Input is needed to determine what should be done about the burros in Highgrove. Should they be captured in a corral, neutered and a chip in-





SANDALS CHURCH IS HOSTING

WEEKLY HEALING

Sandals Church to launch a Tuesday healing night to provide support groups for those seeking recovery from struggles such as abuse, addiction and grief:

RIVERSIDE, CA – Sandals Church launched in 1998 with a vision of being real with self, God and others. Lead pastor Matt Brown sought to build a church where people could be honest about life's pain, temptations and shortcomings.

As the church grew, church leaders sought to live out this vision by offering ministries to help those recovering from abuse, addiction and other struggles.

After running a small-scale healing and recovery ministry for those who attended the church over the last few years, church leaders saw a bigger vision for the role of the church in helping those throughout the community overcome addictions and recover from abuse.

Sandals will offer a weekly healing and recovery night that will be open to both members of the church and anyone from the surrounding community seeking support and assistance in overcoming addiction, healing from abuse and support for other issues.

"We initially launched our healing ministry because we realized that helping people overcome addiction aligned perfectly with our vision for being real with ourselves, God and others," said Brown. "We as a church are called to share this vision of being real and want to offer an opportunity for healing and recovery to those in our surrounding neighborhoods and community."

A key element of the healing groups that will be offered on the Tuesday healing

and recovery night is that they will be led by people who have struggled with these issues and found healing through a relationship with Jesus and the

support of others.

One of the key leaders for the recovery support groups is Dwayne Wallace, a Sandals Church member who helped launch Sandals' initial healing ministry. Wallace, who spent the majority of his life battling an addiction to alcohol, knows first-hand the pain and isolation that addiction can cause.

Real Healing at Sandals Church will run on Tuesday nights starting at 6:30 p.m. Childcare will be provided at no cost and food will be available. Recovery support groups will include:

•Drug and alcohol abuse and addiction •Codependency •Sexual abuse •Postabortion •Anger and anxiety •Grief and loss •Divorce

With a vision of being "real with ourselves, God and others," Sandals has served the area for more than 14 years. Having begun with a group of eight people meeting in Brown's living room, Sandals is now the third largest church in Riverside.

In addition to the Tuesday healing and recovery night, weekly worship services at Sandals Church are held on Sundays at 9:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. at Sandals main campus at 150 Palmyrita Avenue in Riverside. Beginning Sunday, September 16, Sandals will offer a worship service at 10:30 a.m. at Frank Miller Middle School at 17925 Krameria Ave. in Riverside. 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

The above item is a "4 in one" fruit caliper manufactured by the late O.K. Face from Highgrove and is used to measure and monitor growth of Navel oranges, Valencia oranges, Lemons and Grapefruit.

The above item was mailed to me from Jim Carrara from Montgomery Creek, California which is in the northern part of the state.


You may recall that several months ago we published an old photo showing my father Ray Barnett, Larry Snodgrass and at that time I did not know who the third man was in the old photo. I received several replies saying that it was Jim Carrara. Jimmy is married to Maxine Face.

Recently while I was at the Veterans car show in Loma Linda I met Mike Face who is a well known

custom automobile painter in San Bernardino. My good friend Jim Benson's had his 65 Buick Rivera painted at Mike's shop so I knew who Mike Face was but I had never met him.

Thru contact with Mike Face, Mike's father David Face called me and we arranged a meeting at our house in Highgrove. David brought Jim Carrara with him and I finally got to meet the third man in the picture that was taken to promote one of the plays that were held at the school during the 50's.

We had a great time talking



about growing up in Highgrove. David's father was O.K. Face and they lived on Palmyrita Ave. near the Gage canal. I went to Highgrove Elementary School with David's brother Gary Face who was killed back in 1967. Their house was surrounded by orange groves at that time which was way before the warehouses were built. Palmyrita Ave. was a remote 2 lane road with no intersections and the Face's house was the only house around. This is where we used to drag race years ago and were visited by the CHP on several occasions.

