Mt. Vernon to Palmyrita re-opened



This is a view of Palmyrita Ave. looking west from Mt. Vernon Avenue. The long awaited opening of Mt. Vernon Ave. to Palmyrita Ave. was completed on Dec. 2, 2008 by the Riverside County Transportation Department.

On Aug. 18, 2008, I sent an e-mail to Juan Perez, Director of Transportation for Riverside County and I ask for the K-rail to be removed at the intersection of Mt. Vernon and Palmyrita. He replied that the signing of the easement documents were holding up the progress of Mt. Vernon being used as a public right-of-way since Spring Mountain Ranch was into receivership. The paperwork problem has been solved and traffic can now use this new road. Thank you to Juan Perez, Supervisor Ashley, the Riverside County Economic Development Agency and Steve Berry, Assistant City Manager of Grand Terrace for helping get this road opened! Unfortunately, this work was done right after we went to print for our December issue and we had to wait until this time to make a public announcement and thank those who participated. Public Hearing for 40 acre development goes to Board of Supervisors Jan. 13, 2009 at 1;30 pm

Representatives of the 40 acre parcel of vacant land in the middle of Highgrove, owned by the Bixby Land Co., have requested to "Fast track" their proposed development of 11 warehouses and office buildings and change the zoning from IP (Industrial Park) to MSC (Manufacturing-Service Commercial).

All 5 of the Highgrove Municipal Advisory Council members and 2 alternates opposed these changes in writing to the Riverside County Planning Commission prior to the Planning Commission meeting on Nov. 5, 2008. But the Planning Commission authorized the change in zoning over our objections and the decision now goes before the Riverside County Board of Supervisors on Jan. 13, 2009. The meeting will be held on the 1st. floor of the County Administration building, 4080 Lemon St. in Riverside. Interested parties are encouraged to attend and speak under public comments. Cards must be filled out and presented to the clerk of the board and there is a 3 minute time limit to express your views.

The written notice states: 11 warehouses and office buildings ranging in size from 6,112 sq. ft. to 67,432 sq. ft. for a total of 370,595 sq. feet. This project also proposes 586 parking spaces.

(A copy of this notice is available at www.highgrovehappenings.net) The consultant wants you to believe it is a "Business Park" but the notice states: "11 warehouses and office buildings"!

The warehouse/buildings are being built on speculation and there are no tenants who have agreed to occupy these buildings. And no new jobs will be created until they are occupied. In addition, this project has no provision for any community services such as a shopping center, market, bank, post office

Greyhound Bus/Metrolink Service

What do they have in common? Location, Location!



The picture above shows a Metrolink train passing over Iowa Avenue. Penhall Trucking (Arrow), is located on the west side of Iowa Ave. and would be an ideal location for a Greyhound Station.

There are no residents in the area of the triangular shaped Penhall property which has RR tracks on one side, the walls of an existing warehouse on another side, and the remaining side will be along the elevated part of the Iowa Ave. overpass. Access to this property will be under the proposed Iowa Ave. overpass on the south side, and parallel to the BNSF RR tracks. The Greyhound Station would be within walking distance of a future Metrolink Station near the train shown in the picture. Iowa Ave. is also along the Riverside Transit Agency's (RTA) existing bus route 25 between Riverside and Loma Linda. Two forms of bus transportation would be available close to the proposed Metrolink Station. A Metrolink Station is needed for present commuters between Riverside and San Bernardino. and future rail commuters between Riverside and Perris. Four types of transportation would be located in the same

area: Greyhound & RTA bus service, Metrolink commuter train service, and automobile traffic could use the new proposed 1/2 mile road between Citrus St. and Spring St. when trains block the grade crossings. This short road could go through the vacant property north of the new warehouses on Citrus St. that is the same property needed for the curved track from the Perris Valley Line to the BNSF main lines!

