Burglars hit new Highgrove Library.....again!!

For the 2nd time the new library in Highgrove has been burglarized by thieves who have stolen the large electrical equipment that controls all of the electrical systems in the building. Thieves broke the lock on the outside electrical box about 30 feet from the building and turned off the power to the building then proceeded to remove \$25,000 worth of heavy electrical components from the electrical room. The thieves were more interested in the heavy components than just the copper wire. The equipment was replaced by the builder and the power restored but it happened again. The 2nd time county funds were used


to replace the equipment and more security systems were added. After the 2nd time there was a 24/7 security guard hired until the power could once again be restored. The library re-opened again on Wed. June 23, 2011.

The Riverside County Sheriff Dept. needs your help in identifying the suspects who were caught by the video surveillance cameras. Their vehicle was described as an F-series white Ford pick-up with an extended cab and tan or gray rocker panels with chrome rims.

Truck hits pole-railroad ties catch fire!



On June 21, 2011 Highgrove station 19 (left) and Rubidoux station 38 (right) as well as units from San Bernardino County and Moreno Valley, responded to the fire at Center St. and Commercial Ave. by the RR tracks.



On May 1, 2011, two unknown suspects stole \$25,000 dollars in electrical equipment from the Riverside County Library located at 530 Center Street in Highgrove. The suspects disabled power to the library, thus deactivating the alarm and the video surveillance system. The suspects broke into the electrical room and removed the main switchboard and gear. The two pictured males are suspects in this burglary. The vehicle is possibly a white Ford F-series truck, extra cab, with a tan or gray rocker panel and chrome rims.





This is one way to cut down on a house payment! This house on Iowa Ave. near the liquor store was demolished on June 1, 2011.




New Chevron Station almost ready.

Don't fence me in..... or out!




Across the street from the house that was demolished is another item of interest that has drawn criticism of the new tenant who now occupies the former Hughes Appliance building on the east side of Iowa Ave. that was improved by the Riverside County Economic development Agency under the façade improvement program. The new tenant has installed a chain link fence between his business and the business next door that extends into the asphalt parking area. The post has been bent by vehicles running into the fence because the fence makes it difficult to park at the neighboring business. The location of this new chain link fence has been brought to the attention of Riverside County Code Enforcement and according to Tim Wheeler from Riverside County Land Use: "Mr. Oglesby needs to remove/demo the fencing down

to what is approved by PP23510 or apply for a substantial conformance to permit the addition of the fence. As of today's date (May 17, 2011) he has not applied for a substantial conformance to permit the addition of the fence. Code enforcement is now the only county Dept. he needs to comply w/in regards to resolving his citation".

Another controversial fence in Hemet, that was installed by the Riverside County Transportation Commission, created parking problems for Hemet's Saturday morning Farmers Market according to an article in the Press-Enterprise on June 24, 2011. The fence blocks off an area of abandoned track owned by RCTC but has been used for parking for the farmers market.





David and the Zundappes

David had a favorite mental pastime and that was to imagine standing between two mirrors and wonder at the never ending reflections of himself receding into infinity. Which David was the real one anyway? On the other hand, was anything real? Was tonight real, and if so, then why had he fallen backwards into the red dirt outside the Furrmen compound holding the shoe of a grown man known as "The Baby"? The sun had set an hour earlier and mixed with the smells of cooking beans, something like burning rags and just a hint of skunk odor, David could smell the scent of the surrounding pine trees of Buzzard Creek, Oklahoma. With family two thousand miles away in Squires Camp, California, my older brother had come home to get away from a little trouble back in Stratford where some bicycles had come up missing. It was a mild Indian Summer evening and David missed his family. He had been longing for two years to come back to the family farm but not under these circumstances. Home, he now understood was where family was, and his family was fragmented. He was alone and how he came to be holding the Baby's brogan shoe this night will require some explaining going back to times even before David was born, or for that matter before Baby, Myrtle In The Bushes, Eldridge, Billy, Candido and the rest of the Furrmen ever founded the Zundappe compound in Buzzard Creek. For now, these real people were just shadows on the tent wall illuminated by the

kerosene lamps. In the Midwest, where whole towns emptied and populations undulated with the seasonal crops, a certain segment of this human flotsam settled in the backwoods of Mc Curtain County Oklahoma and David was temporarily going to be a part of important human history whether he wanted it or not. He had been adopted and accepted by the Zundappers of Buzzard Creek and it wasn't all that bad to tell you the truth.

