RTA buses and Metrolink trains. The Agency has also expanded its Go-Pass and U-Pass programs to include more schools, giving a growing number of college students unlimited bus rides. Passengers are also benefitting from the recent opening of transit centers in Corona and Perris, as well as realtime bus arrival information kiosks at a growing number of locations.

When it comes to growing ridership, RTA isn't alone.

A recent report from the American Public Transportation Association showed that more Americans rode buses, commuter railroads and subways during the third quarter of 2011. Nationally, the two percent jump in transit ridership over the same period in 2010 marks the first

time in three years that ridership has increased for all three quarters. RTA's 2011 ridership is nearly eight percent higher than it was in 2010.

"This increase in ridership shows that Americans want more transportation choices and will use public transpor- tation if it is available in their community," said APTA President and CEO Michael P. Melaniphy. "Also, transit agency investments are paying off, resulting in riders experiencing a higher level of quality service."



The Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG) is making a "Regional Transportation Plan" that is a transportation plan for the next 23 years- until the year 2035. Our 10 year request for a Highgrove Metrolink station has been moved **north** of the proposed curved track that will connect the BNSF railroad track to the Perris Valley track so it will not interefere with any future trains that will operate between Riverside and Perris. Moving the Highgrove station location northward will keep the Highgrove Metrolink Station on the same property that is now owned by the Riverside County Transportation Commission. The previous location request was south of the curved track but RCTC bought property at Marlborough Ave. for a station on the Perris Valley Line track. This means that future trains to Perris will not stop between the city of Riverside and Marlborough Avenue. Future trains to Perris will leave Riverside, go around the proposed curved track at Highgrove without stopping and stop at a future Metrolink Station at Marlborough Avenue.

"How much do you get paid for working here?" Said David.



Gail and Ladd Seekins will speak on "The English Coast to Coast Path: A Unique Challenge" on February 5 at 5:00 p.m. at Highgrove UMC 938 Center Street, Highgrove.

The Seekins will present a slideshow of their 190 mile, 14-day hike along the Coast to Coast Path through Cumbria and North Yorkshire, England. Starting on the Irish Sea at the town of St. Bees and finishing on the North Sea at the historic port of Robin Hood's Bay, the Coast to Coast Path crosses three of England's largest nation parks: the Lake District, the Yorkshire Dales, and the North York Moors.

The Coast to Coast Path was devised in 1972 by the noted British hiker and guide author Alfred Wainright. He charted a route that incorporates public footpaths and rural roads. It is not an official English long distance trail, yet is become one of the world's most popular trails of its type.

The path crosses some of the most spectacular high country in England, following along lakes and high tarns and passing through forest reserves, historic villages, colorful moors, and countless miles of pasture filled with millions (it seems) of grazing sheep. The highter portions can be quite rugged. Along the way there is ample opportunity to visit histor village churches, the ruin of abbey shut down by Henry VIII, a Norman castle and prehistoric stone circles. Weather and route finding provided noteworthy challenges.

#### FINANCIAL FOCUS

Put Power of Tax Deferral to Work

As an investor, you may sometimes feel frustrated. After all, your portfolio seems to be at the mercy of the financial markets, whose volatility is beyond anyone's control. Yet you can control the quality of the investments you own and the diversification of those investments to improve your chances of attaining your long-term financial goals. One way in which to do so is to put as much as you can afford, year after year, into tax-deferred investments.

When you contribute to a taxdeferred account, your money has the potential to grow faster than it would if you placed it in a fully taxable investment — that is, an investment on which you paid taxes every year. Over time, this accelerated growth can add up to a big difference in your accumulated savings. For example, if you put \$200 each month into a taxable investment that earned a hypothetical 7 percent a year, you'd end up with about \$325,000 after 40 years, assuming you were in the 25 percent federal tax bracket. If you put that same \$200 per month into a taxdeferred investment that earned the same hypothetical 7 percent a year, you'd accumulate about \$515,000 or nearly \$200,000 more than you'd have with the taxable investment.\*

Of course, you will eventually have to pay taxes on the tax-deferred investment, but by the time you're retired, you might be in a lower tax bracket. Furthermore, depending on how much you choose to withdraw each year from your tax-deferred account, you can have some control over the amount of taxes you'll pay.

Clearly, tax deferral can be a smart choice, but what sort of tax-deferred vehicles are available?

One of your most attractive choices

will be your employer-sponsored retirement plan, such as a 401(k). Your earnings have the potential to grow on a tax-deferred basis, and since you typically fund your plan with pre-tax dollars, the more you put in, the lower your annual taxable income. If you're lucky, your employer will even match some of your contributions. Consequently, it's almost always a good idea to put in as much as you can afford into your 401(k), up to the contribution limits, and to boost your contributions every time your salary increases. In 2012, you can contribute up to \$17,000 to your 401(k), plus an additional \$5,500 if you're 50 or older.

Even if you participate in a 401(k) plan, you can probably also contribute to a traditional IRA. Your earnings have the potential to grow taxdeferred and your contributions may be tax deductible, depending on your income level. In 2012, you can put in up to \$5,000 to a traditional IRA, or \$6,000 if you're 50 or older. (If you meet certain income guidelines, you might be eligible to contribute to a Roth IRA, which offers tax-free earnings, provided you don't start taking withdrawals until you're 59-1/2 and you've had your account at least five years.)

Finally, if you've "maxed out" on both your 401(k) and your IRA, you may want to consider a fixed annuity. Your earnings grow tax-deferred, contribution limits are high, and you can structure your annuity to provide you with an income stream you can't outlive.

The more years in which you invest in tax-deferred vehicles, the better. So start putting the power of tax deferral to work soon.



I was told they never refused a request to serve. The Pflaumers moved very recently to Yucaipa where a relative lives.

A service was held at the Grand Terrace SDA church on January 7, 2012 and I was amazed at how many people attended and at how the pastors, John Brunt, John Choi, vocalist, Susie Starr and pianist Alva Waworoendeng contributed beautifully. There were about 60 or more people there and I saw several weeping. Pastor Brunt is particularly a favorite of mine because he granted me a long interview about 10 years ago when he was first hired as the permanent pastor for the church. He has not disappointed anyone.

Paul Pflaumer will be remembered for many kindnesses and his dedication to the church and to Grand Terrace and of course to his loving wife Lucille. He was a gentleman and a brilliant and knowledgeable person. If there is a heaven I know that he is there helping the angels fold plastic bags perfectly.





## Tribute to Ray Hyson: RR cartoonist:

Many of you know that I worked on the Santa Fe/BNSF railroad for 41 ½ years as a Switchman, Brakeman and Conductor. What many people do not know is that for many years the stories and incidents that happened on a daily basis were captured in cartoons by the late Ray Hyson that were randomly attached to the walls of the crew dispatcher's office where the train crews would go to work in San Bernardino. The crew dispatcher's office was located under the south east end of the Mt. Vernon bridge that goes over the BNSF piggy back/container yard in San Bernardino. These humorous



sketches appeared for all of the train crews to see and many of them captured what happened in, on, and around the trains. In 1978 Ray published his first railroad cartoon book titled "HIGH-BALLERS". In 1979 he published Volume 2 and continued his stories about the fictitional "Wooden Axle and Western Railroad". Each book had about 150 cartoons and he was the author and publisher of both books. Unfortunately, my good friend has been gone for many years but I cherish my autographed copies and decided to share some of these cartoons with you to help keep his humor alive. Ray's cartoons still bring back many good memories of working on the railroad. Ray was a man who could capture an incident or story and put it down on paper for all of his fellow workers to see and enjoy.