Back on Aug. 4, 2008, I met with Riverside City Manager, Brad Hudson and his assistant Belinda Graham in Brad's office to discuss my plan to relocate Greyhound to the outskirts of Riverside. I have never heard from them in response to my proposal! But I keep reading in the Press Enterprise about how Riverside wanted to move Greyhound to the west side of the I-215 freeway by Columbia Ave. and that fell through, and how they are considering buying

or other service related businesses that Highgrove so desperately needs. This project will have a major impact on our community because the increased traffic will include more trucks! Their new north/south road between Center St. and Spring St. will only accommodate trucks onto Center St. because no trucks over 6 tons are allowed on Prospect Ave. in either direction at Spring Street. Trucks will have to use Center St or go east on Spring Street. If they encroach onto our restricted neighborhood streets, it becomes another enforcement issue placed onto the CHP.

In this **economic** slump, it does not seem feesable that these buildings will be occupied very soon with so many "For Lease" and "Available" signs on existing warehouses close by, on the <u>south</u> side of the arroyo. This project skips over Bixby's own 27 acres of vacant land on the <u>north</u> side of the arroyo. So far, all of the new warehouses have been built south of the arroyo but this project will change that! **Highgrove needs "services"- not warehouses!** For comments from the city of Riverside please turn to **Warehouses P. 5**



The Center now offers FREE access to high-speed WiFi network. The community is now free to bring their laptops to the Center and surf the net in the Cool Center.



out Greyhound for \$625,000 to get them out of their \$1.00 per year lease agreement.

Then on Dec. 15, 2008 I met with Riverside County Supervisor, Bob Buster to talk about relocating Greyhound and also to discuss the Highgrove Metrolink Station. This property is within his jurisdiction as County Supervisor but it is also within the city limits of Riverside. He informed me that Greyhound was interested in the property on the south/east corner of Center St. and Iowa Ave. in Highgrove. But moving Riverside's problem to Highgrove is not the answer and I oppose this location because it is too close to our businesses and residences.

That same day (Dec. 15, 2008), I gave CD copies of my Greyhound plan to Supervisor Buster, to Jaime Hurtado for Supervisor Ashley, to Juan Perez, Riverside County Transportation Director, and to the city of Riverside for Brad Hudson, Belinda Graham, and Councilman, Mike Gardner, who is the city councilman in ward one where this property is located. Then on Dec. 20, 2008 I

talked to the owner of the property who leases to Penhall Trucking and sent him a copy of the photo shown on the front page and asked him to view the Greyhound portion of our web site. He is willing to listen to my proposal that includes talking to the city of Riverside about relocating. If Penhall Trucking were relocated, this would be an ideal location for Greyhound since they need a building to use for their station.

Barrier on Mt. Vernon at Spring St. removed

In preparation for opening Mt. Vernon Ave. to Palmyrita Ave., the intersection at Mt. Vernon and Spring St. had to have the barrier removed that blocked the southbound lane and the intersection had to be repaved and striped. New striping was painted between Mt. Vernon and Palmyrita and both intersections.



Hugo Munoz, a crew member of the Riverside County Transportation Dept. directed traffic on Dec. 1, 2008 during the repaving of the intersection.



The crew above is shown using the asphalt paving machine at the corner of Mt. Vernon and Spring Street. There are large pipes under this intersection that were placed there as part of the flood control portion of the Spring Mountain Ranch grading and portions over the pipe had settled making the pavement uneven. The potholes were filled several weeks ago and now the new asphalt has made the intersection nice and smooth and will enable traffic to get from Mt. Vernon Ave. to Palmyrita Avenue.

This project has also been reviewed by the city of Riverside since Highgrove is within their sphere of influence. The letter from the city Planning Director to the County Planning Department dated March 21, 2008 stated in part: "The proposed warehouse uses are thus inconsistent with the area's existing development pattern, particularly given its adjacency to sensitive land uses including Highgrove Elementary School, the Highgrove Library and the surrounding established residential neighborhoods:" In another portion of this same letter it states: "Tentative Parcel Map No. 35612 identifies Parcel # 14 as a detention basin. Given the fact that established residential uses exist adjacent (to the west) to the proposed detention basin, Planning Division staff recommends that such detention basin be moved to a more central location within the proposed project". Please turn to P. 6, read about the 88 apartment units that are planned in addition to the Bixby warehouses and then please read the editorial.