We figured that the Faces were calling the CHP and we only had a limited amount of time before they arrived.

I confessed to David that I was one of the culprits who raced up and down Palmyrita Ave. way back when he lived there. We had a good visit and talked about how David never knew who I was until many years later.

Even though I admitted it, I also reminded him that the statute of limitations had expired because

that was about 57 years ago!

Jim Carrara reminded me that he used to own the service station that is now occupied by Toy Tech on Center Street. He happened to be in Southern California visiting and it was good to meet and talk to both of them. When I received the citrus caliper from Jim I noticed that it was very well made and had "OK Face Riverside" cut into it.

I also discovered that my 1953 photograph of the Highgrove Elementary School Basketball Team was stamped on the back with: PHOTO BY OK FACE (David's father and Mike Face's grandfather).

David told me that they are preparing information about Olyn Keith Face so future generations will know what a talented and wonderful man that O.K. Face was.

I am honored to have the fruit caliper and I will keep it with a wedge of orange wood that I saved when Howard Hall's 40 acre orange grove was removed. Howard's grove is where I used to smudge when I was in high school.






















The caliper shown on P. 4 was used to measure the size of the fruit and the tag was used to identify what type of fruit it was. The opposite side of the tag shown above was used as a chart to monitor the monthly growth of the fruit. The photo at right of the 1953 Highgrove Elementary School basketball team was also taken by the talented OK Face.





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
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

Railroad "Turnout" installed near "Diamond" at Marlborough Avenue.





This project is not related to the Metrolink station that RCTC is planning for the north/west corner of Marlborough Ave. and the Perris Valley Line.

This railroad panel above is shown waiting to be installed in the Perris Valley Line track just north of Marlborough Avenue.

After this panel is installed, trains from Highgrove to Perris will be able to continue straight southward toward Perris, or by using the new switch, will be able make a right hand turn onto the "Riverside Line" owned by the Union Pacific Railroad. Union Pacific's "Riverside Line" runs between Colton and Riverside but dead ends 100 feet north of Third St. in Riverside and does not connect to any of the BNSF tracks.


The Union Pacific track crosses the Perris Valley Line track as shown in the photograph above. This railroad intersection is called a "Diamond". Railroad freight customers on the UP line will still be able to receive freight cars but the access will be also be from the Perris Valley Line track that is used

by the BNSF for freight service. Before the new turnout track between the Perris Valley Line and the UP line was installed, the existing sewer line was exposed and concrete re-enforcement added over the sewer line because the new turnout track will go right over the existing sewer line.



This photo was taken Oct. 26, 2012 and shows Marlborough Ave. looking northward toward Highgrove. The new turnout track is shown on the left side of the photo that now goes across the street.

The track above on the right is the Perris Valley Line track that runs between Highgrove and Perris. Behind the photographer or south of Marlborough Ave. is where the railroad "Diamond" is located.



The new turnout has been completed across Marlborough Ave. but was still under construction when this photo was taken. You can see the end of the rails where

the track stops on the south side of the street. When completed, this curved track will connect to the UP track which is the horizontal line near the top of the picture.




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Texas author writing about Local railroad line

also known as the "San Jack" or San Jacinto branch line that starts at the south side of Main St. in Highgrove and dead ends at San Jacinto, is the subject of a book being written by T. E. Sandlin from Austin, Texas. Two friends and former Santa Fe employees who now live in Grand Terrace introduced me to Tom when they came to my house on Oct. 8, 2012.