Having previously alluded to the Zundappers, I guess now is a good time to explain how an ancient European religious order found its way to twentieth century Oklahoma. The credit goes to a Swiss Zundappe missionary named Roy Eugene Fermin, maybe the hardest working Zundapper of all time. Roy believed in work and all the good it could bring you and it is ironic that in time his sect came to embrace the exact opposite of this philosophy. By the time Roy, or Brother Fermin, as he called himself, had worked his way westward across the states he was tired and ready to settle down and Buzzard Creek seemed to have all the makings of a new world. Riverside County is planning on doing what they call a "project" in our little town. This so-called "project" is a plan to put 89 lowincome apartments behind the new library -- and right next to Highgrove Elementary. It also re-zones our area from low and mediumdensity residential to high-density residential. In lay-man's terms, this "project" opens the door for other "projects" of the same kind -ones that stuff as many living spaces as possible in as small amount of land as possible. I'm sure their intention is to benefit the Highgrove community, but it is my contention (and I believe the contention of Highgrove residents as a whole) that it would not benefit us in any way -- it would actually serve as a huge detriment to our wonderful little neighborhood. There are many reasons for this.

Sheriff's Dept. seeking help!

On Tuesday, June 14, 2011, at about 8:45 PM deputies from the Riverside County Sheriff's Department, Jurupa Valley Station, responded to the Circle K Market, located in the 8000 block of Mission Avenue, Glen Avon regarding a robbery which had just occurred. Deputies immediately responded to the location but the suspect had already fled the scene.

The investigation revealed that a male entered the store, brandished a handgun and demanded money from the clerk who was working the cash register. The clerk complied with the suspects demands and gave him an undisclosed amount of cash. The suspect was described as a Hispanic male adult, between the ages of eighteen and twenty-five years, with short black hair, and what appears to be a small scar on the back of his head. He was about five feet. five inches tall and weighed about one hundred and forty pounds.

Later that same night a suspect matching the same description robbed a Valero Gas Station in the 300 block of Stephens at 10:00 PM, in the community of Highgrove, and a Valero Gas Station at 11:45 PM, in the 13000 block of Fern in the community of Cabazon.





Know Your Investment Risks — and How to Respond

When you invest, you take some risks. While you can't totally avoid these risks, you can take steps to help reduce their impact and increase your comfort level. And the more comfortable you are with your investments, the easier it will be to follow a long-term strategy that can help you meet your goals.

Let's look at the most common types of risk related to investing, along with some suggestions on helping to reduce these risks:

Losing principal — This type of risk is most closely associated with investing. For example, when you purchase a stock, you know that its value could go up or down. If it drops below your purchase price, and you then sell your shares, you will lose some of your principal.

Your response — You can't eliminate the risk of losing principal, but by owning a mix of stocks, bonds, government securities and other types of investments, you can help reduce the impact of volatility on your portfolio. Keep in mind, though, that diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against loss.

Losing value when interest rates change — This type of risk primarily affects fixed-income investments, such as bonds. If you

purchase a bond that pays, say, a 4% interest rate, and the market rate goes up to 5%, then the value of your bond will drop because no one will be willing to pay you the full price for it when newer, higher-yielding bonds are available.

Your response — You can combat, or even ignore, interest rate risk by holding your bonds until they mature. By doing so, you'll get your full principal back, provided the issuer doesn't default, and you'll continue to receive regular interest payments unless the bonds are "called," or repurchased by the issuer. (You can help protect against this by purchasing bonds that have some degree of "call protection" and by owning bonds with different maturities.)

Losing purchasing power — This risk largely applies to fixed-rate investments such as certificates of deposit (CDs). To illustrate: If you purchase a CD that pays 2%, and the inflation rate is 3%, you are actually losing purchasing power.

Your response — Despite their vulnerability to inflation, CDs can offer you some valuable benefits, such as preservation of principal. Yet if you are concerned about fighting inflation, you may want to look for investments than have the po-

tential to offer rising income, such as dividend-paying stocks. In fact, you can find stocks that have increased their dividends for many consecutive years. (Be aware, though, that companies can reduce or eliminate dividends at any time. Also, an investment in stocks fluctuates, and you could lose your principal.)

Apart from these individual techniques to reduce investment-related risk, you should also save early and save often — because the more money you accumulate, the greater your ability to follow a long-term strategy that reflects your personal risk toler-

ance. That's why it's a good idea to contribute as much as possible over the years to your IRA and 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan.

By understanding the different types of investment risk, and by acting to help lessen them, you can reduce much of the stress sometimes associated with investing — while you increase your prospects for achieving your objectives.