Dial-A-Ride Ridership Continues to Climb

Agency's Overall Ridership On Pace to Hit Record

Gas prices may be going down but that hasn't slowed down RTA ridership, including Dial-A-Ride service.



The Riverside Transit Agency experienced another ridership increase during November and re-

mains on pace to reach eight million boardings for the year, which would be the most in the Agency's 31-year history. New information released this week shows 658,000 systemwide boardings in November, a 19 percent increase compared to November of last year. Ridership on CommuterLink express routes was up 69 percent from a year ago and Dial-A-Ride boardings climbed 23 percent.

The Agency's Dial-A-Ride program is a curb-to-curb advanced reservation transportation service for seniors and persons with disabilities. RTA has two types of Dial-A-Ride service: 1) Senior/Disabled service and 2) ADA Priority Service, which is given to persons certified under the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Many customers use the service to travel to senior centers, the grocery store, entertainment venues and medical appointments. Others use it to travel to and from developmental workshops for the disabled.

Seniors age 60 and above and persons with disabilities are eligible for local DAR service within a single city and within three quarters of a mile of local fixed route bus service. Persons who are ADA certified are eligible for trips throughout the RTA service area and within three quarters of a mile of local fixed route bus service.

The base fare for DAR service is \$2.50 per passenger, per boarding. Reservations may be made by calling (800) 795-7887.



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

88 Apartment units planned in Highgrove

As many of you already know, there is a new library planned near the intersection of Center St. and Michigan Avenue. Just before Christmas I met with Jaime Hurtado from Supervisor Marion Ashley's office and Anthony Mize from Homebuilders LLC to discuss the proposed construction of 88 apartments south of the new library. The plans show 56 units with 989 sq. feet, 16 units with 1,153 sq. ft. and 16 units with 1,219 sq. feet. A layout was given to me and I told Mr. Mize I would publish his proposal in the "Highgrove Happenings" and ask for community input. He is aware that the existing residences along Michigan Ave. are ½ acre lots and there have been previous objections to high density housing during the Spring Mountain Ranch planning.

The developer has been invited to our Municipal Advisory Council meeting on Jan. 28, 2009 at the Norton Younglove Community Center, 459 Center St. in Highgrove. The meeting starts at 7:00 pm and the public is invited to attend and speak under public comments or send your written comments to our e-mail at: highgrovenews@roadrunner.com Here is a layout of what is being considered by the new library. Public comments encouraged:



Editorial: Neither one of the newly proposed developments; the 40 acre Bixby warehouse construction by the School; nor this additional proposal to build 88 apartment units (above), have addressed the need for a new east/west road between Spring St. and Citrus Street. Any new developments in Highgrove should include a provision for providing this important road to accommodate future traffic created by their projects. The Bixby project shows 586 new parking spaces and Center St. will be the main route for trucks in or out of the area. Spring St. has no westward access but could be used if it were extended ½ to Citrus St. near the future Iowa Ave. overpass. If this new short road is not built and new developments continue to seek approval of their projects without a provision for any new east/west road, then we will be headed for even more traffic jams on our existing streets when freight trains block Center St. and/or Main Street. The 1/2 mile extension of Spring St. westward to Citrus St. is essential because with this new short road, any traffic on the east side of the BNSF RR tracks would not have to cross over the RR tracks to get to Riverside or San Bernardino. This road would go parallel to the BNSF tracks on the east side and connect to Citrus St. at the base of the new Iowa overpass.

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
Non-metallic historical marker replaced by Riverside County EDA

Text of Highgrove Hydroelectric Plant marker

County of Riverside Historical Marker No. 024

The first commercially significant hydroelectric plant in California, designed and built by Gustavus Olivio Newman, went into service here in 1888 utilizing the flow of the Riverside Water Company canal to produce about 225 kilowatts of power used for the arc light illumination of downtown streets in Riverside and Colton. The plant was destroyed by fire in 1915. Marker placed in cooperation with the Native Sons and Daughters of the Golden West #296, 241, and 299 Billy Holcome Chapter, E Clampus Vitus; and Riverside County Historical Commission -May 1, 1991.