Mike Croy came from Chicago to San Bernardino in 1991 as Trainmaster and was promoted to Terminal Manager of the San Bernardino railroad terminal when the BNSF bought the Santa Fe. He was my supervisor for many years and was in charge of the daily operations of the container yard that is located across from the San Bernardino depot. Kenny Carter also worked on the railroad when he was a fireman on the Santa Fe between 1957 and 1964 until the firemen were severed under proposition 17 which was called the "Featherbeding" proposition. When the featherbedding proposition passed, the railroad eliminated the firemen's jobs but in the long run the railroad ended up being short of qualified engineers to run the trains. I have often compared this to eliminating the co-pilot of an airplane. The co-pilot learns

The Perris Valley Line which is from the pilot in the same manner that the fireman learned from the engineer and in most cases "on the job experience" is more valuable than learning from a book or a classroom. I have trained student switchmen that knew the rule book really well but they did not know what to do when they got on the

> After leaving the railroad, Kenny worked at Kaiser Steel until he became a Riverside County Sheriff Deputy in 1966 where he worked for 26 years. He is now retired and he and Mike have both lived in Grand Terrace for many years.

> Mike and Kenny brought Tom to my house where we talked briefly about the Perris Valley Line and what it was like working on the railroad. We were each given a clip-on microphone and our information was tape recorded for future reference in writing the book. Tom is doing the research by interviewing former employees in cooperation with his co-author who lives in Hemet.

> Some of the stories from my two friends brought back a lot of memories of good times, funny things, and bad things that happened when we worked together.

When I was working I almost always had a camera with me and I have hundreds of photos of the

San Bernardino shops when they were torn down and replaced with a container yard, photos of the "B" yard when it was rebuilt, and photos of the General Motors facility when it was built between Rialto Ave. and Mill St. where new automobiles are unloaded. I have always been interested in preserving local historical events on the railroad but unfortunately I do

not have many photos of the "San Jack" because that was before I started carrying a camera. Historical and local events in and around the Highgrove area has been one of the purposes of our newspaper.

I do not know the title of the book since information is still being collected but when more information becomes available we will keep you informed.

endless media ads, yard signs, billboards, and debates leading up to the 2012 election, let us reflect on a few of the issues and candidates.

Proposition 30: is an increase in our taxes to prop up the revenue shortfall to our schools. As a teacher, this issue is very close to home. My teacher's association is urging a ves vote. The consideration is, can we trust Sacramento to actually spend this extra revenue on schools, and will the tax actually expire in four years as proposed? The record is clear that Sacramento can be trusted to do neither! The governor's solution is and has been, to raise taxes instead of cutting spending. It's interesting that other states, such as Washington and Texas, are much higher in per pupil spending, and do it without even having a personal income tax. I recommend a NO vote for this tax measure.

Proposition 32: will ban corporate and union contributions to both state and local candidates. and will ban automatic deductions by employers used for political purposes. My teachers association also opposes this measure. They feel that they will loose political clout to large special interest groups. Truth is, the California Teacher's Association (CTA) is California's largest special interest group. They are spending massive amounts of money to defeat this

As we go into the season of proposition. The CTA has ads out that complain that business billionaires and large corporations will out spend public employee unions. They fail to realize that corporations only spend money to defeat measures that will loose the shareholders money, or help reduce their costs. Corporations are in business to make money. If that concept is onerous to them, maybe they should take their money out of their IRA or 423B accounts, and invest them in municipal bonds. Maybe in cities like San Bernardino, Rancho Cucamonga or even the City of Bell. See how that works out for them. I recommend a YES vote for this proposition.

> Local, State, and National Representatives: Many of our representatives have been in office for several years or even decades. They need to go. Their egos should be quenched by now by having a school, park or bridge named after them. Let them take their lavish pension and benefit packages, they voted for themselves, and fade away. In these times of record deficits, our representatives have ignored the dangers we are facing in our fiscal management. If this kind of spending continues, we will need to learn Chinese to go to our local bank. We need representatives that will seek and destroy wasteful, redundant programs. At this point in time we even need to

cut out programs that are very useful and worthwhile, at least until we can afford them. I actually want a candidate to say "NO we can't afford it"! Say no to you, to me, and especially to special interest groups wanting to spend what we don't have.

Presidential Election: It's a mystery that this election is even close. The president's record is easily and demonstrably the worst of my lifetime. His support has come from unions, and government employees, bolstered by groups that rely on government programs. We all know the dismal statistics, so I'll not dwell on the numbers.