Growth of the Edison company

The Southern California Edison Company has played an important role in the settlement and continued of the Kern River Valley since the year 1900. in 1972 over 2 million dollars of property taxes were paid into the Kern County Treasury by the Edison Company, half of which was used exclusively for schools and roads. Even outweighing the financial ability to this area are the contributions made by the company's employees and their families as they lived and worked here on the Kern.

It might be interesting therefore to look at the early development of the Southern California Edison Company. An overview of the Company's success and California as a whole is necessary to better understand their accomplishments here. A good place to begin would be the year 1879 when Thomas Alva Edison perfected his incandescent lamp. Three years later he officiated at the opening

of the first central power plant located on Pearl Street in downtown New York. Among Edison's first 59 customers was the New York Times, where workmen had rigged 25 lights in the editorial office. When the incandescent lights came on for the first time at 5:00 pm, Sept. 4, 1882, a veteran reporter summed up the history making occasion with these words:

"It seemed almost like writing by daylight to have a light without a particle of a flicker-and scarcely any heat to make the headache".

That was the beginning of America's electric utility industry. Before this, isolated plants had served individual users, but Edison's Pearl Street Station was the first attempt to extensive and continuing distribution of bulk electrical power. Within 4 years the demand for this new kind of power had spread across the United States. In 1887, some 600 electric light companies were in operation, although few of these made a serious effort to provide electricity on a round-the-clock basis.

In that year, two such small companies began service in Southern California, one at the community of Highgrove near Riverside, and the other at Santa Barbara.

At Highgrove, the first commercial service from a hydroelectric generating plant in California became a reality as a result of negotiations between Charles R Lloyd of San Francisco and the Riverside Water Company, owners of a canal under construction near Highgrove.

Lloyd was a behind-the-scenes type entrepreneur who, throughout the earliest days of hydroelectricity development, was likely to be found involved in many deals in which commissions were to be made. Near Highgrove, the Riverside Water Company's canal dropped 50 feet, and Lloyd saw an opportunity to build a small hydro plant to provide lights for Colton and Riverside. On May 8, 1886, Lloyd concluded a tentative lease agreement with the water company to install a 12 horsepower waterwheel at the drop in the canal, at a lease price of \$1.00 per H. P. per month. However, water was not let through the canal until April of 1887, and as other developers also wanted to use the drop, Lloyd

finally had to up his bid to \$250.00 per month.

When the lease was concluded, Lloyd engaged Gustavus O. Newman, Chief Engineer of the Riverside Water Company, to design and build the Highgrove plant.

(Newman later became Chief Engineer of the Pacific Light and Power Corporation.)

The plant, as originally built, was a wooden building containing a single waterwheel driving a direct current dynamo. The plant went into service in September 1887, supplying power for 15 arc lights in Colton and 15 in Riverside.

In 1888, Lloyd organized the San Bernardino Electric Light and Power Company, and its principal priority was the Highgrove plant into which several additional dynamos were installed as demand picked up. In 1896, Highgrove was extensively rebuilt in order to provide electricity for streetcars in nearby San Bernardino. A steel penstock replaced the wooden flume, and the original arc machinery was replaced by a General Electric 150kw, 3 phase, 2,220volt alternator, operated by two water turbines connected by belting. Power was stepped up to 15,000 volts for delivery to Colton and San Bernardino.

In 1903, the Highgrove hydro plant became the property of the Pacific Light and Power Corporation, a predecessor of the Southern California Edison Company. The last important power delivery from Highgrove was made in December 1914. The plant burned down in March 1915. However a substantial part of the plant remained in 1973: the stone and concrete forebay, the penstock that still carries water beneath Iowa Avenue, and the concrete piers of the plant-are all in a lot surrounded by eucalyptus trees. And until 1952, the Edison Company leased power privileges on the site from the Riverside Water Company at \$250.00 per month.

The marker is located on the west side of Iowa Ave. south of the intersection of Iowa Ave. and Spring St. about 1/2 block across the street from Zorbas.

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Skunk Deodorant Formula

My veterinarian gave me this formula late one night in response to my frantic call when one of my dogs got sprayed by a skunk. Whether a dog or other animal is directly sprayed or has just rolled in the scent, this formula will work. I have soaked clothes in it and been able to wear them again..

The formula., developed by chemist Paul Krebaum, first appeared in an article that appeared in the October 18, 1993 issue of Chemical and Engineering News..

First, wipe off the dog with clean, dry terry cloth towels to remove the oil-based skunk spray. This part is crucial as the towels help remove the oil of the spray, which is the hardest part to get rid of. It is a good idea to double bag the towels and throw them away. Washing them will spread the oil inside your: washing machine. If the dog has been sprayed in the face, use as many dry towels as necessary to remove the oily residue. Then wash the area around the face with a "no tears" baby shampoo.

Now for the formula. In a bucket mix: 1 quart fresh hydrogen peroxide One (1/4) cup baking soda 1 teaspoon liquid dish soap. (1 use Dawn.) Fresh hydrogen peroxide, from an unopened bottle, is essential. If the bottle you have on hand has already been opened, this recipe may not work.



Hydrogen peroxide loses its chemical properties and turns to water over time. Use a fresh bottle that has not been opened to be on the safe side.

The mixture will bubble. Thoroughly wet the victim in this mixture, taking care to keep it out of the eyes. Wash and rub the dog with the mixture as if it were shampoo, while it is bubbling. Then rinse the dog with clean water. In warm weather this can be done outside with a hose. In cold weather, I do it in the shower.

Of course this means I have to take a shower with them! Do another application of the formula, and repeat the dean water rinse. The soap breaks down the oil in which the odor: is suspended, and the hydrogen peroxide and the baking soda neutralize the scent. Do not premix the solution or store it in a bottle. The bubbling will cause it to rupture: the container. I keep a copy of this formula, and all the ingredients both at home and in my vehicle first aid kit. The hydrogen peroxide is also good to induce vomiting if a dog has eaten something they should not such as chocolate.

My vehicle first aid kit is for dogs as well as people.

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RINGING IN THE NEW YEAR WITH NEW LAWS

Several new laws designed to help strengthen existing DUI laws

(Sacramento) With a new year on the horizon, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) wants to remind motorists of a handful of new laws, passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Schwarzenegger, that go into effect in 2009.

"The overall safety of the motoring public is our primary concern," says CHP Commissioner Joe Farrow. "Not only will these new laws enhance a motorist's safety, many of them are a step toward ridding the roadways of drunk drivers and the tragedy they cause."

Below are the major changes to driving regulations and vehicle equipment.

Texting While Driving (SB 28, Simitian) This new law makes it an infraction to write, send, or read text-based communication on an electronic wireless communications device, such as a cell phone, while driving a motor vehicle. Previously this was only illegal for individuals under 18 years of age, but now has been expanded to all drivers.

Driving Under the Influence (DUI) Zero Tolerance (AB 1165, Maze) This new law prohibits a convicted DUI offender from operating a motor vehicle with a blood alcohol level (BAC) of .01 percent or greater while on probation for DUI. The law requires the driver to submit to a Preliminary Alcohol Screening (PAS) test, a portable breath test to determine the presence of alcohol. If the driver refuses, or if the driver submits and has a BAC of .01 or greater, a citation will be issued, the driver's license will be taken and driving privileges will be suspended. In addition, the vehicle will be impounded.

Ignition Interlock Devices (IID) (SB 1190, Oropeza) This new law reduces the BAC from .20 percent to .15 percent or more at the time of arrest to trigger a

requirement for the court to give heightened consideration for the installation of an IID for a first-time offender convicted of DUI of an alcoholic beverage.