While promising to balance the budget, this president has borrowed and spent our country into oblivion. Obama Care, green

energy, the stimulus, bank bailouts, and continuing the war in Afghanistan, all of this on money borrowed largely from China.

We are watching on the evening news the fruits of his stance with the middle eastern world. The blood of our soldiers has been shed, and the treasures we've spent have been a total loss. As a government of each country falls, we are left with another middle eastern country that hates us. I would urge everyone, whether you support Obama or Romney, to go see the movie, "Obama 2016". You will get a great insight on what direction this president intends to take our country!






Mr. Lewis S. Neeb P.E., FNSPE, DMCSPE



So, instead of thinking about what the financial markets might do if one party is in power, or focusing too much on how your investment taxes may change if one candidate is elected president, cast your "vote" for solid investment principles, such as buying quality investments, holding them for the long term, staying aware of your risk tolerance and, especially, diversifying your holdings. While diversification can't guarantee profits or prevent losses, it can help reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio — which will make it easier to establish a strategy and stick to it.

Like many people, you'll be interested in the outcome of the election. But when it comes to taking charge of your financial future, don't wait for Washington. You're in charge — you're the one who will need to gather the resources and get the professional help necessary to keep your investments aligned with your long-term financial goals. Don't be distracted by the political rhetoric — and use your power wisely.

Being a transplanted native Californian I am suffering from shock just like my plants. I miss Highgrove and all my family and friends! I moved to central Oregon a little over a year ago and it is nothing like Highgrove. I knew the change would be dramatic- this little city has about 77,000 people, hundreds, if not thousands, of wild deer, and more dogs per capita that any place I've ever been. It is another planet compared to California. Let me share with you my journey.

Summer is officially over in Central Oregon. We've already had a dusting of snow and it is cold. Wood stoves are burning, outside water dishes are frozen over, the birds have flown south for the winter and the deer have moved into town, returning for food and a safe haven from the hunters. I don't expect to feel the warm sun on my face until June.

I miss Highgrove this time of year. I've always looked forward to fall in Highgrove. The heat starts easing, the whisper of cool breezes mixes with the tropical air. There is the assurance that we have survived another blistering southern summer. By the time Halloween rolls around we know we are in the clear. However I have vivid memories of Thanksgivings where summer showed its strength one more time.

My dad was a very clever guy. We have a very large family- there's eight of us kids and with spouses and grandkids the number grew exponentially. Mom loved having

us all over for the holidays but a sit down dinner was a challenge for seating. Dad made custom tables for these occasions. They were functional and not fancy. Made of four by eight sheets of thick plywood, the corners cut into gentle curves and attached folding legs, they were easy to store. To move them about easily he drilled a hole at each end on one long side and he would slide a pair of wheels on the ends and simply roll them in and out of the house and into place. I thought it was ingenious. "Work smarter, not harder." After Mom covered and decorated them they were lovely.

The Thanksgiving of 1976 was a scorcher. Dr. George Fishbeck was on the TV telling us how hot it was. He was also talking about the weather in other parts of the country. I'll never forget his excitement: "and Cheyenne is cut off from the rest of the world!" Cheyenne, Wyoming was literally buried in a blizzard. We were living in Cheyenne at the time and were in Highgrove for a visit after Kristi was born in September. She only had winter clothes and it was so hot she was wearing just her tiny t-shirts and a diaper. When we left to fly back home it was 101 degrees in Highgrove and when we landed in Cheyenne it was about 2 degrees. I wanted to fly right back HOME.


So that Thanksgiving it was too hot to put a lot of people

in the house. The house was built in 1959 and hadn't had central air installed yet so it got pretty hot. Dad set the tables up outside and placed the chairs around the table and Mom covered and decorated them as if they were in the house. The food was hauled from the kitchen to the tables outdoors and we sat together cool.






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Reche Canyon Foreclosure Brought Back to Life! Officer Lanee Padilla was contacted by Reche Canyon community mem-

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