Ignition Interlock Devices (SB 1388, Torlakson) Effective July 2009, this new law transfers authority for the administration of mandatory IID programs from the state courts to the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). This law also authorizes the DMV to require any driver convicted of driving with a suspended license due to a prior conviction for DUI to install an IID in any vehicle that the offender owns or operates.

Alcohol-Related Reckless Driving (AB 2802, Houston) This new law requires the court to order a person convicted of alcohol-related reckless driving to participate in a licensed DUI program for at least nine months, if that person has a prior conviction for alcohol-related reckless driving or DUI within ten years. Additionally, the court is required to revoke the person's probation for the failure to enroll in, participate in, or complete a licensed DUI program.

Global Positioning Systems (GPS) (SB 1567, Oropeza) This new law allows a portable GPS device to be mounted in a 7-inch square in the lower corner of the windshield on the passenger side of the vehicle, or in a 5-inch square in the lower corner of the windshield on the driver's side. These are the only two locations on a *windshield* where a GPS device can be mounted. The GPS device can only be used for navigational purposes while the motor vehicle is being operated, and it is required to be mounted outside of an airbag deployment zone.

Motorcycles (AB 2272, Fuentes) This new law changes the definition of a motorcycle by deleting the weight limitation and deleting the separate definition for electrically powered motorcycles. The law will now allow fully enclosed, three-wheeled vehicles

to have access to high-occupancy vehicle (HOV) lanes regardless of occupancy.

Clean Air Stickers: Misuse and Penalties (SB 1720, Lowenthal) This new law makes it an infraction for anyone who forges, counterfeits, falsifies, passes, or attempts to pass, acquire possess, sell, or offer for sale a genuine or counterfeit "Clean Air Sticker."

911 Telephone System Abuse (AB 1976, Benoit) This new law increases the penalties for any person who knowingly uses, or allows the use of, the 911 telephone system for any reason other than an emergency. Those who misuse, or allow the misuse of, the 911 telephone system are guilty of an infraction, and subject to either a written warning or a fine.

Special License Plates (AB 190, Bass) This new law, when approved by local authorities, allows veterans whose vehicles display plates honoring Pearl Harbor Survivors, Legion of Valor recipients, former American Prisoners of War, Congressional Medal of Honor recipients, or Purple Heart recipients to park their vehicles that weigh not more

than 6,000 pounds gross weight, without charge, in any metered parking space.

Studded Pneumatic Tires (AB 1971, Portantino) This new law allows the use of pneumatic tires with retractable metal-type studs, year round, as long as the studs are retracted between May 1 through October 31. However, the law prohibits a tire with retractable metal-type studs on a vehicle from being worn to a point that the metal-type studs protrude beyond the tire tread when retracted.

Spilling Cargo Loads (AB 2714, Keene) This new law eases restrictions on cargo loads of straw or hay to allow individual pieces that do not pose a threat to life or property, to escape from bales of straw or hay that are being transported by a vehicle upon a highway, so long as those bales are loaded and secured according to federal regulations. Assault on Highway Workers (SB 1509, Lowenthal) This new law provides an increased penalty for assault and battery crimes committed against Caltrans highway workers who are engaged in the performance of their duties.





On Friday night Dec. 19, 2008, about 9:00 pm, a vehicle going westbound on Palmyrita Ave. at a high rate of speed (estimated at approx. 100 mph) ran this stop sign on East La Cadena Dr., crashed through the freeway fence, onto the northbound freeway, through the center divider K- rail onto the southbound lanes, and onto West La Cadena Drive against a tree, according to Sgt. Dave Ruddy of the Riverside Police Department. Ten vehicles were involved including one that ended up on its top. The driver suffered major injuries but no other information is available at this time as to the seriousness of other injuries. The I-215 freeway was completely shut down for about 2 hours in both directions. If you look in front of the vehicle shown in the picture, you can see where a steel guardrail has been attached to the concrete K-rail for a temporary repair where the vehicle went through the center divider.


